

WE ALSO IN THE SUBCOMMITTEE ENCOURAGE THEM TO PRIORITIZE DISABILITIES ACCESS BEYOND PARATRANSIT AND SEE IF 20 21 THERE COULD BE POLICIES BROADENED BEYOND PARATRANSIT AND 22 PRESENTATION ON THE NEXGEN FREEWAY STUDY WHICH RAISED CONCERNS ABOUT HOW THIS WOULD IMPACT LOW-INCOME COMMUNITIES IF THIS 23 WERE TO BE IMPLEMENTED AND WE'RE REMINDED THIS IS A STUDY AT 24 THIS TIME IT'S NOT GOING TO BE IMPLEMENTED BUT WE ARE AWAITING 25

- 3 PROPOSAL THAT THE -- THAT THE TASK FORCE ACCEPTED TO MOVE
- 4 FORWARD WITH PROGRESS ON THE FREE AND REDUCED PRICE TRANSFERS,
- 5 WHICH WAS A PART OF THE FARE POLICY VISION THAT IS A FREE

- 13 CASE STUDY, SOME POSITIVE THINGS FROM THAT STUDY WHICH IS
- 14 MOVING FORWARD IS THAT INTERESTS IN THE POLICY ADVISORY
- 15 COUNCIL MAKING SURE THAT ACCESSIBILITY IS REPRESENTED AND THAT
- 16 THE, YOU KNOW, VOICE OF TRANSIT RIDERS AND USERS IS, AND
- 17 ACCOUNTABILITY TO THE USERS IS REPRESENTED. THOSE THINGS ARE

- 22 THE SUMMER. AT THE LAST MEETING THERE WERE TECHNICAL CONCERNS
- 23 RAISED BY TRANSIT OPERATORS ABOUT DETAILS OF HOW THE ANALYSIS
- 24 WILL BE DONE WITH REGARD TO COST BENEFIT ANALYSIS AND

OUESTIONS THAT ARE, I THINK, A LITTLE BIT BEYOND WHAT I FULLY 1 UNDERSTAND, BUT THAT WAS A TOPIC THAT DID ARISE. AND WOULD 2 3 ALSO WELCOME ANY ADDITIONAL UPDATES FROM PEOPLE WHO ARE GOING TO ATTEND THAT MEETING AND OPEN TO ANY QUESTIONS. 4 5 RANDI KINMAN, CHAIR: THANK YOU. CHRISTINA? 6 7 8 CHRISTINA GOTUACO: ADINA, DO YOU HAVE AN UPDATE ON WHY THE MEETINGS ARE GETTING CANCELLED? I HAVE ALSO REQUESTED AND AM SCHEDULED WITH -- WE HAVE ASKED TO HAVE THE PAYMENT TOPICS 22 BROUGHT TO US, AS WELL, ESPECIALLY AS CLIPPER TWO IS BEING 23 SCHEDULED TO ROLL OUT NEXT YEAR. 



- 4 GOALS REFLECT THE VERY TARGETED FOCUS ON INCREASING HOUSING
- 5 DENSITY NEAR TRANSIT AS WELL AS AFFORDABLE HOUSING NEAR
- 6 TRANSIT, INCREASING COMMERCIAL DENSITIES, AND THEN, REALLY,
- 7 NOT ONLY LOCATING MORE JOBS IN HOUSING WITHIN THE HALF MILE



- 22 DEVELOPING REQUIREMENTS BECAUSE WE WERE TRYING TO BE
- 23 RESPONSIVE TO THE WIDE VARIETY AND RANGE OF LAND USE CONTEXTS,
- 24 TRANSIT SERVICE LEVELS, AND THE FLEXIBILITY THAT ALL OF THE
- 25 JURISDICTIONS WE SPOKE TO DESIRED TO SEE. SO, I DO NOT -- SO,



- 1 YEAH, JUST TO BE CLEAR IT DOESN'T SPECIFIC LEAVE RULE OUT TOWN
- 2 HOMES BEING BUILT UNLESS THEY WERE DENSE ENOUGH TO FALL INTO
- 3 THOSE RANGES WITH RESPECT TO STREET GRID WE DON'T SPECIFICALLY
- 4 REQUIRE THAT A STREET GRID NEEDS TO BE CREATED BUT I WILL SAY



- 3 NUMBER OF REALLY FANTASTIC THINGS IN TERMS OF THE EXPECTATIONS
- 4 FOR DENSITY BY OUR MAJOR TRANSIT INVESTMENTS, THE PARKING
- 5 THAT'S SUITABLE FOR SUCH LOCATIONS, THE ACCESS POLICIES, THE
- 6 HOUSING POLICIES, JUST BIG COMPLEMENTS. I DO HAVE SOME
- 7 OUESTIONS BUILDING ON THINGS THAT OTHERS HAVE SAID AND I KIND
- 8 OF ECHOING ON THE ANTI-DISPLACEMENT, ESPECIALLY, THAT MR.
- 9 NICKENS HAD RAISED. BECAUSE THAT'S A REALLY LONG LIST, AND IT
- 10 ONLY REQUIRES TWO. IT WOULD BE POSSIBLE TO PICK A TENANT

SOME SHARE OF THE HOMES? AND LET ME SEE IF I HAD ANY -- MY 1 OTHER QUESTION IS ABOUT ACCESS ANALYSIS. IT ELECTRONICS LIKE 2 3 THE ACCESS ANALYSIS IS FOCUSING ON ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION, WHICH IS GREAT. BUT DOES THAT ACCESS ANALYSIS ALSO INCLUDE BUS 4 5 SERVICE? - 4 AREA THAT WAS PART OF THE RATIONALE BUT YOUR FEEDBACK IS
- 5 CERTAINLY NOTED. THANK YOU.

- 9 ZACH DEUTSCH-GROSS: THANKS RANDI, IS THANKS FOR BEARING WITH

- 18 BE THAT WE ARE ENSURING THAT WE'RE HAVING THE WIDEST AREA
- 19 POSSIBLE AND NOT JUST SELECTING THE SMALLER AREA PDA, TRANSIT-
- 20 RICH VICE-VERSA. I WOULD LIKE TO KNOW MORE ABOUT HOW THAT
- 21 PROCESS WORKS AND HOW POTENTIAL FUTURE PDAS AND THINGS COULD
- 22 FIT INTO THAT AND MY OTHER QUESTION IS ABOUT CONDITIONING OBAG
- 23 FUNDS. YOU MENTIONED THIS EARLIER AND I WANTED TO FOLLOW UP,
- 24 CONDITIONING OBAG FUND STARTING IN TENT 26 THEN IT WOULD JUST

ARE WE WAITING UNTIL TENT 26 AND DO WE THINK THAT EVEN IN TENT 1 26 THIS WILL BE ENOUGH TO MOVE THE NOODLE WHEN IT COMES TO 2 3 RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL DEVELOPMENT. 4 5 KARA VULCICH: THE REASON WE TOOK THAT APPROACH WAS THAT, A, WE WANTED TO RECOGNIZE THE PRIORITY DEVELOPMENT AREA PROGRAM THAT 6 HAD BEEN IN EXISTENCE SINCE 2008 AND MANY OF THOSE PRIORITY 7 8 DEVELOPMENT BOUNDARIES WERE DRAWN BECAUSE THOSE ARE AREAS WHERE NEW DEVELOPMENT IS MOST LIKELY ABLE TO OCCUR. AND, SO, 9 WE WANTED TO HONOR AND RECOGNIZE THAT. SO THAT'S PARTLY WHY WE 10 SAID IF A JURISDICTION HAS DESIGNATED A PRIORITY DEVELOPMENT 11 AREA IT WILL APPLY TO THAT BOUNDARY AND IF THEY HAVE NOT 12 DESIGNATED A PRIORITY DEVELOPMENT AREA IN THE STATIONARY THEN 13 IT APPLIES TO THE ENTIRE TRANSIT-RICH AREA. THE HOPE IS THAT 14 15 THIS POLICY WILL FURTHER INCENTIVIZE JURISDICTIONS TO GO 16 THROUGH THE PDA PLANNING DESIGNATION PROCESS FOR THOSE STATION AREAS THAT HAVE NOT YET GONE THROUGH THAT. AND SO THERE 17 CERTAINLY IS THAT OPPORTUNITY AND THAT ROOM FOR JURISDICTIONS 18 TO COME IN AND DESIGNATE PDAS AFTER THE FACT. - 4 ELEMENTS FOR SUNNYVALE AS WELL AS THE CLIMATE ACTION PLAN AND



- 17 JOSE, SAN BRUNO, WITHOUT A CAR. I COULD GET TO WORK, I COULD
- 18 TAKE BART BUT AS OTHER PEOPLE WERE SAYING WITHOUT THE MIXED
- 19 USE INFRASTRUCTURE NEAR THE STATION, I WOULD HAVE TO -- AND IT
- 20 DOESN'T CHANGE FAMILY AND FRIENDS LOCATION BUT JUST FOR

IT JUST SEEMS THAT LOOKING FORWARD, PLANNING NOW, THOSE RIGHTS OF WAYS NEED TO BE LOOKED AT, AND 11 CERTAINLY PROTECTED FOR FUTURE GROWTH. AND HOUSING. MY OTHER 12 POINT WAS LOOKING AT THE MINIMUMS AS WE GO FARTHER AND FARTHER 13 OUT, WITH SINGLE LINE THIS AND SINGLE LINE THAT, WHY NOT RAISE 14 15 THE MINIMUMS IN THOSE AREAS AGAIN AS FAR AS HOUSING, AGAIN, 16 LOOKING FORWARD TO THE HOUSING SHORTAGE THAT WILL PROBABLY EXIST FOR DECADES AS CALIFORNIA TRIES TO CATCH UP. - 18 LITTLE BIT OF A WAYS OFF, IT'S A BIG ENDEAVOR. THAT'S THE
- 19 FIRST QUESTION. AND THEN SECONDLY, SHOULD MTC AND OUR PARTNERS
- 20 PURSUE STATE ENABLING LEGISLATION TO AUTHORIZE A REGIONAL
- 21 TRANSPORTATION MEASURE FOR A TO-BE-DETERMINED FUTURE BALLOT
- 22 AND TAKE OTHER STEPS TO ADDRESS FUTURE TRANSPORTATION NEEDS.
- 23 NEXT SLIDE. THERE HAVE BEEN A NUMBER OF POLLS DONE BY OTHERS.
- 24 CERTAINLY MTC HAS PAID FOR SOME OF THESE BUT A RECENT BAY AREA
- 25 COUNCIL POLL OF BAY AREA VOTERS THAT IS AIMED AT JUST






- 1 UNDERSTANDING KIND OF WHAT'S THEIR TEMPERATURE, WHAT ARE THEIR

- 4 THINK THE BAY AREA IS ON THE WRONG TRACK. A COMBINED 45% THINK

- 11 MANY OF YOU MAY KNOW, IN THIS BUSINESS, AND IN POLICY AREA FOR
- 12 A WHILE, THAT'S A BIG CHANGE FROM PREPANDEMIC. AND ONLY 57%,
- 13 WHILE THAT'S A HEALTH MAJORITY SAID THEY WOULD SUPPORT A SALES
- 14 TAX FOR TRANSPORTATION. AND THAT'S NINE PERCENTAGE POINTS
- 15 BELOW A REOUIRED TWO THIRDS, WHICH IS 60% PLUS ONE. NEXT
- 16 SLIDE. SO WHY THE URGENCY TO TALK ABOUT THIS RIGHT NOW AND TO
- 17 AFFIRM PURSUIT OF A REGIONAL HOUSING MEASURE? WELL, OUR
- 18 HOUSING PARTNERS, WE'RE HAVE A VERY ROBUST HOUSING ADVOCACY
- 19 COMMUNITY IN THE BAY AREA. THEY GO UNDER THE UMBRELLA OF THE
- 20 BAY AREA HOUSING FOR ALL COALITION. SO, BIG TENT COALITION
- 21 INCLUDES THE NON-PROFIT HOUSING ASSOCIATION OF NORTHERN
- 22 CALIFORNIA, INCLUDES A LOT OF TENANT ADVOCATES AND OTHERS.
- 23 THEY FORMALLY REQUESTED THAT WE PROVIDE A CLEAR SIGNAL THAT
- 24 BAHFA AND ABAG INTEND TO PURSUE A HOUSING BOND TO ASSIST THEM
- 25 IN THEIR EFFORTS TO DO THE FUND RAISING THAT WILL BE NECESSARY





- 1 IN A CAMPAIGN AT ALL OF THE -- JUST THE ORGANIZATION, THE
- 2 GRASSROOTS WORK THAT WILL REALLY BE IMPORTANT TO GET TO A YES
- 3 VOTE AND SO, OF COURSE, AS A PUBLIC AGENCY, ABAG BAHFA AND
- 4 MTC, WE'RE NOT INVOLVED IN THE CAMPAIGN, WE'RE ALLOWED TO DO
- 5 THE PUBLIC INFORMATION PIECE OF THIS BUT WELL IS A VERY





- 10 ARE ALREADY WORKING TOGETHER TO GET SOMETHING PASSED IS REALLY
- 11 PERSONALITY. AND THE WITH ALL OF THOSE, I SUPPORT.

- 13 RANDI KINMAN, CHAIR: THANK YOU. WE'RE TAKING COMMENTS ON THE
- 14 MOTION, WHICH IS A GENERAL MOTION TO SUPPORT THE STAFF
- 15 RECOMMENDATIONS, KEEPING IN MIND THIS IS NOT A MEAT AND
- 16 POTATOES EXACTLY WHAT WE WOULD LIKE TO SEE, SO, PLEASE CONTAIN
- 17 YOUR COMMENT TO THAT. THERE WILL BE LOTS OF OPPORTUNITY TO
- 18 SPEAK ON THESE TOPICS WHEN THEY COME BACK AROUND. HOWARD THEN
- 19 ZACK.

- 21 HOWARD WONG: REGARDING POLLING, THERE A LOT OF EXISTING
- 22 POLLINGS, AND SURVEYS WITH MTA'S CONNECT SF SHOWED THAT MOST
- 23 RIDERS JUST WANT RELIABLE TRANSIT. A LOT OF POLLING SHOWS THAT
- 24 PEOPLE NEED HOUSING. THERE ISN'T ANY HOUSING. SO, AFTERDECK
- 25 AIDS OF NEGLECT, AFTER BILLIONS AND BILLIONS OF DOLLARS TO



- 1 EXPEND IT, VOTERS WANT TO SEE RESULTS AND NOT MORE, JUST
- 2 POURING MORE MONEY INTO AGENCIES THAT HAVEN'T REALLY DELIVERED
- 3 AFTER SO MANY DECADES OF TRYING. THE MANY OF THE THINGS THAT
- 4 WE WANT CAN BE ACHIEVED FROM SIMPLER MEANS. SO EVEN BEFORE
- 5 POLLING OR EVEN BEFORE FUNDS OR REGIONAL MEASURES, TRANSIT

- 11 THROUGH HOW IT PUTS TOGETHER A BUILDING THAT MIGHT HOUSING TEN
- 12 PEOPLE AND TURN INTO A SHARED UNIT THAT HOUSES 50. SO THERE
- 13 ARE MANY THINGS THAT YOU SEE AROUND THE WORLD. I THINK MTC
- 14 SHOULD BE, AGAIN, LOOKING AT EXAMPLES AROUND THE WORLD TO SEE
- 15 HOW TRANSIT AND HOUSING HAVE BEEN ACHIEVABLE IN MANY OTHER
- 16 COUNTRIES AND CITIES. THANK YOU.

- 20 ZACH DEUTSCH-GROSS: THANK YOU. YES TO A 2024 HOUSING MEASURE.
- 21 WE ARE IN A HOUSING CRISIS. IT'S TOUGH FOR VOTERS I DO NOT SEE
- 22 THAT CHANGING IN THE NEXT TWO YEARS AND I SEE THE REAL URGENCY
- 23 IN A HOUSING BOND. I WOULD LIKE TO SEE EXPLICIT INTENT BY MTC
- 24 TO PURSUE ENABLING LEGISLATION FOR A FUTURE TRANSPORTATION
- 25 FUNDING MEASURE IN MY MIND MOVING FORWARD WITH A HOUSING



- 1 MEASURE ON THE BALLOT SHOULD NOT CONFLICT WITH GETTING
- 2 ENABLING LEGISLATION AND ENABLING LEGISLATION EARLY ALLOWS
- 3 MORE FLEXIBILITY TO TASK THE RIGHT MEASURE AND WIN AT THE
- 4 BALLOT, AS WE MOVE FORWARD. REBECCA, YOU ASKED ABOUT POTENTIAL

- 7 PERSONALLY FOR ME, INCOME TAXES SEEMS TO RAISE A LOT OF MONEY
- 8 AND POLLS WELL, AND IS ONE OF THE MOST PROGRESSIVE EQUITABLE
- 9 SOURCES WE HAVE, AND SINCE WE'RE SEEKING [INDISCERNIBLE]
- 10 LEGISLATION WE'RE GOING THERE ANYWAY. THANK YOU.

12 RANDI KINMAN, CHAIR: THANK YOU. RICH THEN GERRY.

- 14 RICHARD HEDGES: THANK YOU. VERY WELL-CRAFTED PROGRAM. I AGREE
- 15 WITH MOST OF THE CONCEPTS. I HAVE RUN THREE TAX MEASURES WHERE
- 16 I SIT ON CITIZENS COMMITTEES AND PASS THEM BY 80 AND 70%. IT'S
- 17 IMPORTANT WHEN GOING INTO THIS AND REBECCA HAS SEEN THAT WE
- 18 HAVE A STRONG ECONOMY AND LOWER INFLATION. I THINK THE LOWER
- 19 TURN OUT IN THE BAY AREA, WHICH IS UNUSUAL, MY COUNTY WAS AT
- 20 13% TIED WITH LA WHICH IS ALWAYS LOW, IN SOME CASES PEOPLE
- 21 JUST DON'T THINK IT HELPS TO VOTE. SO THAT'S DANGEROUS FOR US.
- 22 WE NEED TO DO IT IN THE PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION AS SHE'S TALKING
- 23 ABOUT BECAUSE THAT'S WHEN THE RENTERS VOTE. THEY REALLY DON'T
- 24 VOTE IN PRIMARY OR OFF- YEAR ELECTIONS TO THE NUMBERS THAT
- 25 WE'LL NEED. SO I THINK EVERYTHING IS GEARED RIGHT. I'M OKAY

- 10 INFLATION. ONE OF THE HOUSES I WAS IN HAS INFLATED IN VALUE

- 17 BUT IN HOUSING. I CAN'T SUPPORT THE MEASURE. ABSOLUTELY, WE

- 23 THEM TO MOVE FORWARD TO LOOK AT THE PROS AND CONS. SO, THAT --
- 24 JUST SO EVERYBODY IS AWARE.

- 3 REBECCA LONG: JUST TO RESPOND TO GERRY'S KIND OF COMMENT. SO
- 4 THE RECOMMENDATION THAT WE'RE BRINGING FORWARD TO ABAG AND THE
- 5 BAHFA IS FOR THEM TO DIRECT THEIR COMMITTEES THAT DEAL WITH
- 6 HOUSING, TO BASICALLY TELL STAFF TO PROCEED TOWARD THIS. AND
- 7 IT IS SPECIFIC TO A HOUSING BOND. BECAUSE THAT IS WHAT, YOU

- 24 SOME FURTHER WORKING POTENTIALLY ALTERNATIVE FUNDING SOURCES.





SO I JUST WANTED TO BRING THAT UP AS SOMETHING WE 11 MIGHT NEED TO INCORPORATE INTO THIS. 12 13 RANDI KINMAN, CHAIR: THANK YOU. VEDA AND THEN ADINA? 14 15 16 VEDA FLOREZ: THANK YOU FOR THE PRESENTATION. I'M VERY EXCITED TO SEE THE SLIDE OF MARIN COUNTY, WHERE I LIVE. AND I NOTICED 17 THAT THERE WERE MANY PATCHES OF YELLOW. SO, THAT MEANS THE 18 SECONDARY SIZE OF THE STREET OR WALKING PATH. AND I KNOW THAT 19 THE SMART TRAIN HAS SIX DIFFERENT PROJECTS, CURRENTLY, THAT 20 ARE READY TO MOVE FORWARD. 


I'M A BIG ADVOCATE FOR PROTECTED BIKE LANES. I THINK THEY'RE 1 SO IMPORTANT AND THEY HELP OUT THE ENTIRE COMMUNITY, CHILDREN, 2 3 THOSE IN WHEELCHAIRS, PEOPLE WHO WANT TO RIDE THEIR BICYCLES AND DON'T HAVE TO STAY ON THE SIDEWALKS. SO, I'M HOPING THAT 4 5 YOU CAN ENCOURAGE LOCAL JURISDICTIONS TO CREATE PROTECTED BIKE LANES. I KNOW THAT MARIN TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY OF MARIN 6 JUST -- OR LAST YEAR -- GAVE OUITE A BIT OF MONEY TO WORK ON 7 8 SOME BIKE LANES. HOWEVER THEY DIDN'T CREATE PROTECTED BIKE LANES AND I THINK THERE IS GREAT OPPORTUNITY THERE. AND I'LL 9 10 JUST LEAVE IT THERE BECAUSE OF THE HOUR. 11 KARA OBERG: THANKS VEDA. JURISDICTIONS ARE NOT JUST CITIES, IT 12 INCLUDES TRANSIT AGENCIES, AS WELL. WE HAVE BEEN WORKING WITH 13 THE TRANSIT AGENCIES RELATED TO A COMPLETE STREETS POLICY THAT 14 15 YOU GUYS PROVIDED AND PUT ON DURING FEBRUARY. ONE OF THE 16 PIECES IS MAKING SURE THAT TRANSIT AGENCIES ARE REVIEWING COMPLETE STREETS CHECKLISTS IF THEY'RE -- IF TRANSIT IS PART 17 OF THEIR -- IF THEIR OPERATIONS WOULD BE AFFECTED. IT'S A 18 LITTLE BIT DIFFERENT THAN BUILDING A TRAIL. TO YOUR OUESTION 19 WE HAVE BEEN AND WILL BE WORKING WITH AGENCIES. AND WE PLAN TO 20 21 UPDATE THE MAP, AT MINIMUM, EVERY TWO YEARS. 22

- 2 QUESTION. THE COMMENT IS BUILDING ON THE WAYFINDING WHERE I
- 3 WAS REALLY GLAD TO SEE, ON THE SLIDE, THAT THERE IS AN INTENT
- 4 TO DOVETAIL THE WAYFINDING TO THE TRAILS AND ACTIVE
- 5 TRANSPORTATION ROUTES WITH THE WAYFINDING PROJECT FOR TRANSIT,
- 6 WHICH, ITS SCOPE DOES INCLUDE FINDING ACCESSIBILITY FOR PEOPLE
- 7 WITH DISABILITIES SO THAT WILL CARRY OVER. AND ONE THING I
- 8 WANTED TO ADD TO THAT COMMENT, WHICH IS THAT IN THE
- 9 WAYFINDING, REALLY NEEDS TO INCLUDE THE DESTINATIONS THAT

- 11 -- HAVING USED THE TRAILS IN SAN JOSE, WHERE THE SIGNS ARE ALL
- 12 ABOUT RECREATIONAL DESTINATION. AND I HAVE MADE COMMENTS OVER
- 13 TIME SAYING, HEY, I'M TRYING TO USE THIS TRAIL TO GET TO SOME
- 14 PLACE IN THE CITY. I'M JUST USING IT AS A TRANSPORTATION MODE,
- 15 BUT I'M GOING SOMEWHERE IN THE CITY. AND THEY SAY, OH NO. THIS
- 16 IS FOR RECREATION. AND SO IF YOU ARE USING THE TRAIL TO
- 17 ACTUALLY GET SOMEWHERE, YOU'RE DOING IT WRONG. THAT'S NOT HOW
- 18 THEY SET IT. BUT AT ANY RATE, THEY WERE ONLY THINKING OF
- 19 WAYFINDING AS RELATED TO RECREATION, AND I THERE ARE REALLY
- 20 PEOPLE TRYING TO GET TO A VARIETY OF LOCATIONS, TRYING TO GET
- 21 TO A UNIVERSITY OR MALL OR SOMETHING. SO PLEASE, PLEASE,
- 22 PLEASE HAVE A WAY FOR PEOPLE PERTAINING TO DESTINATIONS. THEN
- 23 THE SUPER NARROW OUESTION IS, THERE IS A TO RADIUS OF A
- 24 QUARTER MILE AND HALF MILE AND 1,000 FEET, AND I DIDN'T
- 25 UNDERSTAND WHY IT'S THE NARROWEST RADIUS FOR THE BAY TRAIL.
