GOOD 23 MORNING GENERAL ASSEMBLY DELEGATES, FELLOW ELECTED OFFICIALS, 24 STAFF AND THE PUBLIC. THIS PORTION OF THE PROGRAM IS FOR 25

INFORMATIONAL PURPOSES ONLY EXAMINES REGIONAL RESOURCES FOR 1 HOUSING ASSISTANCE INCLUDES LISTENING SESSIONS ON HOUSING 2 3 CHALLENGES AND HOW A POTENTIAL REGIONAL HOUSING BALLOT MEASURE AND OTHER REGIONAL HOUSING PROGRAMS CAN ASSIST LOCAL 4 5 JURISDICTIONS. THIS SESSION IS A COMPLEMENT TO THE BUSINESS MEETING WHICH STARTS AT 11 O'CLOCK A.M. ON A DIFFERENT ZOOM 6 LINK. HOUSING IS LONG-TERM AND URGENT BAY AREA CONCERN AND HAS 7 8 BEEN A FOCUS OF ABAG'S EFFORTS FOR ALMOST A 61-YEAR HISTORY. AND AS WE WRAPPED UP THE MOST RECENT RHNA CYCLE AND WERE NOW 9 10 WORKING TO UPDATE OUR HOUSING ELEMENTS, WE KNOW THE CHALLENGES WE'RE FACING INDIVIDUALLY IN MEETING THE STATE'S AMBITIOUS 11 HOUSING TARGETS. I KNOW, PERSONALLY, HOW HARD WE WORK IN 12 BERKELEY AND I SEE MY COLLEAGUES FROM THROUGHOUT THE REGION 13 FACING SIMILAR CHALLENGES MEETING THESE NEW MANDATES. MANY OF 14 15 YOUR LOCAL JURISDICTIONS HAVE BEEN WORKING WITH ABAG MTC STAFF 16 THROUGH THE REGIONAL HOUSING TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM, TAKING ADVANTAGE OF AN ARRAY OF TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE PRODUCTS 17 AND SUPPORT BY THE COUNTY COLLABORATIVES AND PEER COHORTS. 18 MORE INFORMATION ON THE PROGRAM AND ITS TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE 19 OFFERINGS IS AVAILABLE IN OUR AGENDA PACKET. BUT THE TECHNICAL 20 21 ASSISTANCE IS ONLY PART OF THE RESPONSE TO THE REGION'S URGENT HOUSING NEEDS. THE BAY AREA HOUSING FINANCE AUTHORITY, OR 22 BAHFA, WHICH IS A SHARED INITIATIVE OF ABAG AND MTC, WHICH IS 23 THE FIRST OF ITS KIND IN THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA WHAT'S 24 CREATED TO HELP GENERATE NEW FUNDING TO ADDRESS THE BAY AREA'S 25

AFFORDABLE HOUSING CHALLENGES IN PARTNERSHIP WITH CITIES AND 1 2 COUNTIES. AND I'LL ADD AS AN ADDENDUM I WAS IN WASHINGTON, 3 D.C. EARLIER THIS WEEK WITH MTC COLLEAGUES MEETING WITH HUD OFFICIALS AND MEMBERS OF CONGRESS ASKING FOR ADDITIONAL 4 5 FEDERAL RESOURCES TO SUPPORT THE WORK OF BAHFA TO LEVERAGE THE INVESTMENTS THAT THE STATE AND REGIONAL GOVERNANCE HAVE MADE 6 IN THIS IMPORTANT NEW REGIONAL HOUSING AUTHORITY. WITH THAT, 7 8 WITH THOSE INTRODUCTORY COMMENTS NOW PROVIDED, I WOULD LIKE TO ASK IF THERE ARE ANY MEMBERS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY THAT HAVE 9 OUESTIONS OR COMMENTS ON MY INTRODUCTORY COMMENTS. IF SO 10 PLEASE RAISE YOUR HAND. SEEING NO RAISED HANDS. CRAIG HUGHES? 11 12

16 FOR THIS MEETING, NOR FOR THE BUSINESS MEETING TO MAKE THE
17 REQUIRED FINDINGS UNDER A.B. 361. SO I WAS WONDERING IF WE
18 NEEDED TO DO THAT.

JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: GOOD QUESTION. THE ABAG
GENERAL ASSEMBLY -- RATHER, THE ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD, THIS IS
THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY, WHICH IS THE COMMITTEE THAT MEETS IN
BETWEEN MEETINGS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO CONDUCT ESSENTIAL
ABAG BUSINESS, EVERY MONTH, WE ADOPT A RESOLUTION UNDER
ASSEMBLY BILL 361 WHICH GIVES THE RESPECTED BODIES UNDER ABAG

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THE AUTHORITY OF TO OPERATE UNDER VIDEO CONFERENCES AND 1 2 TELECONFERENCE. I'LL CONFIRM WITH COUNSEL. 3 KATHLEEN KANE: YES, THAT'S RIGHT. THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE HAS 4 AUTHORITY TO ACT ON BEHALF OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY ON ALL ABAG 5 RELATED ENTITIES, SO, THAT'S WHAT WE HAVE BEEN DOING. BUT, 6 7 GOOD EYE. 8 JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: THANK YOU. SO, YEAH, WE HAVE 9 MADE REQUIRED FINDINGS TO CONDUCT THIS SESSION. WITH THAT ANY 10 OTHER QUESTIONS ON MY INTRODUCTORY COMMENTS? I DON'T SEE ANY 11 RAISED HANDS. MR. CASTRO, IS THERE ANY PUBLIC COMMENT? 12 13 CLERK, FRED CASTRO: THERE ARE NO MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC WITH 14 15 THEIR HAND RAISED, AND THERE WAS NO PUBLIC COMMENT SUBMITTED 16 ON THIS ITEM. 17 JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: THANK YOU. THAT BRINGS US TO 18 OUR NEXT ITEM, WHICH IS THE PRESENTATION ON REGIONAL RESOURCES 19 20 FOR HOUSING ASSISTANCE, AND WE WILL RECEIVE A PRESENTATION NOT 21 JUST ON THE BAY AREA HOUSING FINANCE AUTHORITY, BUT ALSO A POTENTIAL 2024 REGIONAL HOUSING MEASURE. AND, SO, I WOULD LIKE 22 TO GIVE SOME INTRODUCTORY COMMENTS. WE'RE PLEASED TO HAVE AND 23 TO WELCOME KATE HARTLEY, THE FIRST SECTION DIRECTOR OF BAHFA. 24 25 AND KATE IS A VETERAN OF BAY AREA'S HOUSING POLICY, FINANCE,

AND DEVELOPMENT SECTORS, INCLUDING THE CHIEF LENDING AND 1 2 INVESTMENT OFFICER FOR THE SAN FRANCISCO BAY'S NON-PROFIT, THE 3 HOUSING ACCELERATOR FUND. BEFORE JOINING THE HOUSING ACCELERATOR FUND, KATE SERVED AS DEPUTY DIRECTOR AND THEN 4 5 DIRECTOR FOR THE SAN FRANCISCO MAYOR'S OFFICE OF HOUSING AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT. SHE HAS ALSO DEVELOPED AND FINANCED 6 AFFORDABLE HOUSING THROUGHOUT THE BAY AREA, INCLUDING IN MY 7 8 OWN CITY OF BERKLEY. KATE WILL GIVE US AN UPDATE ON THE WORK OF BAHFA THE DETAILS ON THE HOUSING BOND MEASURE THAT BAHFA IS 9 CONSIDERING FOR THE 2024 BALLOT. WITH THAT I WOULD LIKE TO 10 TURN IT OVER KATE HARTLEY. 11

KATE HARTLEY: GOOD MORNING GENERAL ASSEMBLY MEMBERS. IT'S 13 GREAT TO BE HERE WITH YOU TODAY. IF WE CAN LOAD THE 14 15 PRESENTATION, WE CAN GET STARTED. THANK YOU. AS PRESIDENT 16 ARREGUIN SAID, WE WOULD LIKE TO BEGIN TODAY'S CONVENING WITH A 17 PRESENTATION ON THE REGIONAL HOUSING ASSISTANCE THAT ABAG AND MTC PROVIDE. ALSO, THE WORK OF OUR NEWLY OPERATIONALIZED BAY 18 AREA HOUSING FINANCE AUTHORITY, BAHFA, AND CONSIDERATION OF A 19 HOUSING REVENUE FOR THE 2024 BALLOT. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. THERE 20 IS A PROGRESSION TO OUR REGION'S HOUSING NEEDS RECENTLY AND 21 THE HOUSING ASSISTANCE PROVIDED TO OUR JURISDICTIONS BY ABAG 22 AND MTC. AS YOU ALL KNOW, ABAG AND MTC APPROVED PLANNED BAY 23 AREA 2040 IN 2017. THE ECONOMY WAS IN FULL POST RECESSION 24 25 SWING WE HAD RECORD LOW UNEMPLOYMENT ACROSS THE REGION BUT

RISING HOUSING PRICES AND AFFORDABLE WERE SERIOUS CONCERNS. 1 THE PLAN SET FORTH GOALS FOR 20 YEARS OF GROWTH STRATEGIES TO 2 ACHIEVE SUSTAINABILITY, EQUITY, AND ECONOMIC VIBRANCE, 3 FOCUSING ON TRANSPORTATION AND LAND USE. WHEN ABAG AND MTC 4 5 ADOPTED PLANNED BAY AREA 2050, THIS PAST OCTOBER, IN 2021, OUR WORLD LOOKED DIFFERENT. IT WAS CLEAR THAT WE NEEDED TO EXPAND 6 AND DEEPEN OUR EFFORTS ON SEVERAL KEY STRATEGIES, INCLUDING 7 8 EQUITY, GIVEN THE GROWING UNAFFORDABILITY OF HOUSING ACROSS OUR REGION. THE REGIONAL HOUSING NEEDS ASSESSMENT APPROVED BY 9 ABAG IN DECEMBER OF 2021 AND BY HCD IN JANUARY OF 2022 10 EXPANDED THE FOCUS ON OUR REGION'S AFFORDABLE HOUSING NEEDS. 11 MTC AND ABAG RESPONDED WITH AN EXTREMELY ROBUST TECHNICAL 12 ASSISTANCE PROGRAM TO HELP JURISDICTIONS MEET THEIR RHNA 13 GOALS. AND THE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE INCLUDES, AMONG OTHER 14 15 THINGS, COUNTY-BASED PLANNING COLLABORATIVES, A TECHNICAL 16 ASSISTANCE PORTAL WITH TOOL KITS TRAININGS AND DATA SETS AND EFFECTIVE TOOLS TO SELECT SITES FOR SUBMISSION AND HOUSING 17 ELEMENTS COMMUNICATIONS TO CREATE A CONSULTING BENCH AND 18 STREAMLINED CONTRACTING PROCESSES AND MUCH MORE. AND AS 19 PRESIDENT ARREGUIN SAID THERE IS A GREAT DEAL OF EXCELLENT 20 21 INFORMATION IN YOUR PACKETS. AND FINALLY AS ONE OF THE MOST RECENT DEVELOPMENTS IN THIS PROGRESSION OF REGIONAL ACTION 22 RELATED TO OUR HOUSING NEEDS, THE FULL LAUNCH OF THE BAY AREA 23 HOUSING FINANCE AUTHORITY OCCURRED RECENTLY WITH THE HELP OF A 24 2021 GRANT FROM THE STATE. AND BAHFA HAS REVENUE RAISING 25

POWERS THAT OUR JURISDICTIONS NEED TO PROVIDE MORE AFFORDABLE 1 HOUSING AND MEET OUR RHNA GOALS AND CREATE THE VISION 2 ARTICULATED IN PLANNED BAY AREA 2050. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. 3 BESIDES ITS FOCUS ON EOUITY AND HOUSING AFFORDABILITY, PLANNED 4 5 BAY AREA 2050 INCORPORATES TRANSPORTATION, ECONOMIC, ENVIRONMENTAL STRATEGIES, WITHIN A REGIONAL GROWTH FRAMEWORK, 6 AND OF COURSE OUR GOAL AND VISION IS TO KEEP OUR REGION 7 8 CONNECTED, DIVERSE, AND HEALTHY. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. AND, OF COURSE, IT'S NOT ENOUGH TO SET EXCELLENT GOALS. WE HAVE TO 9 HAVE EXCELLENT IMPLEMENTATION PLANS. THROUGH FOUR PRINCIPLE 10 MEASURES THAT COMPLIMENT AND REINFORCE EACH OTHER OUR 11 IMPLEMENTATION WORK INCLUDES CREATION OF A TRANSIT ORIENTED 12 COMMUNITIES POLICY, WHICH SUPPORTS TRANSIT RIDERSHIP, TRANSIT 13 EXPANSIONS, AND INVESTMENTS IN THE REGION, INCLUDING 14 15 INVESTMENTS IN HOUSING PRODUCTION AND AFFORDABLE HOUSING 16 PRESERVATION. THE ONE BAY AREA GRANT PROGRAM IS IN ITS THIRD ITERATION NOW PROVIDING FEDERAL TRANSPORTATION FUNDING TO 17 PROJECTS AND PROGRAMS THAT PURSUE THE GOALS OF TRANSIT AND 18 COMMUNITIES POLICY AND PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 OF COURSE WE HAVE 19 REGIONAL HOUSING TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE WHICH I DESCRIBED 20 21 EARLIER AND BAHFA WITH OUR ABILITY TO GENERATE SIGNIFICANT FUNDING FOR HOUSING. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. SO A LITTLE MORE 22 BACKGROUND ON BAHFA FOR THOSE WHO WE HAVEN'T SPOKEN WITH YET. 23 IT WAS CREATED BY STATE LEGISLATION IN 2019. OUR MANDATE IS TO 24 CREATE THE THREE PS PRODUCTION OF NEW HOUSING PRESERVATION OF 25

AFFORDABLE HOUSING AND PROTECTION OF ALL BAY AREA RESIDENTS. 1 2 WE ARE GOVERNED BY OUR BAHFA BOARD WHICH IS THE SAME 3 LEADERSHIP AS THE MTC COMMISSION AND THE ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD PLAYS AN INTEGRAL ROLE IN ALL REVENUE ACTIONS THAT BAHFA 4 5 TAKES. WE ALSO HAVE A NINE-MEMBER ADVISORY COMMITTEE. THE ABAG AND BAHFA BOARDS HAVE TO WORK TOGETHER TO PUT REVENUE MEASURES 6 ON THE BALLOT AND A.B. 1487 PRESCRIBES WHAT OUR REVENUE 7 8 RAISING AUTHORITY IS, HOW OUR APPROVALS WORK AND HOW EXPENDITURES MUST PROCEED. NEXT SLIDE. SO AS I MENTIONED, 9 10 BAHFA IS IN FULL OPERATION MODE NOW THANKS TO THE STATE GRANT AND WE HAVE HIRED STAFF AND ARE LAUNCHING FIVE PILOT PROGRAMS 11 TO GET US STARTED. AND THESE INCLUDE, FIRST, DOORWAY. IT'S A 12 REGIONAL ONLINE AFFORDABLE HOUSING APPLICATION PORTAL, WHICH 13 WE'RE REALLY EXCITED ABOUT. IT WILL HELP ANYONE LOOKING FOR 14 AFFORDABLE HOUSING DO SO IN THE MOST EASY MANNER POSSIBLE. 15 16 IT'S REALLY A -- CREATES BETTER EQUITY IN ITS EXPANSION OF ACCESS TO AFFORDABLE HOUSING OPPORTUNITIES. WE'RE ALSO 17 CREATING A REGIONAL PIPELINE DATABASE SHOWING ALL THE 18 AFFORDABLE PROJECTS IN THE WORKS IN OUR REGION, BUT THAT DON'T 19 YET HAVE ALL THE FUNDING THEY NEED. SO THIS WILL HELP US 20 21 SIGNIFICANTLY IN OUR PLANNING PROCESS. WE ARE LAUNCHING A PRESENTATION PILOT, AND WE'RE GOING PURSUE STATE FUNDS RIGHT 22 AWAY SO THAT WE CAN WORK WITH COMMUNITY-BASED ORGANIZATIONS TO 23 BUY AND REHAB EXISTING BUILDINGS AND CONVERT THEM TO 24 PERMANENTLY AFFORDABLE HOUSING. AND THEREBY PROTECT TENANTS 25

WHO MIGHT OTHERWISE BE AT RISK OF DISPLACEMENT. AND WE HAVE 1 2 BOTH AN ANTI-DISPLACEMENT AND A HOMELESSNESS PREVENTION PILOT. SO, BOTH OF THESE PROGRAMS WILL CREATE REGIONAL PARTNERSHIPS 3 THAT WILL HELP US ALIGN BETTER IN OUR EFFORTS TO KEEP PEOPLE 4 5 HOUSED AND PREVENT HOMELESSNESS. WE'RE GOING TO WORK TOGETHER WITH IN ALL THE JURISDICTIONS TO IDENTIFY RESOURCE GAPS, FIND 6 WAYS TO FILL THEM, AND STREAMLINE THE SYSTEMS WE CURRENTLY 7 8 HAVE IN PLACE TO PROTECT TENANTS AND PREVENT HOMELESSNESS. AND THIS IS ALL IN ANTICIPATION OF OUR PURSUIT OF RESOURCES IN 9 2024 AND BEYOND. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. SO, IN ADDITION TO THE 10 PILOTS, AND WHAT WE WOULD LIKE TO TALK ABOUT IS THAT POSSIBLE 11 2024 REGIONAL HOUSING MEASURE THAT WILL PROVIDE EVERY BAY AREA 12 JURISDICTION THE RESOURCES IT NEEDS TO HELP ACHIEVE OUR 13 HOUSING GOALS. AND PLACING A MEASURE ON THE BALLOT REQUIRES 14 THE COORDINATED ACTION OF BOTH THE ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD AND 15 16 THE BAHFA BOARD. NEXT SLIDE. AND IT'S REALLY IMPORTANT TO KNOW 17 THAT THE WAY THAT OUR ENABLING LEGISLATION, A.B. 1487 IS WRITTEN MEANS THAT COUNTIES WILL ULTIMATELY DETERMINE, 18 COUNTIES AND CITIES, WHAT PROJECTS ARE THE BEST INVESTMENTS 19 FOR THEIR JURISDICTIONS. BECAUSE 80% OF ALL THE REVENUE THAT 20 21 WE RAISE WILL RETURN TO THE COUNTY OF ORIGIN. BAHFA WILL RETAIN 20% OF REVENUES RAISED, AND FOR BOTH THE JURISDICTIONS 22 AND BAHFA, A.B. 1487 HAS CERTAIN EXPENDITURE REQUIREMENTS SO 23 THAT AT A MINIMUM, 52% OF THE MONEY RAISED WILL GO -- MUST GO 24 25 TO PRODUCTION, 15% TO AFFORDABLE HOUSING PRESERVATION, AND 5%

TO TENANT PROTECTIONS. AND THIS DOES LEAVE SOME UNALLOCATED 1 FUNDS WHICH PROVIDE JURISDICTIONS AND BAHFA SOME ADDITIONAL 2 3 FLEXIBILITY IN THEIR DECISION-MAKING ABOUT EXPENDITURES. NEXT SLIDE. THIS SLIDE PROVIDES AN ESTIMATE OF FUNDING THAT WOULD 4 5 GO TO COUNTIES AND ELIGIBLE CITIES WITH A \$10 BILLION BOND. IT'S AN UNPRECEDENTED AMOUNT OF MONEY FOR EVERY JURISDICTION. 6 AND WHAT'S SO CRITICAL AND ALSO UNPRECEDENTED IS THAT ALL 7 8 COUNTIES WOULD BE RECEIVING THESE VERY HIGH-LEVEL OF RESOURCES. NOT JUST ONE OR TWO COUNTIES THAT SUCCEED AT THE 9 BALLOT ON OCCASION. THIS FULL REGIONAL FUNDING MEASURE WOULD 10 ALLOW US, FOR THE FIRST TIME, TO ADDRESS OUR HOUSING NEEDS 11 TOGETHER AS A REGION. NEXT SLIDE. AND THIS SHOWS THE BREAK 12 DOWN OF THE HOUSING THAT WOULD GO TO BAHFA, AND THE 13 EXPENDITURE REQUIREMENTS PLACED UPON BAHFA'S FUNDING. NEXT 14 15 SLIDE. SO, ALSO, PLEASE KNOW THAT FOR A 2024 HOUSING MEASURE, 16 THERE IS SUBSTANTIAL GROUNDWORK THAT IS IN PLACE ALREADY; AND THIS INCLUDES CONSENSUS BUILDING THAT'S BEEN GOING ON FOR MANY 17 YEARS WHICH MAYOR ARREGUIN MENTIONED. WE HAVE ENABLING 18 LEGISLATION FOR A REVENUE MEASURE. THE BAY AREA POLLING THAT'S 19 DONE IN A VARIETY OF PLACES SHOWS THAT OUR RESIDENTS RANK 20 HOMELESSNESS AND HOUSING AMONG THEIR TOP CONCERNS. AND THERE 21 IS WORK THAT'S BEEN COMPLETED BY THE BAY AREA HOUSING FOR ALL 22 COALITION, ALSO KNOWN AS BAHA THAT IS REALLY CRITICAL. IT'S A 23 GROUP OF HOUSING ORGANIZATIONS AND STAKEHOLDERS WHO HAVE 24 25 ALREADY STARTED A FUND-RAISING CAMPAIGN FOR A HOUSING MEASURE.

AND IN ADDITION, THEY'RE PURSUING A STATEWIDE BALLOT MEASURE 1 THAT WOULD DO TWO IMPORTANT THINGS. FIRST IS THAT IT WOULD 2 3 LOWER THE VOTER THRESHOLD FOR PASSAGE OF A GENERAL OBLIGATION AFFORDABLE HOUSING BOND FROM 2/THIRDS TO A SIMPLE MAJORITY. 4 5 AND THE SECOND IS THAT IT WOULD EXPAND THE ELIGIBLE USES OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND FUNDING. RIGHT NOW YOU CAN ONLY USE 6 GENERAL OBLIGATION FUNDS FOR WHAT WE CALL "BRICKS AND MORTAR" 7 8 PURCHASE OR REHAB OF ACTUAL REAL PROPERTY. THIS WOULD ALLOW PROPERTY OWNERS TO ALSO HAVE A CAPITALIZED OPERATING RESERVES 9 WHICH GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS CAN'T FUND NOW BUT THAT WHICH 10 IS A CRITICAL PART OF ANY DEVELOPMENT NO MATTER WHETHER IT'S 11 AFFORDABLE OR FOR PROFIT. AND IT WOULD ALSO ENABLE AFFORDABLE 12 DEVELOPERS TO PAY FOR TENANT SUPPORTIVE SERVICES. NEXT SLIDE, 13 PLEASE. SO, WITH YOUR SUPPORT, WE WOULD CONTINUE TO OUTREACH 14 15 TO JURISDICTIONS. WE WOULD HOLD TOWN HALL PUBLIC INFORMATION 16 MEETINGS. WE WILL BE ADOPTING A BAHFA BUSINESS PLAN WITH ITS 17 INTEGRAL EQUITY FRAMEWORK. AND WE WOULD CREATE THE DRAFT DOCUMENTS REQUIRED FOR OUR BALLOT MEASURE. IN EARLY 2024, WE 18 WOULD CONDUCT MORE POLLING AND ASSUMING THERE IS FULL 19 AGREEMENT, WE WOULD TAKE ALL THE NECESSARY STEPS TO ENSURE 20 21 SUCCESS AT THE BALLOT. AND, AGAIN, THIS INCLUDES ACTION BY BOTH ABAG'S EXECUTIVE BOARD AND THE BAHFA BOARD. AND NEXT 22 SLIDE. ON A PARALLEL TRACK, THE BAHA COALITION WILL BE FUND-23 RAISING. THEY WILL BE BUILDING NEW COALITIONS THROUGHOUT THE 24 STATE, CONDUCTING POLLING, AS WELL. AND CONDUCTING THE 25

CAMPAIGN AND PUBLIC RELATIONS WORK THAT ARE ESSENTIAL TO 1 2 BALLOT MEASURES. ALSO FILING THE NECESSARY DOCUMENTS FOR THEIR STATEWIDE MEASURE. SO, TO CONCLUDE. AGAIN, WITH YOUR SUPPORT, 3 WE CAN COMMENCE THE PREPARATION WORK NECESSARY FOR A 2024 4 5 REGIONAL HOUSING MEASURE. AND WITH YOUR CONTINUED SUPPORT, WE WOULD DO EVERYTHING POSSIBLE TO ENSURE SUCCESS AT THE BALLOT 6 SO THAT, TOGETHER, AS A REGION, WE CAN MEET OUR HOUSING NEEDS. 7 8 AND THAT'S THE END OF MY PRESENTATION. AND I VERY MUCH LOOK FORWARD TO HEARING FROM YOU. THANK YOU. 9

KATE HARTLEY: COUNTIES HAVE SUPERVISORIAL CONTROL OVER THE 4 5 BALLOT PLACING THE MEASURES ON THE BALLOT WE WOULD ISSUE THE BOND ON THE DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDS COUNTIES WILL CREATE AN 6 EXPENDITURE PLAN AND THERE ARE CITIES ON THAT LIST AS WELL. 7 8 A.B. 1487 ALLOWS FOR THE THREE BIG CITIES IN OUR REGION TO HAVE THEIR OWN SEPARATE ALLOCATIONS, AS WELL AS ANY CITY THAT 9 HAS 30% OR MORE RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE VERY LOW INCOME RHNA 10 ALLOCATION. SO IT IS POPULATION-BASED. YOU'RE RIGHT, IN TERMS 11 OF WHERE ARE THE TAX DOLLARS -- WHERE IS THE TAX DOLLARS 12 COMING FROM TO PAY FOR THE BOND IS THEN THAT DETERMINES THE 13 VALUE OF THE ALLOCATION THAT GOES BACK TO THAT COUNTY AS AN 14 15 80% SHARE.

JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: OKAY. THANK YOU VERY MUCH.
WE'LL GO NEXT TO SUPERVISOR SPERING.

JAMES P. SPERING: KATE, THANK YOU FOR THE PRESENTATION. MY QUESTION IS SIMILAR TO MAYOR YOUNG'S. COMING BACK TO SOLANO COUNTY IF VALLEJO IS THE LARGEST CITY, WILL THEY GET THEIR RETURN TO SOURCE OR CAN IT BE DISTRIBUTED THROUGHOUT SOLANO COUNTY, THE TOTAL THAT COMES INTO THE COUNTY?

KATE HARTLEY: I'M SORRY. COMMISSIONER SPERING. YOU CAN REPEAT?
 I'M NOT SURE I UNDERSTOOD THE QUESTION.

JAMES P. SPERING: THE RETURN TO SOURCE, WHEN IT COMES BACK TO
THE COUNTY, DOES IT GET DISTRIBUTED THROUGH THE CITIES AS A
RETURN TO SOURCE WHETHER IT'S GENERATED IN THAT CITY?

7

8 KATE HARTLEY: THE COUNTIES WILL BE CREATING EXPENDITURE PLANS AND SO WE WILL BE WORKING WITH THE COUNTIES AND THE CITIES. 9 10 THE LEGISLATION IS NOT -- DOES NOT PRESCRIBE THAT THE CITIES WITHIN A COUNTIES APPROVE THE 30 -- THE CITIES THAT HAVE 30% 11 RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE RHNA OBLIGATION, HAVE THEIR OWN 12 ALLOCATIONS. AND, SO, IT'S GOING TO BE A COLLABORATIVE 13 PROCESS. AND I DID WANT TO CLARIFY ONE THING THEY SAID, THAT 14 THE RETURN TO SOURCE, WELL, IT'S TIED TO POPULATION. IT'S 15 16 REALLY A FUNCTION OF ASSESSED EVALUATION IN THAT COUNTY. BECAUSE THAT'S HOW THE BOND PROCEEDS ARE SIZED. 17

18

19 JAMES P. SPERING: IN MY COUNTY WE HAVE FOUR CITIES AND THEY 20 HAVE NEEDS AND THE THREE LARGEST CITIES COULD ABSORB ALL OF 21 THIS. SO THERE HAS TO BE SOME FORMULA THAT THE SMALLER CITIES 22 GET THEIR SHARE TO DEAL WITH THIS AND THEY HAVE THE BIGGEST 23 CHALLENGES. THAT'S ONE. AND TWO IS ON THE 20% GOING BACK TO 24 BAHFA, IS THERE -- ARE YOU GOING TO SEPARATE A PORTION THAT 25 CAN BE ALLOCATED TO THE SMALLER CITIES? THE LARGER CITIES WILL

EAT THAT WHOLE 20%. I HOPE THERE IS SOME CONSIDERATION FOR HOW
 WE DEAL WITH THE SMALLER CITIES, BECAUSE IN MY OPINION, THEY
 HAVE THE BIGGEST CHALLENGE PRODUCING THE VERY LOW-INCOME
 HOUSING.

KATE HARTLEY: I AGREE. AND WE ARE WORKING RIGHT NOW, WE'RE 6 REACHING OUT TO ALL THE JURISDICTION JURISDICTIONS. WE'RE 7 8 REACHING OUT TO THE CITIES WE WANT TO MAKE SURE THAT EQUITY IS AT THE FOREFRONT SO THOSE UNDER-RESOURCED AREAS HAVE ACCESS TO 9 THESE FUNDS. IT'S PART OF THE REASON WHY WE'RE BUILDING AN 10 EQUITY FRAMEWORK INTO FOUNDERING PLANS. AND THIS IS GOING TO 11 TAKE COORDINATION AND BAHFA STAFF ARE REALLY INTENT ON WORKING 12 CLOSELY WITH ALL THE CITIES AND COUNTIES TO MAKE SURE THAT THE 13 EXPENDITURE PLANS THAT THE COUNTIES COME UP WITH ACCOUNT FOR 14 15 THE ISSUES THAT YOU HAVE RAISED.

JAMES P. SPERING: WITHOUT THE SMALL CITY SUPPORT IT'S NOT GOING TO PASS. THERE HAS GOT TO BE RECOGNITION OF THE SMALL CITIES AND THEIR NEEDS. THANK YOU KATE FOR THE PRESENTATION. 20

JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: THANK YOU SUPERVISOR SPERING.
ALL GOOD POINTS THESE IS EXACTLY THE FEEDBACK WE WANT TO GET
AND ALL THIS COULD BE WORKED OUT WITH THE DEVELOPING
EXPENDITURE PLAN IN BAHFA AND WITH THE 20% FUNDS MAKING SURE
THERE IS EQUITY HOW THOSE FUNDS ARE DISTRIBUTED TO THE SMALLER

CITIES AND EVEN MEDIUM SIZED CITIES ARE GOING TO BE ABLE TO
 APPLY FOR THOSE FUNDS INCLUDING SOME OF THE LARGER CITIES
 DIRECT ALLOCATIONS. THAT WAS A GOOD QUESTION. COUNCILMEMBER
 SHOWALTER.

6 SPEAKER: I WAS WONDERING WHAT THE TAX BILL WOULD BE FOR ABOUT 7 \$100,000 VALUATION? WHAT KIND OF MAGNITUDE ARE WE TALKING? 8

KATE HARTLEY: OUR TAX ACCOUNTANT IS WORKING ON THAT RIGHT NOW 9 10 IT'S A FUNCTION OF INTEREST RATE. AS YOU KNOW, THE INTEREST RATES RIGHT NOW AREN'T WHERE WE WANT THEM TO BE. WE WILL HAVE 11 A SCHEDULE OF POTENTIAL VALUES AND THAT WILL BE PART OF OUR 12 OUTREACH CAMPAIGN SO THAT TAXPAYERS KNOW VERY CLEARLY WHAT THE 13 TAX BILL WILL BE. ALSO, BECAUSE THE BONDS WON'T BE ISSUED ALL 14 AT ONCE. SO, STARTING OUT, WE'LL HAVE AN INITIAL ISSUANCE TO 15 16 FUNDS BECAUSE IT TAKES TIME TO DISBURSE MONEY AND EXPEND THE MONEY, SO STARTING OUT, THE TAX OBLIGATION WILL BE LOW. IT 17 WILL PEAK AT A CERTAIN POINT, AND THEN IT WILL DROP OFF AS THE 18 PRINCIPLE IS PAID BACK. SO WE HAVE ALL THAT AND WILL BE 19 SHARING IT WITH JURISDICTIONS AS PART OF THE OUTREACH. 20

PAT SHOWALTER: THAT LEADS ME TO ANOTHER QUESTION, WHAT IS THE PLANNED EXPENDITURE PERIOD FOR THESE FUNDS? WE HAD A MEASURE IN SANTA CLARA COUNTY OF A BILLED TO PRODUCE LOW-INCOME HOUSING TO SOLVE OUR HOMELESS PROBLEM. AND WE WERE REQUIRED TO

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SPEND THAT MONEY, I BELIEVE, IN LESS THAN A DECADE. SO IS

2 THERE SOME TIME FRAME CONSIDERED FOR THIS? 3 KATE HARTLEY: YES. WE HAVE BEEN LOOKING AT A TEN-YEAR PERIOD 4 5 WITH FIVE ISSUANCES OF BONDS OVER THAT TIME. SO THAT EVERY TWO YEARS, WE WOULD HAVE A NEW ISSUANCE. BECAUSE AS WE HAVE SEEN 6 IN ALL THE COUNTIES THAT HAVE HAD LARGE BOND MEASURES LIKE 7 8 SANTA CLARA COUNTY, IT TAKES SOME TIME TO GET THE MONEY OUT THE DOOR AND IN THE GROUND. SO, YES, IT'S LOOKING AT A TEN 9 10 YEAR PERIOD. 11 PAT SHOWALTER: THANK YOU SO MUCH. 12 13 JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: TO ADD, PAT, A LOT OF THE 14 15 DIRECTION ABOUT HOW FUNDS ARE ALLOCATED WAS PRESCRIBED IN THE 16 BALLOT MEASURE. WITH 80% GOING BACK TO THE 20 AND 20% INTO A REGIONAL POT. BUT THE DETAILS ABOUT TRANCHES AND MORE 17 SPECIFICS ABOUT HOW MUCH MONEY IS PRIORITIZED TO SMALLER 18 CITIES THOSE ARE THINGS WE'RE WORKING OUT IF WE DECIDE TO 19 PROCEED WITH A MEASURE OVER THE NEXT YEAR OR TWO. SO THIS IS 20 REALLY HELPFUL FEEDBACK AS WE'RE BEGINNING THIS CONVERSATION. 21 I JUST WANT TO CLARIFY THAT WE'RE AT THE BEGINNING OF THE 22 PROCESS THAT WE HAVE NOT YET MADE A DECISION TO PUT A MEASURE 23 ON THE BALLOT. AND I THINK THE GOAL OF TODAY WAS TO GET INPUT 24

25 FROM LOCAL GOVERNMENT LEADERS ABOUT, IS THIS A GOOD IDEA, WHAT

QUESTIONS AND CONCERNS DO PEOPLE HAVE, AND SO I THINK THIS IS
 VERY HELPFUL FEEDBACK.

JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: GOING TO COUNCILMEMBER MENDOZA
FOLLOWED BY MAYOR BUTT.

SPEAKER: I HAVE A QUESTION REGARDING ALLOCATIONS WE KEEP 7 8 REFERENCING THE ALLOCATION NUMBERS THEY ARE AUDITED BUT OVERSTATED. WHEN DO WE START SEEING TRICKLE DOWN FROM THE 9 RESET OF THE NUMBERS AND EXPECT TO LOOK AT THOSE NUMBERS TO 10 COME UP WITH A TRUE ALLOCATION? WE WANT TO DO IT ON A CORRECT 11 BASIS. DO WE KNOW WHEN THAT'S GOING HAPPEN? I WOULDN'T WANT TO 12 TELL MY VOTERS TO VOTE FOR SOMETHING WHEN THE BASE NUMBERS ARE 13 14 INCORRECT TO BEGIN WITH.

JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: THIS DOESN'T DICTATE HOW THE BOND FUNDS ARE ALLOCATED BUT I THINK YOUR YE IS VALID. IS THERE ANYONE FROM STAFF, MR. MALONEY OR GENERAL COUNSEL HAVE SOME INFORMATION THAT'S AROUND -- I KNOW THERE IS AN AUDIT BEING CONDUCTED OF THE RHNA PROCESS.

22 SPEAKER: THE REPORT IS OUT THERE, THE AUDIT IS DONE. AND THE 23 AUDITOR SAID --

JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: THE JOINT LEGISLATIVE
 COMMITTEE IS SEEKING FEEDBACK ON THE RHNA PROCESS.

MATT MALONEY: THIS IS MATT MALONEY DIRECTOR OF REGIONAL 4 5 PLANNING FOR MTC AND ABAG. WE ARE AWARE OF THE AUDIT REPORT THE AUDIT LOOKED AT DIFFERENT REGIONS THROUGHOUT CALIFORNIA 6 AND DID NOT EXAMINE THE BAY AREA SPECIFICALLY. I WOULD SAY THE 7 8 FINDINGS OF THE REPORT WERE KIND OF NUANCED IT DIDN'T NECESSARILY STATE THE NUMBERS WERE INFLATED IT DID STATE THERE 9 10 WERE SITUATIONS WHERE THAT MAYBE OCCURRED BUT ALSO SITUATIONS WHERE NUMBERS WEREN'T AS HIGH AS THEY SHOULD HAVE BEEN IN 11 DIFFERENT REGIONS OF THE STATE. SO IT'S A NUANCED REPORT. WE 12 ARE AWARE THAT HCD IS WORKING ON SOME EFFORTS OF A RHNA REFORM 13 TO KIND OF GET READY FOR CYCLE SEVEN. WE DON'T HAVE A LOT OF 14 15 INSIGHT ON THOSE EFFORTS BUT WE ARE WORKING WITH THEIR STAFF 16 AND HCD STAFF AND ARE HAPPY TO PARTICIPATE IN THAT PROCESS. AND IT'S A CONVERSATION THAT'S HAPPENING AT THE ABAG EXECUTIVE 17 BOARD DIGGING INTO METHODOLOGY FACTORS LOOKING AHEAD TO CYCLE 18 SEVEN THINKING ABOUT THE IMPORTANCE OF RESILIENCE AND OTHER 19 ISSUES. AT A STAFF LEVEL WE'RE TRACKING THAT CLOSELY AND 20 21 COMMUNICATING WITH HCD AND WE'LL REPORT BACK TO THE BOARD OR THIS BODY WHEN WE HAVE MORE INFORMATION. 22

24 SPEAKER: OKAY. SO JUST -- I MEAN, WE WERE ASKED FOR FEEDBACK
25 SO MY FEEDBACK IS, ANYTHING THAT USES THE RHNA NUMBERS, MY

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CITY WOULD BE CAUTIOUS ABOUT. I THINK THAT WE NEED THE RIGHT 1 2 NUMBER IF WE'RE GOING MOVE FORWARD ESPECIALLY WHEN IT COMES TO 3 DOLLARS AND BALLOT MEASURES. WE NEED THE RIGHT NUMBERS. WILL MY SECOND THING IS WHEN IT COMES TO THE DOLLARS, SOMEONE ELSE 4 5 MENTIONED KIND OF THE CONCERN ABOUT CITIES VERSUS COUNTIES, I HAVE CONCERN ABOUT IT JUST BEING SOLELY THE COUNTY DECIDING 6 WHERE THE DOLLARS ARE GOING TO GO. I THINK IF WE'RE GOING TO 7 8 PUT IT ON THE BALLOT CITIES NEED TO BE ON SOME KIND OF PANEL THAT DECIDES, LIKE IN CONTRA COSTA, BRENTWOOD, ANTIOCH, 9 10 PITTSBURG ALL MEMBERS SHOULD HAVE A DECISION WHERE THE DOLLARS GO AND WITH MEASURE X I'M NOT SURE I'M HAPPY WITH THE WAY THE 11 BOARD OF SUPERVISORS ALLOCATED THE DOLLARS ON MEASURE X WE 12 NEED A SAY IN THE PROCESS OF THE DOLLARS AT COUNTY LEVEL. MY 13 LAST COMMENT IN REGARDS TO ADMINISTRATION EXPENSES WHAT 14 PERCENTAGE -- ARE YOU SAYING 20% IS ADMINISTRATIVE? AND 80%? 15 16 OR WHAT PERCENTAGE DO YOU THINK IS GOING TO BE ADMINISTRATIVE OF THE TOTAL DOLLARS COLLECTED. 17

19 KATE HARTLEY: ADMINISTRATIVE SET-ASIDE IS 5% 20% IS FOR 20 PRODUCTION PRESERVATION AND TENANT PROTECTIONS. WE WILL BE 21 SPENDING MONEY AND TAKING INTO ACCOUNT ALL OF THE FEEDBACK 22 THAT YOU'RE PROVIDING, THE EQUITY GOALS, THE MAKING SURE THAT 23 MONEY IS GOING TO THE TOTALITY OF THE REGION, NOT JUST 24 CONCENTRATED IN INDIVIDUAL PLACES.

SPEAKER: OKAY. AND I WOULD ALSO LIKE TO KNOW WHAT SAFEGUARDS
 THERE IS GOING TO BE IN REGARDS TO ADMINISTRATION, WHERE THE
 DOLLARS ARE BEING SPENT MAKING SURE EVERYTHING IS COPACETIC WE
 HAVE PROGRAMS THAT SOMETIMES GO OFF THE RAILS AND DON'T DO
 WHAT THEY'RE SUPPOSED TO DO SO SAFEGUARDS WOULD BE FANTASTIC.
 THOSE ARE MY COMMENTS. THANK YOU.

8 JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: WE HAD A DISCUSSION AND IT WILL BE A CONTINUED TOPIC OF DISCUSSION AT THE ABAG EXECUTIVE 9 10 BOARD ABOUT THE LAST RHNA PROCESS AND SPECIFIC POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE STATE TO IMPROVE THE PROCESS FOR 11 EXAMPLE, CONSIDERING FIRE RISK AS A FACTOR IS AN ISSUE AND 12 CAME UP OFTEN IN SOME OF THE APPEALS OUR INTENT IS TO TRY TO 13 COME WITH A SET OF RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE STATE AROUND 14 15 IMPROVEMENTS EITHER IN THE STATUTE OR THE ACTUAL 16 ADMINISTRATION PROCESS TAKING INTO CONSIDERATION INPUT WE HAVE HEARD DIRECTLY FROM LOCAL GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS EVEN THOUGH 17 ACTUAL RHNA ALLOCATIONS HAVE BEEN ISSUED WE ARE INTERESTED IN 18 CONTINUING TO ENGAGE WITH THE STATE AND HELPING SHAPE THE 19 PROCESS IN THE FUTURE. WE'LL GO TO MAYOR BUTT NEXT. 20

TOM BUTT: I'M NOT SURE THIS IS AN EFFECTIVE STRATEGY AND I'LL TELL YOU WHY. CALIFORNIA HAS THE WHOLE STATE ABOUT 160,000 HOMELESS PEOPLE AT ANY GIVEN TIME. AND IF YOU -- AND OF COURSE, THE DEFINITION OF HOMELESS IS NOT HAVING A HOME. IF

YOU TAKE THAT 160,000 AND YOU MULTIPLE IT BY THE AVERAGE COST 1 A ONE BEDROOM APARTMENT IN CALIFORNIA, YOU GET ABOUT A BILLION 2 DOLLARS A YEAR. SO, FOR \$1 BILLION A YEAR, WHICH IS ABOUT HALF 3 OF 1% OF OUR STATE BUDGET, WE COULD HOUSE EVERY HOMELESS 4 5 PERSON IN CALIFORNIA. AND I THINK THAT THIS PROPOSAL THAT WE'RE TALKING ABOUT IS BASICALLY A BOX OF BAND-AIDS. I THINK 6 THAT WE'RE GOING TO BE STUCK IN CALIFORNIA WITH SOME KIND OF 7 8 SUBSIDY FOR HOMELESS PEOPLE FOR A LONG, LONG TIME. AND I THINK WE NEED A PROGRAM THAT'S SORT OF SIMILAR TO THE HUD SECTION-9 10 EIGHT PROGRAM. WHERE PEOPLE THAT HAVE INCOME QUALIFICATIONS GET A SUBSIDY, IS THEY GET A PLACE TO LIVE. AND THAT WILL 11 DRIVE THE PRIVATE MARKET TO BUILD THOSE PLACES AND TO RENT 12 THEM TO PEOPLE. I THINK THAT'S THE ONLY WAY WE'RE GOING TO GET 13 OUT OF THIS. YOU KNOW? I'M GOING TO BE OUT OF OFFICE IN SIX 14 15 MONTHS. AND, SO, I'M NOT GOING TO HAVE A VOTE ON IT. BUT 16 EXCEPT AS A CITIZEN.

17

18 JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: YOU ARE GOING TO HAVE A VOTE, 19 POTENTIALLY.

20

TOM BUTT: I JUST THINK WE'RE GOING IN THE WRONG DIRECTION. I THINK ONE WAY OR ANOTHER, YOU KNOW, HALF OF 1% OF OUR STATE BUDGET WOULD HOUSE EVERY HOMELESS PERSON IN THE STATE. AND I THINK WE'RE JUST STUCK WITH IT. WE'RE EITHER STUCK WITH IT OR WE'RE GOING TO HAVE A HOMELESS PROBLEM FOREVER. THANK YOU.

JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: THANK YOU MAYOR BUTT FOR YOUR

IS THERE SOME KIND OF COLLABORATION SO WE END UP WITH 12 ONE BALLOT MEASURE NOT MULTIPLE BALLOT MEASURES? AND I WOULD 13 LIKE TO TAKE A MINUTE TO RESPOND TO MAYOR BUTT, IN THE 14 15 LANGUAGE OF SAYING THAT WE'RE STUCK WITH TAKING CARE OF PEOPLE 16 EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS. I THINK USING THE PHRASE STUCK IS A PRETTY NEGATIVE PHRASE. AND I THINK WE NEED TO BE CAREFUL OF 17 THE LANGUAGE THAT WE USE. THANK YOU. 18

JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: THANK YOU, KATE, DID YOU WANT
TO RESPOND TO SOME OF THE QUESTIONS?

KATE HARTLEY: YES. WE ARE WORKING WITH JURISDICTIONS ABOUT NOT
HAVING COMPETING BOND MEASURES ON THE BALLOT. THAT'S VERY

BECAUSE IT'S THE SMALL CITIES OUESTION. IT'S THE 4 5 COUNTY EXPENDITURES MAKING SURE WHERE THE MONEY IS GOING MAKING SURE WE'RE ALL IN SYNC AND WE DON'T HAVE COMPETING 6 MEASURES ON THE BALLOT. THERE'S A LOT OF WORK TO DO AND THAT'S 7 8 AN IMPORTANT PART.

18 CLERK, FRED CASTRO: THERE ARE NO MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC WITH 19 THEIR HAND RAISED, AND THERE WAS NO PUBLIC COMMENT SUBMITTED 20 ON THIS ITEM.

21

JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: WE'LL NOW PROCEED TO ITEM C LISTENING SESSION ON A POTENTIAL 2024 HOUSING MEASURE. AND THIS IS INTENDED TO BE A CONVERSATION ON HOUSING CHALLENGES AND HOW A REGIONAL HOUSING BALLOT MEASURE AND OTHER REGIONAL

HOUSING PROGRAMS CAN ASSIST LOCAL JURISDICTIONS. THIS IS AN 1 INFORMATIONAL ITEM. AND NOW THAT WE HAVE LEARNED ABOUT THE 2 POTENTIAL FOR A HOUSING BOND MEASURE, WE WOULD LIKE TO SPEND 3 SOME TIME WITH THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY HEARING FROM YOU ALL. WE 4 5 ARE COLLECTING YOUR OUESTIONS AND COMMENTS TO HELP INFORM THE WORK THAT WE WILL BE ENGAGED IN OVER THE NEXT TWO YEARS. 6 REALLY WANT TO GET YOUR PERSPECTIVE ABOUT YOUR THOUGHTS ABOUT 7 8 A BALLOT MEASURE. WHAT QUESTIONS YOU HAVE, HOW COULD THIS ASSIST YOUR COMMUNITY. AND TO START THIS CONVERSATION I'M 9 10 HOPING THAT A FEW OF OUR MEMBERS WILL SHARE THEIR IDEA ABOUT HOW WE CAN WORK TOGETHER TO NOT JUST ADDRESS OUR REGIONAL 11 HOUSING CHALLENGES, BUT TO HELP ADVANCE A REGIONAL HOUSING 12 MEASURE. SO, VICE PRESIDENT RAMOS, I WOULD LIKE TO GO TO YOU 13 FIRST TO SEE IF YOU HAVE ANY -- ACTUALLY, I'LL GO TO MAYOR 14 15 WORTH FIRST. I KNOW THAT YOU HAVE TO GO TO A BARC MEETING. 16 I'LL GO TO YOU THEN VICE PRESIDENT RAMOS.

AMY R. WORTH: THANK YOU. FIRST I WANT TO THANK EVERYBODY FOR 18 YOUR COMMENTS IN THE PREVIOUS ITEM. THEY WILL HELP INFORM THE 19 NEXT PHASE AND STAGES WE'RE GOING TO GO THROUGH REGION NAMELY, 20 21 AND IN OUR LOCAL COMMUNITIES. SO I'M HERE REPRESENTING ONE OF THE SMALLER CITIES IN THE REGION. SO I REALLY APPRECIATE THE 22 COMMENTS ABOUT PROVIDING FUNDING FOR THE SMALLER COMMUNITIES. 23 THROUGH OUR RECEIPT OF THE ABAG GRANT WE WERE ABLE TO 24 INCLUDING INCORPORATING INTO OUR DRAFT HOUSING ELEMENT WE WERE 25

ABLE TO REACH OUT TO THE COMMUNITIES AND SCHOOL DISTRICTS IN 1 OUR COMMUNITY SO WE IDENTIFIED SITES TO ZONE FOR BUILDING OF 2 AFFORDABLE HOUSING. AND YET WE HAVE NO MONEY. WE'RE A VERY 3 SMALL CITY. WE DON'T HAVE IN LIEU FEES AND WE DON'T HAVE --4 5 AND OF COURSE REDEVELOPMENT IS GONE FOR ALL OF US. SO THE ADVANTAGE FOR COMMUNITIES LIKE OURS AND A LOT OF COMMUNITIES 6 IS TO PROVIDE A WAY LOCALLY WHERE WE CAN GET LOCAL FUNDS THEN 7 8 WORKING WITH OUR NON-PROFIT HOUSING DEVELOPMENT PARTNERS LEVERAGE THOSE DOLLARS STATEWIDE AND FEDERALLY TO BE ABLE TO 9 10 DO THIS. SO, WE HAVE THESE RHNA SITES, AND WE HAVE, ACTUALLY, SOME CURRENT AFFORDABLE HOUSING EFFORTS GOING ON THAT LACK THE 11 FUNDING. SO WE HAVE BEEN ABLE TO IDENTIFY POTENTIAL LAND, BUT 12 WE REALLY NEED THE FUNDING TO BE ABLE TO PRODUCE THESE 13 PROJECTS. AND I KNOW, LIKE, ALL OF OUR CITIES IN THE AREA, WE 14 15 HAVE HAD SUCCESSFUL PARTNERSHIPS WITH THE NON-PROFIT HOUSING 16 DEVELOPERS AND BUILDING, YOU KNOW, PROJECTS. LOOK AT ALL THE CONTRA COSTA CITIES THAT HAVE BEEN ABLE TO DO THIS OVER THE 17 DECADES. BUT WITH THE DEMISE OF REDEVELOPMENT, THOSE TOOLS --18 A LOT OF THE TOOLS ARE GONE. THEN WE HAVE OUR CITIES WE'RE 19 20 TALKING ABOUT, WE HAVE GOT OLD APARTMENT BUILDINGS OR HOTELS 21 THAT WE CAN CONVERT TO EXISTING -- TO QUALITY AFFORDABLE HOUSING AND PERPETUITY. SO, THE PRODUCTION AND THE 22 PRESERVATION AND THE PROTECTIONS ARE REALLY IMPORTANT IN THAT. 23 SO, AGAIN, WE NEED THE FINANCIAL TOOLS TO BE ABLE TO DO THIS 24 25 IN OUR COMMUNITY, AND I THINK THAT THIS WILL BE REALLY HELPFUL

IN TERMS OF PROVIDING FUND THEN THAT CAN BE LEVERAGED. SO, 1 2 THANK YOU. 3 JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: THANK YOU SO MUCH, MAYOR 4 WORTH. I'M GOING TO GO NEXT TO VICE PRESIDENT RAMOS, THEN 5 COUNCILMEMBER ROMERO, THEN MAYOR YOUNG. VICE PRESIDENT RAMOS? 6 OKAY. WHY DON'T WE GO TO COUNCILMEMBER ROMERO? 7 8 BELIA RAMOS: MY APOLOGIES. 9 10 JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: THERE YOU GO. YOU ARE HERE. 11 GREAT. 12 13 BELIA RAMOS: MY APOLOGIES. I JUST WANTED TO SAY, YOU KNOW, ON 14 15 BEHALF OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD HAVING BEEN IN THESE 16 CONVERSATIONS FOR A LONG TIME, I KNOW THAT THERE ARE A LOT OF CONCERNS ABOUT THE RHNA PROCESS. AND AS A REPRESENTATIVE FROM 17 THE COUNTY OF NAPA AND HAVING SERVED ON THE ADMINISTRATIVE 18 COMMITTEE, I CAN TELL YOU, WE HAVE HEARD YOU LOUD AND CLEAR, 19 20 AND ON BEHALF OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD, WE HAVE UNDERTAKEN BEING ABLE TO LOOK FORWARD INTO THE NEXT RHNA CYCLE PROCESS, NOT 21 WORK FOR THE ACTUAL DESIGNATIONS OF WHAT THOSE HIGH PRIORITY 22 AREAS ARE, HIGH-RESOURCE AREAS ARE. ACTUALLY HAPPENS RIGHT 23 NOW. AND SO WE'RE GOING TO BE WORKING DILIGENTLY. SO, WHILE I 24 KNOW THAT THE CORE PURPOSE OF THE BAHFA IS THAT THERE IS AN 25

INTERSECTION IN THE DISCUSSION WITH RHNA, WE ARE LOOKING AT 1 THE RHNA CALCULATION PROCESS QUITE CAREFULLY, UNDERSTANDING 2 3 THAT WITH THE IMPACTS OF CLIMATE CHANGE, OUR DESIRES TO CREATE A MORE RESILIENT FUTURE THAT WE ARE GOING TO BE UNDERTAKING 4 THAT. AND I ALSO WANTED TO COMMENT, THERE WERE A NUMBER OF 5 QUESTIONS IN TERMS OF THE ALLOCATIONS TO A LOCAL 6 JURISDICTIONS, AND TO -- AND THE ADMINISTRATIVE CHARGES OVER 7 8 TO BAHFA, ABAG, MTC. AND, YOU KNOW, ONE OF THE GREAT THINGS --AND I'M GOING TO GO AHEAD AND SAY IT OUITE CELEBRATORY IN ITS 9 10 NATURE IS THAT WHEN THE EXECUTIVE BOARD, LAST NIGHT, TOOK THIS UNDERTAKING TO REFER THIS MATTER OVER TO THE HOUSING 11 COMMITTEE, WHO WILL NOW BE CHAIRED BY COUNCILMEMBER ROMERO OF 12 EAST PALO ALTO, IT WAS A GREAT SIGNIFICANT MOMENT FOR US, 13 BECAUSE THIS HAS BEEN YEARS IN THE MAKING AND WE'RE SO GRAVE 14 TO THEN ASSEMBLYMEMBER DAVID C. FOR TAKING THIS LEADERSHIP 15 POSITION, WORKING WITH ABAG MTC, AND TO ALL OF OUR NON-PROFIT 16 17 AGENCIES WHO ARE CONTINUING TO WORK ALONGSIDE US, BUT REALLY BE GREAT ADVOCATES TO MAKE SURE THAT NOT THE ENTIRE BURDEN OF 18 THIS RESTS WITH ABAG. I WANT TO GIVE A SHOUT OUT TO BAY AREA 19 HOUSING FOR ALL, WHO HAS BEEN VERY INSTRUMENTAL IN REACHING 20 OUT TO PARTNER JURISDICTIONS MAKING SURE THAT NONE OF US, EVEN 21 THE SMALL ONES LIKE NAPA ARE NOT LEFT BEHIND. THANK YOU. 22 23

JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: OKAY. THANK YOU. WE'LL GO NEXT
TO COUNCILMEMBER ROMERO, FOLLOWED BY MAYOR YOUNG.

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2 CARLOS ROMERO: I COULDN'T AGREE MORE WITH VICE PRESIDENT 3 RAMOS. THE STARS ARE BEGINNING TO ALIGN IS THEY'RE ALIGNING BECAUSE ABAG AND MTC, AND BAY AREA HOUSING FOR ALL AND OTHER 4 5 GROUPS, MPH, AND HLC, AND I COULD KEEP GOING DOWN THE LINE, HAVE ACTUALLY STARTED A CONCERTED EFFORT TO WORK ON THE ISSUE 6 IN ALL 101 CITIES ON THIS PROBLEM OVER SEVERAL DECADES AND WE 7 8 IN THE CITY OF EAST PALO ALTO, VERY SMALL CITY ABOUT 31,000 PEOPLE, 8,000 UNITS OF HOUSING, A LOW-INCOME COMMUNITY THAT 9 10 NOW HAS ITS MEDIAN INCOME MEDIAN PRICE FOR HOUSING IS A LITTLE UNDER A MILLION DOLLARS CLEARLY UNOBTAINABLE FOR MANY WORKING 11 CLASS FOLKS IN THE NINE COUNTY BAY AREA NOT TO MENTION, EVEN 12 FOR MIDDLE INCOME FOLKS. AND I THINK THAT THIS PARTICULAR 13 APPROACH OF DOING A LARGE TEN BILLED -- OR EVEN SLIGHTLY 14 15 LARGER BOND, THAT GETS A PORTIONED OUT IN A FASHION THAT'S 16 FAIR AND EOUITABLE THROUGHOUT THE COUNTIES MAKES HUGE SENSE. AND FOR US IN EAST PALO ALTO WE HAVE PUT IN ABOUT \$20 MILLION 17 OF OUR OWN MONEY TO DEVELOP ABOUT 270 UNITS OF WHICH HALF OF 18 THOSE ARE IN CONSTRUCTION AND ACTUALLY WILL BE OPENED IN ABOUT 19 NINE MONTHS AND ANOTHER 135 AT THIS POINT, WE ARE WAITING FOR 20 21 THE FINAL PIECE OF FUNDING FROM THE STATE. SO, WITH THIS ADDITIONAL MONEY, WE FEEL THAT WE WOULD BE ABLE TO MEET THE 22 ADDITIONAL NEED AND SOURCE OUT THESE HOUSING UNITS TO NON-23 PROFIT HOUSING DEVELOPMENT ORGANIZATIONS LIKE EDEN AND MID-24 PEN. WE COULD GO DOWN THE LINE. THERE IS CAPACITY WITHIN THE 25

NINE COUNTIES TO DEVELOP THESE UNITS IF WE HAD THE ADDITIONAL 1 MONEY THAT WOULD CLOSE THAT GAP. AS I SAID WE HAVE PUT IN 2 MONEY, I KNOW MANY OF THE 101 CITIES IN THE BAY AREA HAVE 3 LOCAL MONEY THAT THEY CAN PUT INTO THIS, IT'S JUST NOT ENOUGH 4 5 TO GET US TO THE FINISH LINE ON DEVELOPING THE LOWER AND LOW-INCOME, AND EVEN THE LOW-INCOME HOUSING THAT IS NEEDED. I 6 AGREE WITH SOME OF THE COMMENTS AROUND THE HOMELESS ISSUE. BUT 7 8 I THINK THAT WE CAN MAKE A HUGE DENT IN THOSE ISSUES THAT ALL OF OUR COMMUNITIES ARE EXPERIENCING WITH THIS MONEY TO ADDRESS 9 THAT HOMELESS CONCERN, AND TO PREVENT HOMELESSNESS BY 10 DEVELOPING THE HOUSING NECESSARY THAT IS AFFORDABLE AT A LEVEL 11 THAT PEOPLE WILL NOT BE STRUGGLING TO PAY 60 AND 70% OF THEIR 12 RENT TOWARDS HOUSING. AND THIS BOND, AGAIN, WILL GET US THERE. 13 I THINK THE DEVIL IS IN THE DETAILS. IT'S WHY, BETWEEN BAHFA 14 15 AND THE HOUSING COMMITTEE, ABAG, AND THIS GENERAL ASSEMBLY, 16 AND THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE, WE CAN CRAFT THOSE DETAILS SO THAT WHEN WE GO TO THE BALLOT IN 2024, ALL 101 CITIES WILL 17 HAVE ACCESS TO FUNDING NECESSARY TO HOUSE OUR -- AND THIS 18 REALLY IS TEACHERS AND IT'S GARDENERS, AND IT'S NURSES. SO 19 THIS IS A VALUABLE TOOL THAT EAST PALO ALTO COULD USE. AND I 20 KNOW THAT MANY OF OUR NEIGHBORING CITIES WOULD ALSO BE 21 INTERESTED IN USING. SO, I'M LOOKING FORWARD TO WORKING WITH 22 MY COUNCIL, WITH MY MAYOR, WITH HCL, WHICH IS THE LOCAL, KIND 23 OF, HOUSING LEADERSHIP, LEADERSHIP COUNCIL IN SAN MATEO COUNTY 24 25 AND WITH HOUSING FOR ALL WHICH IS A COUNTY-LED ALSO CITY

INTEGRATED APPROACH THAT WE'RE USING IN THE COUNTY TO ADDRESS 1 THE ISSUE OF HOUSING. AND I THINK IT'S BEEN VERY EFFECTIVE. 2 AND I WOULD HOPE THAT OTHER CITIES AND OTHER COUNTIES WOULD 3 INDEED WORK WITHIN THEIR OWN COUNTIES TO TRY TO MOVE THIS 4 5 FORWARD SO THAT, COLLECTIVELY, WHEN WE GO TO THE BALLOT IN 2024, WE HAVE THAT CRITICAL MASS TO MOVE THIS AT THE BALLOT 6 BOX TO GET THE TEN TO -- OR SO, BILLION DOLLARS TO HELP US 7 8 OUT. THANK YOU ALL FOR THIS WONDERFUL WORK, AND I LOOK FORWARD TO ROLLING UP MY SLEEVES AND WORKING VERY DILIGENTLY TO MAKE 9 10 THIS HAPPEN. THANK YOU

11

12 JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: THANK YOU. WE'LL GO NEXT TO 13 MAYOR.

14

STEVE YOUNG: YOUNG THANK YOU. I WANTED TO FOLLOW UP ON WHAT 15 16 MAYOR WORTH TALKED ABOUT. THERE ARE CITIES LIKE ORINDA, LIKE 17 BENICIA, THAT NEVER HAD REDEVELOPMENT DOLLARS. IN OUR CASE, WE DON'T HAVE ANY DOLLARS. ZERO DOLLARS FOR HOUSING. AND YET WE 18 HAVE AN OBLIGATION TO BUILD, PROBABLY 40% OF OUR RHNA 19 OBLIGATION IS IN VERY LOW AND LOW-INCOME UNITS. WELL, I THINK 20 ANYBODY WHO HAS DEALT IN TRYING TO DEVELOP HOUSING REALIZES 21 THAT WITHOUT SIGNIFICANT LOCAL SUBSIDY THERE IS NOT GOING TO 22 BE ANY LOW AND VERY LOW-INCOME HOUSING BUILT. ALL THE CITY, 23 BENICIA, HAS TO OFFER A DEVELOPER IS CITY-OWNED LAND. AND WE 24 25 ARE LOOKING AT BUILDING OVER THE SENIOR CENTER, OR BUILDING

OVER CITY-OWNED PARKING LOTS AS A WAY TO PROVIDE THE LAND 1 PORTION BUT EVEN THAT MAY NOT BE ENOUGH TO MAKE A PROJECT 2 PENCIL OUT. SO, ON THE ONE HAND, THE STATE MAY PENALIZE US ON 3 THE BACK END FOR NOT HAVING PRODUCED VERY LOW AND LOW-INCOME 4 5 HOUSING. THERE IS SIMPLY NOT THE SUBSIDY IT MAKE IT HAPPEN. AND I DON'T KNOW IF THIS, IF ABAG, OR BAHFA, OR ANYBODY ELSE, 6 WOULD HAVE ANY INFLUENCE WITH HCD WHEN IT COMES TO MEASURING 7 8 THE ISSUE IS OR FAILURE OF CITIES TO COMPLY WITH THEIR RHNA OBLIGATIONS. THE OTHER POINT I WANTED TO MAKE WAS THAT, IF 9 10 WE'RE TALKING ABOUT THIS KIND OF MONEY, FIRST OF ALL, THERE SHOULD BE -- AS SUPERVISOR SPERING SAID -- THERE SHOULD BE 11 SOME DIRECT SET-ASIDE TO SMALL COMMUNITIES, POPULATION BASED 12 IS FINE, TO YOU ABOUT GIVE ALL THE MONEY TO THE COUNTY AND 13 TRUST THE COUNTY TO EQUITABLY DISTRIBUTE IT TO ALL OF THE 14 CITIES WITHIN THAT COUNTY IS A PRETTY BIG ASSUMPTION. AND IF 15 16 WE'RE GOING TO BE DOING THESE KIND OF CALCULATIONS THAT SAY, 17 YOU KNOW, SOLANO COUNTY IS GOING TO GET \$250 MILLION IF THIS PASSES, WELL, THAT'S GREAT. BUT THERE NEEDS TO BE SOME WAY 18 THAT SMALL CITIES LIKE BENICIA OR DIXON OR SUISUN CITY, OR IN 19 OUR CASE, ACTUALLY, ARE GOING RECEIVE SOME MONEY, AND KNOW 20 21 THAT WE'RE GOING RECEIVE SOME MONEY, AND THEN WE CAN PLAN FOR IT. WE CAN MAKE SOME COMMITMENTS TO DEVELOPERS THAT, YEAH, 22 WE'RE GOING TO GET OUR MONEY. WE'RE NOT DEPENDENT ON 23 ALLOCATION FROM A DIFFERENT POLITICAL BODY. THE LAST POINT I 24 25 WANTED TO MAKE IS THAT, WE OUGHT TO THINK ABOUT LIMIT BEING

THE USE OF THESE MONEY ONLY TO RENTAL HOUSING. I DON'T KNOW IF 1 FOR SALE HOUSING IS CONTEMPLATED AS AN ELIGIBLE ACTIVITY HERE, 2 BUT THE SUBSIDIES REQUIRED TO DO FOR SALE HOUSING ARE SO HIGH, 3 SO EXTREME, THAT YOU LOSE POTENTIAL BENEFITS, AND THE NEED TO 4 5 TRACK THE RESALE OF THESE UNITS OVER A 55 YEAR TERM PROVIDE --IS AN ADMINISTRATIVE BURDEN. PARTICULARLY FOR SMALL CITIES 6 THAT DON'T HAVE STAFF WHO CAN TECHNICALLY -- DO THIS KIND OF 7 8 TECHNICAL WORK GOING FORWARD. YOU KNOW? WE HAVE FOUR PLANNERS IN OUR PLANNING DEPARTMENT THAT HANDLE ALL OF OUR -- NOT ONLY 9 10 JUST GENERAL PLAN OBJECTING ACTIVITIES, BUT ALL OF OUR PERMITTING ACTIVITIES. SO, WE, FOR SMALL CITIES, THEY DO NOT 11 HAVE THE STAFFING NECESSARY TO DO THE LONG-TERM MONITORING 12 REQUIRED FOR, FOR SALE HOUSING. SO THOSE ARE THE COMMENTS I 13 WANTED TO MAKE. 14

16 JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: THANK YOU. COUNCILMEMBER TOMS 17 FROM PINOLE.

MAUREEN TOMS: ARE WE ANTICIPATING PUTTING TOGETHER AN EXPENDITURE PLAN PRIOR TO GOING TO THE BALLOT? AND IF SO, IS THAT, WITH THE APPROVAL OF THE EXPENDITURE PLAN, KIND OF DESCRIBE HOW THE DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDS WOULD HAPPEN?

JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: YES. BUT I'M GOING TO GO TO KATE. IF KATE IS PRESENT, I'LL GO TO YOU TO ELABORATE.

KATE HARTLEY: YES. I'M LOOKING AT THE LEGISLATION AS WE SPEAK 2 3 TO MAKE SURE WE GET IT RIGHT. AND WE WILL -- WE CAN PROVIDE FOLLOW-UP INFORMATION BECAUSE THIS IS CHEERILY SUCH AN 4 5 IMPORTANT OUESTION. TO GET A MEASURE ON THE BALLOT BAHFA WILL HAVE TO WRITE AN EXPENDITURE PLAN. AND IT'S GENERAL. IT 6 OBVIOUSLY CAN'T IDENTIFY SPECIFIC PROJECTS. AND THEN EACH 7 8 COUNTY WILL SUBSEQUENTLY CREATE AN EXPENDITURE PLAN. IT'S CREATED ACCORDING TO THE TERMS OF THE LEGISLATION AND IT'S, 9 10 YOU KNOW, WITH THESE BREAK DOWNS OF PRESERVATION, PRODUCTION, ET CETERA, AND THEN IT'S SUBMITTED TO BAHFA, AND THEN WE 11 REVIEW IT FOR COMPLIANCE FOR THE -- WITH THE LEGISLATION. 12 WE'LL ALSO BE WRITING SOME FUNDING GUIDELINES TO HELP THE 13 CITIES AND COUNTIES IN THEIR CRAFTING OF THEIR PLANTS. WITH 14 15 THIS KIND OF FEEDBACK WE CAN INCORPORATE INTO THE FUNDING 16 GUIDELINES THE CONCEPTS THAT PEOPLE HAVE RAISED SUCH AS EOUITY 17 FOR THE SMALLER CITIES AND LEVERAGING THINGS, LIKE, IF THERE IS PUBLIC LAND THAT'S AVAILABLE, AND THAT CAN BE CONTRIBUTED 18 TO A DEVELOPMENT, AND THEN THAT IS AN EXCELLENT PROJECT TO 19 FUND WITH MONEY THAT'S GENERATED BY THIS FUNDING MEASURE. SO 20 ALL OF THAT WILL HAVE THE, JUST SCHEDULED, BAHFA WILL WRITE 21 THE CONCEPTUAL EXPENDITURE PLAN, THERE'S THE BALLOT MEASURE 22 THE COUNTIES WILL SUBMIT THE EXPENDITURE PLAN BAHFA WILL WRITE 23 THE FUNDING GUIDELINES WITH THE GUIDANCE OF OUR ADVISORY 24 COMMITTEE, AND THESE WILL BE SUBMITTED TO THE ABAG AND BAHFA 25

EXECUTIVE BOARDS. AND THEN WE'LL REVIEW THOSE EXPENDITURE 1 2 PLANS TO MAKE SURE THAT THE GOALS THAT WE HAVE ALL AGREED UPON 3 ARE MET. 4 5 JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: OKAY. THANK YOU. FORGIVE MY PRONUNCIATION. I'LL CALL YOU MAYOR STEVE. 6 7 8 STEVE WOEHLEKE: I REPRESENT MORAGA, AND WE ARE A SMALL REMOTE CITY WITHOUT A LOT OF SERVICES, AND WE ARE DILIGENTLY WORKING 9 10 TO UPDATE OUR HOUSING ELEMENT AND FOR HCD AND THE REQUIREMENTS THAT HAVE BEEN DICTATED TO US. THERE IS A TWO-PART COMMENT 11 HERE INPUT. ONE IS, BASED ON THE RHNA ALLOCATIONS, IT'S HARD 12 TO -- WE DON'T FIND IT VERY CREDIBLE, ESPECIALLY THE 13 ALLOCATIONS RELATIVE TO LOCATION OF JOBS AND IT'S THE FEEDBACK 14 15 I GET IS THAT, THAT PIECE OF IT SORT OF GOT REALLY NOT FULLY 16 EXECUTED AS IT SHOULD HAVE BEEN, THAT'S THE KIND WAY OF 17 DESCRIBING IT. AND SO NOW WE'RE BEING ASKED TO TRUST AGAIN AND SUPPORT A MAJOR FINANCING PROGRAM WHERE THE LAST RHNA 18 ALLOCATION, NOT REALLY CREDIBLE, AT LEAST FOR A TOWN LIKE 19

20 MORAGA. AND, SO, SO I'M CONCERNED THAT THE MONEY -- IF IT'S 21 GENERATED, WILL IT GET TO THE FOLKS THAT REALLY NEED IT? AND 22 TO ME, THAT'S THE DEVELOPERS, THE OWNERS, WHO ARE GOING TO BE 23 TAKING THE RISK. AND IT SHOULD NOT BE GOING TO ADMINISTRATORS 24 OR COMMITTEES, OR GOVERNMENTAL DO-GOODERS. AND THE 5% 25 ADMINISTRATIVE COST ON THE \$10 BILLION BOND MEASURE IS \$500

MILLION, WHICH SEEMS LIKE A PRETTY DAUNTING AMOUNT OF MONEY TO
 HAVE FOR ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS. SO, I'M RAISING QUESTIONS.
 THANK YOU.

5 JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: THANK YOU. JUST WANT TO, JUST, ADD SOME ADDITIONAL INFORMATION WITH REGARD TO SOME OTHER 6 QUESTIONS THAT WERE RAISED. ONE, THAT THE COUNTY AND REGIONAL 7 8 EXPENDITURE PLANS IN THE STATUTE ARE REQUIRED TO BE UPDATED ANNUALLY, AND THEY COULD BE FOR MULTIPLE YEARS. AND IN 9 ADDITION, ABAG HAS TO SIGN OFF ON THE EXPENDITURE PLAN. ONE OF 10 THE THINGS THAT SOME OF US VERY STRONGLY ADVOCATED FOR WAS 11 THAT THERE BE A JOINT ROLE AT BOTH ABAG AND MTC TO PUT A 12 MEASURE ON THE BALLOT, AND TO APPROVE THE EXPENDITURE PLANS. 13 BECAUSE WE REPRESENT MORE OF THE SMALLER AND MEDIUM SIZED 14 CITIES IN THE SAN FRANCISCO BAY AREA. SO, I THINK THAT AFFORDS 15 16 GOVERNMENT AT ALL LEVELS IN THE BAY AREA THE OPPORTUNITY TO HAVE A VOICE IN THIS PROCESS. OKAY. WE'LL GO NEXT TO MAYOR 17 BONILLA. 18

20 RICK BONILLA: THANK YOU VERY MUCH MR. CHAIR. FIRST I WANT TO 21 THANK STAFF FOR ALL THE PROGRESS THAT I'M HEARING. I AM 22 WORKING TO DESCRIBE TO PEOPLE WHO COME WITH QUESTIONS 23 REGARDING THE RHNA PROCESS NOT ONLY THE ALLOCATION BUT THE 24 PROSPECT OF BEING ABLE TO BUILD WHAT WE'RE PROJECTED TO NEED 25 TO BUILD OVER THE COMING CYCLE, WHICH HAS COME TO ME AS A

MANY PEOPLE WHERE I LIVE IN THE CITY OF SAN MATEO, 2 3 WHERE THE MEDIAN HOME SALES PRICE IS APPROACHING \$2 MILLION REALIZE THAT THAT IS A RESULT OF THE SCARCITY OF HOUSING. AND 4 5 THAT MANY PEOPLE ARE HAVING DIFFICULTIES JUST TO AFFORD TO LIVE HERE, ONLY THOSE WITH HIGH PAYING JOBS CAN AFFORD TO LIVE 6 HERE. APARTMENTS ARE SCARCE. SO WE HAVE GONE THROUGH A LONG 7 8 PERIOD OF DISPLACEMENT. WE STARTED DEALING WITH PEOPLE BE DISPLACED HERE IN SAN MATEO AND WE WERE WORKING TO FIND 9 SOLUTIONS WAY BACK IN 2014. AND WE WEREN'T VERY PRODUCTIVE IN 10 TRYING TO FIND WAYS TO DO THAT AS THE INDIVIDUAL CITY OF SAN 11 MATEO. SO I REALLY APPLAUD THIS EFFORT TO FIND A WAY TO TAKE 12 COLLECTIVE ACTION TO MEET THE NEEDS FOR THE PEOPLE OF THE 13 ENTIRE BAY AREA. WE HAVE LOW WAGE PEOPLE WHO USED TO BE ABLE 14 15 TO LIVE IN SAN MATEO NOW COMMUTING FROM AS FAR AWAY AS TRACY, 16 AND SOUTH OF SAN JOSE, AND THE SALINAS AREA. I SEE 17 CONSTRUCTION WORKERS COME FROM MODESTO, AND AS FAR AS SACRAMENTO, EVEN FRESNO SOMETIMES. THOSE COMMUTES HORRENDOUS. 18 WHAT THEY DO TO OUR AIR IS DEFINITELY SOMETHING WE NEED TO BE 19 CONSIDERING AND THINKING ABOUT AND THAT IS PART OF WHAT 20 21 PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 SEEKS TO ADDRESS WHICH IS ALL OF THESE CONCERNS. THIS IS JUST ONE PIECE OF THAT PUZZLE. SO I WANT TO 22 SAY THANK YOU FOR BRINGING THIS FORWARD. I SUPPORT THIS VERY 23 MUCH. I REALIZE THAT MOST OF THE CITY IS MADE UP OF THE 24 SMALLEST CITIES. SAN MATEO A CITY OF 5,000 COMPARED TO THE 25

LARGEST CITIES IN THE NORTH AND SOUTH ON THE PENINSULA. WE 1 HAVE OPPORTUNITIES TO DO A LOT. WE HAVE OPPORTUNITIES TO 2 CREATE PARTNERSHIPS, THE HOUSING LEADERSHIP COUNCIL AND OTHER 3 PARTNERS TO DEVELOP AND RESTORE WHO ARE INTERESTED IN WORKING 4 5 WITH US. I THINK WHEN PEOPLE TAKE A LOOK AT POSSIBILITIES AND WORK TOGETHER THEY CREATE POSSIBILITIES. THE PEOPLE WE'RE SEEK 6 TO HOUSE ARE THE PEOPLE WHO HAVE JOBS HERE HISTORICALLY 7 8 FAMILIES, CHILDREN, AND GRANDCHILDREN. PEOPLE WANT TO BE ABLE TO LIVE CLOSE TO EACH OTHER. AND THE BOTTOM -- MY LAST WORD IS 9 10 JUST, DIGNITY, AND RESPECT. THESE ARE THINGS WE HAVE TO AFFORD TO ALL PEOPLE. THANK YOU SO MUCH. I SUPPORT THE MOVEMENT. 11 12 JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. WE'LL GO 13 TO MAYOR ENANDER. 14 15 16 ANITA ENANDER: THANK YOU. I'LL JOIN THE LIST OF VOICES

SPEAKING FOR SMALL CITIES WE HAVE ABOUT 31,000 PEOPLE AS ONE 17 OF THE WEALTHIEST CITIES IN THE BAY AREA WE HAVE THE PRIVILEGE 18 OF PROVIDING THESE PASSES MAKING MORE THAN A SMALL 19 CONTRIBUTION TO THE OVERALL FUND. AND I WOULD LIKE TO JUST SAY 20 THAT APART FROM THE ISSUES THAT HAVE COME UP ALREADY ON THE 21 ACTUAL FRAMING OF THE POSSIBLE BOND MEASURE, I THINK THERE ARE 22 TWO ISSUES THAT WE SHOULD THINK ABOUT THAT WOULD HAVE AN 23 IMPACT ON WHETHER THE BOND MEASURE CAN ACTUALLY BE SUCCESSFUL. 24 SO I DON'T THINK WE'RE GETTING AHEAD OF OURSELVES IF I MENTION 25

THESE TWO: ONE IS TO SEE THE STATE STEP UP AND PROVIDE A 1 SUBSTANTIALLY GREATER AMOUNT OF MONEY FOR FUNDING OF BELOW 2 3 MARKET RATE HOUSING. WE ALL KNOW THAT IF THE RDAS HAD CONTINUED, WE WOULD NOT BE IN THE PICKLE WE'RE IN. AND 4 5 ANCILLARY TO THAT IS THE STATE'S STOPPING THE BASHING OF CITIES FOR A FAILURE TO BUILD HOUSING WHEN IT WAS THE STATE 6 THAT TOOK THE MONEY AWAY. THE SECOND PART OF THAT IS TO MAKE 7 8 SURE WE HAVE A TRANS PARENT RHNA PROCESS. AND THAT MEANS, THAT I HOPE, THAT ABAG WILL ACTUALLY CONTINUE TO FOLLOW UP AND 9 WATCH WHAT HAPPENS AS A RESULT OF THE STATE AUDIT. AND IF 10 WARRANTED, THAT THE STATE BE ENCOURAGED TO REVISE THE NUMBERS 11 AND THE ALLOCATION, EVEN FOR THIS CYCLE, BECAUSE THE 12 CREDIBILITY OR, I SHOULD SAY RIGHT NOW, THE LACK OF 13 CREDIBILITY, IN THE RHNA ASSIGNMENTS -- NOT WHAT ABAG DID --14 15 BUT WHAT THE STATE PROVIDED, WOULD BE A SUBSTANTIAL NEGATIVE 16 IMPACT ON TRYING TO GET THIS KIND OF A MEASURE THROUGH IN MY 17 CITY. AND I'LL JUST, AS FINAL NOTE, MENTION, MR. PRESIDENT, THAT RIGHT NOW, THE PERCEPTION OF ABAG AS A SEPARATE ENTITY, 18 ABLE TO WORK WITHIN AND REPRESENT THE ISSUES FOR SMALL CITIES 19 UP AGAINST MTC IS SOMETHING THAT'S ALSO NOT FRANKLY CREDIBLE 20 21 IN MY COMMUNITY RIGHT NOW. ABAG AND MTC ARE SEEN AS ONE ENTITY, AND SO I WOULD ENCOURAGE YOU TO KIND OF CONSIDER THAT 22 THAT'S HOW THE PERCEPTION IS HERE. EVEN THOUGH I UNDERSTAND 23 YOUR WILLINGNESS AND COMMITMENT TO REPRESENT THE ISSUES OF 24 SMALL CITIES THROUGH ABAG. THANK YOU VERY MUCH. 25

AND IT WAS 4 5 CLEARLY RECOGNIZED THAT, YOU KNOW, WE NEED TO ACCOMMODATE 6 THAT. AND, SO OUR DECISIONS RELATED TO PLACEMENT OF, YOU KNOW, TRANSPORTATION INFRASTRUCTURE, ENHANCEMENT OF IT, OF WHAT WAS 7 8 EXISTING ON THE GROUND, WAS REFLECTIVE OF, WITHIN THE FINANCIAL CONSTRAINTS THAT WE HAVE TO WORK IN, WAS REFLECTIVE 9 OF WHAT WE ANTICIPATED TO BE THE TRANSPORTATION IMPACTS 10 RESULTING FROM GROWTH, NOT ONLY IN HOUSING AND WHERE IT WAS 11 PLACED, BUT ALSO JOBS AND WHERE THEY WERE PLACED. SO, IT'S 12 TIED TOGETHER. AND AS JUST ONE EXAMPLE, THE COMMISSION WILL BE 13 TAKING UP A TRANSIT ORIENTED COMMUNITIES POLICY THIS MONTH 14 THAT WAS ACTUALLY PRESENTED AS AN INFORMATION ITEM TO THE ABAG 15 16 EXECUTIVE BOARD, THAT EXPLICITLY IS SPEAKING TO THE COORDINATION OF TRANSPORTATION INVESTMENT AND NEEDS AROUND 17 DEVELOPMENT, AROUND TRANSIT STATIONS AS ONE EXAMPLE. WE 18 RECOGNIZE AT A MICRO AND MACRO LEVEL. AND I WOULD JUST SAY 19 THAT ONE OF THE KEY COORDINATING REALITIES OF THIS REGION IS 20 21 THAT DEVELOPING SUCCESSFUL TRANSPORTATION WILL HINGE, ALSO, ON PARTNERSHIPS WITH CITIES AND COUNTIES FOR THE REASONS THAT YOU 22 JUST STATED. AND ALSO PART 2 3 OF THE DISCUSSION IS HOW TO PRIORITIZE THE ALLOCATION OF DISCRETIONARY TRANSPORTATION DOLLARS TO HELP SUPPORT THE 4 5 TRANSIT AND HOUSING INFRASTRUCTURE. JOHN DUGAN: THANK YOU. APPRECIATE THE ROBUST DISCUSSION AND 14 15 THE WORK ON GETTING MUNICIPALITIES BUILT. I WANT TO HIGHLIGHT 16 THAT IN ADDITION TO DOING ALL THE WORK TO GETTING THESE BUILT, I BELIEVE THAT PRESERVATION OF BELOW MARKET HOUSING IS 17 SOMETHING WE SHOULD FOCUS ON AND PUT TIME ON AS WELL. WHEN 18 FIRST JOINED THE SAN CARLOS PLANNING COMMISSION FIVE YEARS AGO 19 I WAS SURPRISED TO LEARN THAT OUR INCLUSIONARY COVENANTS ONLY 20 21 RAN FOR 45 YEARS FOR RENTAL PROJECTS AND FOR 55 YEARS OF OWNERSHIP PROJECTS. AND WE LOOKED INTO THAT. SINCE I JOINED 22 THE COUNCIL, WE HAVE DONE THE WORK AND THE RESEARCH AND WE 23 WERE ABLE TO CONCLUDE THAT THOSE COULD ACTUALLY RUN IN 24 25 PERPETUITY, AND WE DID QUITE A BIT OF OUTREACH TO DEVELOPERS

AND LEARNED THAT 45 YEAR, 55 YEAR COVENANTS OR PERPETUITY ARE 1 2 BASICALLY THE SAME THING AS FAR AS THEIR CONCERNED, THEIR LOANS, PROJECTS, ALL HAVE A 20OR 25 YEAR TIME HORIZON. VERY 3 PROUD TO ANNOUNCE, JUST THIS MONDAY, WE UPDATED OUR BELOW 4 MARKET RATE ORDINANCE IN SAN CARLOS, AND NOW OUR INCLUSIONARY 5 COVENANTS RUN IN PERPETUITY WITH THE LAND. SO, ANY BELOW 6 MARKET RATE HOUSING THAT GETS DEVELOPED IN OUR TOWN WILL NOW 7 8 BE THERE FOR ALL FUTURE GENERATIONS, AND YOU KNOW, AND SOMETIMES -- I THINK -- I HEARD THAT, OH, 45, 55 YEARS IS A 9 LONG TIME. BUT I DON'T THINK AT ALL THAT OUR HOUSING PROBLEM 10 WILL GO AWAY BY THEN AND I KNOW THAT MY GRANDKIDS AND THEIR 11 GRANDKIDS ARE GOING TO BE VERY GLAD THAT WE DID THIS IN SAN 12 CARLOS. AND IF WE CAN GET THE CITIES ADEQUATELY REPRESENTED, I WOULD WORK HARD TO GET LEAGUE OF CALIFORNIA CITIES TO COME 6 OUT IN SUPPORT OF THIS. I'M RATHER ACTIVE IN THEIR HOUSING 7 8 FORUMS. I WOULD ALSO LIKE TO SEE A CARROT USED IN THAT -- AND I'LL CALL IT A CARROT, THAT I WOULD IMAGINE, OR I WOULD 9 CERTAINLY PROPOSE THAT ELIGIBILITY TO AVAIL ONE'S CITY OF 10 THESE RESOURCES WOULD BE DEPENDENT ON THAT CITY'S COMPLIANCE 11 WITH THEIR RHNA NUMBERS, WITH MEETING THEIR RHNA OBLIGATIONS. 12 BECAUSE, I DON'T THINK YOU CAN HAVE IT BOTH WAYS. AND I WANTED 13 TO ALSO COMMENT THAT I WOULD NOT LIMIT THESE FUNDS TO JUST 14 15 CREATING RENTAL HOUSING. YOU KNOW? WE SPEND A LOT OF OUR TIME 16 AND RESOURCES TRYING TO PROTECT RENTERS, WHICH WE ABSOLUTELY SHOULD CONTINUE DOING, BUT IT'S ALSO IMPORTANT FOR US TO FIND 17 WAYS FOR LOW-INCOME INDIVIDUALS TO BE A PART OF THE HOME 18 OWNERSHIP ARENA TO BE ABLE TO START AMASSING THAT GENERATIONAL 19 WEALTH THAT OTHERS IN HIGHER INCOME CATEGORIES HAVE BEEN ABLE 20 21 TO ACHIEVE. AND IT'S ALSO JUST A PROTECTION AS A FORM OF SECURITY. AND, ANYWAY, I'M VERY GLAD TO HEAR FROM SAN CARLOS 22 COUNCILMEMBER, OR MAYOR DUGAN ABOUT THE CREATING THIS 23 MECHANISM TO HAVE BELOW MARKET HOUSING DEED RESTRICTED INTO 24

PERPETUITY. I THINK THAT'S A GREAT PROTECTION. ANYWAY. THOSE
 ARE MY THOUGHTS. THANKS SO MUCH.

JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: THANK YOU. WE'LL GO NEXT TO
SUPERVISOR HAUBERT FROM ALAMEDA COUNTY.

DAVID HAUBERT: I RECOGNIZE THE BELOW MARKET RATE HOUSING IN 7 8 PERPETUITIES IS QUITE A THING. THANK YOU FOR SHARING. MY COMMENTS AROUND EQUITY I WOULD SHARE MY COMMENTS I GET FROM MY 9 10 COMMUNITY, THEY FEEL THAT BART TO LIVERMORE WAS PROMISED YEARS AND YEARS AGO, AND NOW WE'RE NOT SEEING BART TO LIVERMORE AND 11 WE'RE TRYING TO ALLEVIATE THAT WITH A VALLEY LINK PROJECT 12 WHICH IS ALSO FACING SOME OPPOSITION. BUT THE LONG-TERM 13 EFFECTS OF PROMISES MADE NEED TO BE CONSIDERED. THE SECOND 14 15 COMMENT I WOULD LIKE TO MAKE IS WE'VE BEEN MENTIONING YEAR IN 16 AND YEAR OUT THE NEEDS FOR JOBS/HOUSING BALANCE. WE CONTINUE 17 TO SEE MORE AND MORE JOBS POUR INTO, SAY, FOR EXAMPLE, JUST ONE EXAMPLE, THE SILICON VALLEY, WITHOUT HAVING HOUSING MEET 18 THE PACE. I THINK 17 TO 1, OR 15 TO 1, I SEE THAT THEY'RE 19 CONSIDERING TEARING TOWN HOUSING AT SANTANA ROAD TO PUT MORE 20 OFFICERS SPACE DOWN THERE, AND THAT JUST EXACERBATES THINGS. 21 YET, I'M NOT SURE WE'RE DOING ENOUGH, OR, IF ANYTHING, TO 22 ALLEVIATE JOBS GROWTH IN AREAS THAT DON'T HAVE HOUSING. THE 23 ONLY WAY AROUND THAT IS TO FIND A WAY TO CHARGE FOR THAT, OR 24 ADVOCATE FOR IT. I SOUND LUKE A BROKEN RECORD EVERY TIME I 25

BRING UP MY POINTS, BUT WE HAVEN'T BEEN ABLE TO FIND A
 SOLUTION. I'LL CONTINUE TO LOOK FOR THAT. I'LL RESERVE MY
 COMMENT ON THE OVERALL PLAN FOR THE FUTURE. I WANT TO SAY
 THANK YOU FOR THE PRESENTATION, THOUGH. VERY HELPFUL.

JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: THANK YOU. WE NEED TO
TRANSITION TO OUR NEXT PRESENTATION. I WILL RECOGNIZE
COUNCILMEMBER HUDES, AND MAYOR XAVIER AND MAYOR KENDALL.

MATTHEW HUDES: I THINK THE BOND MEASURE IS A GOOD SUGGESTION 10 THAT HAS BEEN MADE TO BALANCE IT A LITTLE BIT. ALSO A QUESTION 11 BEING NEW TO THE ABAG GROUP HERE, IS IT POSSIBLE TO PUT A 12 SIMILAR EFFORT INTO TRYING TO OBTAIN FUNDING FOR THIS PROGRAM 13 IN THE \$97.5 BILLION BUDGET SURPLUS THAT EXISTS RIGHT NOW? AS 14 COMPARED TO WAITING UNTIL 2024 TO FUND THIS BOND PROGRAM? SO, 15 16 I DON'T KNOW THAT MUCH ABOUT THE ROLE OF ABAG AND MTC AND WHETHER THAT'S APPROPRIATE OR NOT, BUT I'M JUST ASKING THAT 17 OUESTION BECAUSE IT DOES SEEM THAT THERE IS A POSSIBILITY OF 18 FUNDING THIS ON AN ACCELERATED BASIS. THANK YOU. 19

JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: EXCELLENT QUESTION. AND, YES,
ABAG AND MTC DID HAVE A BUDGET ASK TO THE STATE. I THINK IT
WAS \$2 BILLION. THAT SEVERAL BILLED SURPLUS FOR HOUSING
PRODUCTION, PRESERVATION PROGRAMS. REBECCA LONG, ON THE ZOOM?

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REBECCA, IF YOU ARE HERE, IF YOU CAN ELABORATE A LITTLE BIT 1 2 ABOUT THE STATE ADVOCACY EFFORTS? 3 THERESE MCMILLAN: I WAS LOOKING FOR HER. I KNOW SHE MIGHT HAVE 4 5 BEEN HERE AT SOME POINT. 6 JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: SHE MIGHT HAVE JUMPED OFF. 7 8 THERESE, I THINK I PRETTY MUCH ANSWERED THE QUESTION. 9 10 THERESE MCMILLAN: EXACTLY. 11 JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: TWO BILLION DOLLARS ASK --12 GOING UP TO SACRAMENTO ON MONDAY TO MEET WITH MEMBERS OF 13 LEADERSHIP AND THE BUDGET COMMITTEE TO ADVOCATE FOR THOSE 14 RESOURCES. THE GOVERNOR'S MAY REVISE INCLUDED SOME MONEY FOR 15 16 PRODUCTION, PRESERVATION, INCLUDING THE CAP PROGRAM, WHICH IS FOCUSED ON RENTAL PRESERVATION. AND THERE ARE SOME DIFFERENCES 17 BETWEEN THE SENATE AND ASSEMBLY PROPOSAL AND THE GOVERNOR'S 18 PROPOSAL. AND, SO, WE'RE, ALONG WITH OTHER HOUSING, SORT OF, 19 NON-PROFITS, AND ADVOCACY ORGANIZATIONS, CONTINUING TO 20 21 ADVOCATE FOR A SIGNIFICANT INVESTMENT BY THE STATE IN HOUSING PRODUCTION AND PRESERVATION THIS BUDGET CYCLE. SO, ABSOLUTELY. 22 WE'LL GO NEXT TO MAYOR XAVIER THEN COUNCILMEMBER CANDELL. THEN 23 TRANSITION TO OUR NEXT MEETING. 24

RITA XAVIER: MY CITY OF SAN PABLO HAS A SHORTAGE EVER LAND 1 WE'RE ONLY 2.6 SQUARE MILES WITH 41,000 POPULATION. THIS IS MY 2 3 FOURTH YEAR ON THE CITY COUNCIL, AND I WAS ON THE PLANNING COMMISSION FOR FIVE YEARS BEFORE THAT. SO I JUST WANTED TO 4 5 MENTION THE PROBLEM THAT WE HAVE HAD WITH DEVELOPERS WHO COULDN'T GET FINAL FUNDING THEY NEED FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING. 6 SO DURING MY TIME ON THE COMMISSION, SEVERAL PROJECTS FAILED 7 8 FOR THAT EXACT REASON. WE HAVE SEVERAL HOUSING PROJECTS IN THE WORKS RIGHT NOW, NONE WITH BROKEN GROUND, THEY'RE STILL IN THE 9 PAPERWORK STAGE. SO, I HAVE CONCERNS THAT THE SAME THING WOULD 10 HAPPEN, WHERE THEY GET ALMOST TO BEING FINALIZED, AND THEN THE 11 DEVELOPERS CAN'T GET THOSE FINAL DOLLARS. I JUST WANTED TO 12 BRING THAT UP. THANKS. 13

15 JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: THANK YOU. WE'LL GO TO SUSAN
16 CANDELL NEXT THEN MOVE ON TO OUR NEXT AGENDA ITEM.

17

SUSAN CANDELL: THANK YOU. I WANT TO ECHO OTHERS HERE WHO ARE 18 SAYING WE WOULD LIKE TO GET THE CITIES INVOLVED OFFICIALLY IN 19 THE CAPACITY OF THIS MEASURE WE APPLAUD THE EFFORT TO GET MORE 20 MONEY FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING. I DO NOT AGREE WITH TYING THIS 21 TO RHNA ALLOCATIONS IN ANY FORM. AND THIS ECHOES COMMENTS MADE 22 BY OTHER SPEAKERS IN TERMS OF THE STATE AUDITOR SAYING THE 23 NUMBERS ARE WRONG. THERE IS A TERRIFIC AMOUNT OF EVIDENCE THAT 24 25 THERE WAS A VAST AMOUNT OF OVER COUNT. AND, SO, TIME,

PENALTIES, OR TYING SOMETHING TO OUR ALLOCATION THAT IS WRONG,
 IT'S JUST SIMPLY NOT RIGHT. BUT, OTHERWISE, I APPLAUD THE
 EFFORT. AND HOPEFULLY THE DEVIL IN THE DETAILS WILL MAKE THIS
 THING WORK. THANK YOU.

JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG PRESIDENT: THANK YOU EVERYONE FOR THE 6 EXCELLENT OUESTIONS AND COMMENTS. THIS WAS EXTREMELY HELPFUL 7 8 AS WE CONTINUE EXPLORING A POTENTIAL HOUSING MEASURE. AND ONCE AGAIN YOUR INPUT IS VALUABLE AS WE CONSIDER NEXT STEPS. WE 9 10 WILL COLLECT THESE COMMENTS AND THEY WILL HELP INFORM, YOU KNOW, THE DEVELOPMENT OF AN EXPENDITURE PLAN AND OTHER STEPS 11 THAT WE'LL BE ENGAGED IN OVER THE NEXT YEAR AND A HALF. AND IF 12 YOU WOULD LIKE MORE INFORMATIONS ON THE PROCESS TO DEVELOP A 13 REGIONAL HOUSING MEASURE, OR HAVE ANY OTHER QUESTIONS, WE 14 15 ENCOURAGE YOU TO REACH OUT TO KATE HARTLEY AT ABAG MTC, AND 16 HER E-MAIL IS KATE HARTLEY@BAYAREAMETRO.GOV. AND THERE IT WILL BE TOWN HALL MEETINGS, MANY MORE OPPORTUNITIES FOR DISCUSSION 17 AND ENGAGEMENT AS THIS PROCESS PROGRESSES. WITH THAT WE'LL 18 MOVE TO A BRIEF SUMMARY ON LOCAL GOVERNMENT SERVICE PROGRAMS. 19 AND THIS IS AN INFORMATION ITEM AND BRAD PAUL WILL GIVE THE 20 21 REPORT.

FOR OUR FINAL ITEM THIS MORNING, DEPUTY EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR BRAD PAUL WILL PRESENT ON ABAG'S LOCAL GOVERNMENT SERVICES AND THE BENEFITS THE TEAMS PROGRAMS AND PROJECTS OFFER TO CITIES, TOWNS, AND COUNTIES. PLEASE TAKE IT AWAY.

BRAD PAUL: THANK YOU. BRING UP THE SLIDE PRESENTATION, PLEASE.
YOU HAVE HEARD A LOT. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. YOU HAVE HEARD A LOT
THIS MORNING FROM KATE INITIALLY AND THE BOARD ABOUT THE BAY
AREA HOUSING FINANCE AUTHORITY WHICH IS UNDER LOCAL GOVERNMENT
SERVICES NOW. AND I WANT TO SPEND A FEW MINUTES TALKING ABOUT
FOUR OTHER PROJECTS THAT ARE PROJECTS THAT YOUR JURISDICTIONS
MAY OR MAY NOT KNOW ABOUT BUT COULD BENEFIT YOU. LET'S GO TO

THE NEXT SLIDE FOR THE ADVANCING CALIFORNIA FINANCE AUTHORITY, 1 HAS BEEN AROUND SINCE 1978 A CONDUIT ISSUE OF TAX EXEMPT AND 2 3 FINANCING FOR THE NEEDS OF PUBLIC AGENCIES AND NON-PROFIT PARTNERS. IF YOU CLICK AGAIN IT WILL SHOW ONE AT A TIME THE 4 5 THINGS WE USE IT FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING 12,000 UNITS, AGAIN, SCHOOLS, PARKS, HOSPITALS AND CLINICS, WATER DISTRICTS, 6 MUNICIPAL INFRASTRUCTURE, AND MUSEUMS. STOP THERE. AND I'LL 7 8 JUST SAY THAT WE HAVE ISSUED, AS I WOULD, EIGHT BILLED IN TAXES AND FINANCING. MANY OF THE SMALLER CITIES AND TOWNS 9 10 WHICH WE HAVE BEEN TALKING ABOUT DO NOT HAVE THE STAFF, LIKE SAN FRANCISCO, OR SAN JOSE IN PLACE TO DO BOND ISSUANCE SO WE 11 CAN REALLY HELP YOU, PARTICULARLY THE SMALL CITIES AND TOWNS 12 IF YOU ARE LOOKING FOR FINANCING FOR THESE KINDS OF PROJECTS. 13 PLEASE GET IN TOUCH WITH ME DIRECTLY AND I WOULD BE HAPPY TO 14 COME OUT AND VISIT YOUR SITES AND HAVE CONVERSATION ABOUT HOW 15 16 WE COULD BE HELPFUL OF THE NEXT SLIDE. NEXT ONE. THE SAN FRANCISCO ESTUARY PARTNERSHIP WAS ESTABLISHED UNDER THE 17 FEDERAL CLEAN WATER ACTS NATIONAL ESTUARY PROGRAM BACK IN 18 1988. THERE ARE 28 OF THESE NATIONALLY RECOGNIZED ESTUARIES. 19 MANAGING MULTI-BENEFIT PROJECTS THAT HELP IMPROVE THE BAY AREA 20 21 ESTUARIES LEVERAGING BOTH FEDERAL STATE AND LOCAL FUND FOR REGIONAL SCALE RESTORATION PROJECTS IN THE BAY FOR WATER 22 OUALITY IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS AND RESILIENCE PROJECTS, TWO 23 EXAMPLES IN RICHMOND AND HEY WAR HORIZONTAL LEVIES NATURALLY 24 25 COLORING HORIZONTAL LEVIES TO PROTECT AGAINST SEA HELVE RISE

AND RESTORATION LONG WITH THE CALIFORNIA COASTAL CONSERVANCY 1 TO DISTRIBUTE \$25 MILLION PER YEAR FOR 20 YEARS THAT SUPPORT 2 3 MEASURE AA PROJECTS THAT PROTECT FROM SEA LEVEL RISE. IF YOU WANT MORE INFORMATION PLEASE GO TO SF ESTUARY.ORG. THE ABAG 4 5 POWER HAS BEEN AROUND SINCE 1989 PROVIDING COST SAVINGS PRICE STABILITY FOR GAS AND PUBLIC BUILDINGS NATURAL GAS IS NOW 6 IDENTIFIED AS A SIGNIFICANT CONTRIBUTOR TO GREENHOUSE GAS 7 8 EMISSIONS AND POWER IS DEALING WITH THAT IN THEIR NEWLY ADOPTED STRATEGIC ROADMAP FOR 2021 THEY'RE ENCOURAGING DEFAULT 9 10 PROJECTS BUNDLED WITH OFFSETS AGAINST GREENHOUSE GASSES. THEY ARE WORKING ON TRANSPARENT AND SOCIALLY RESPONSIBLE RENEWAL --11 RENEWABLE NATURAL GAS ALSO INVOLVED IN WORKING ON INCENTIVES 12 HELPING WITH SB1383 COMPLIANCE. FOR MORE INFORMATION GO 13 DIRECTLY TO THEIR WEB SITE. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. THE BAY AREA 14 15 REGIONAL ENERGY NETWORK OR BAYREN WAS FORMED IN 2012 BY BAY 16 AREA COUNTIES AND CITIES TO BETTER COLLABORATE ON ENERGY EFFICIENCY. THEY'RE ONE OF, NOW, FOUR REGIONAL ENERGY NETWORKS 17 IN CALIFORNIA FUNDED BY THE STATE CPUC AND THEY'RE GETTING 18 INCREASING ALLOCATIONS EVERY YEAR BECAUSE OF THE IMPORTANT 19 WORK THEY DO. THEY'RE FOCUSED ON HARD TO SERVE OR HARD TO 20 REACH RESIDENTS AND COMMUNITIES, TRYING TO FILL GAPS IN THE 21 MARKET FOR ENERGY CONSERVATION, AND NOW WATER CONSERVATION AND 22 THEY'RE SUPPORTING INNOVATIVE SCALEABLE POLICIES AND PILOTS. 23 NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. SO, CURRENTLY, BAYREN HAS THESE PROGRAMS. 24 25 THEY WORK WITH SINGLE-FAMILY HOMEOWNERS AND MULTI-FAMILY

HOMEOWNERS OR PROPERTY OWNERS TO COME IN, DO INVENTORY WITH 1 2 TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE AND ENGINEERS TO SAY IF YOU DO THESE 3 THINGS YOU CAN REDUCE YOUR ENERGY USAGE BY, SAY, 15 TO 20%. AND THEN THEY HELP YOU FIND THE REBATES TO DO SOME OF THAT 4 5 WORK TO CUT THE COST. THEY ALSO HAVE SAY STAFF PERSON WHO WORKS DIRECTLY WITH YOU WITH YOUR CITIES ON CODES AND 6 STANDARDS. SO IF YOU WANT TO DO A REACH CODE SOMETHING MORE 7 8 THAN EVEN WHAT IS REQUIRED, LIKE BERKELEY RECENTLY ENACTED IN THEIR REGION ELECTRIFICATION ORDINANCE, OUR STAFF IS HELPING 9 10 WITH THAT. WE WORK WITH SMALL BUSINESSES AND IN A MINUTE I'LL TALK ABOUT THE WATER UPGRADE SAVES PROGRAM. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. 11 ONE OF OUR BIGGEST PROGRAMS IS THE BAY AREA MULTI-FAMILY 12 BUILDING ENHANCEMENTS OR THE BAMBE PROGRAM. ANY MULTI-FAMILY 13 PROPERTY WITH FIVE OR MORE UNITS IS ELIGIBLE ANYWHERE IN THE 14 15 BAY AREA AND THEY OFFER A NO COST ENERGY CONSULTING, ANALYSIS 16 OF ENERGY USAGE AT YOUR SITE. WE OFFER CASH REBATES FLAT RATE OF \$750 PER UNIT AND IN ADDITION THERE INCENTIVES AS WELL FOR 17 GASES TO ELECTRIC CONVERSIONS. A VERY POPULAR PROGRAM. THE 18 WATER BILL SAVINGS PROGRAM WE PILOTED THIS IN WINDSOR AND 19 HAYWARD WE HAVE PEOPLE COME OUT TO A BUILDING OR SINGLE-FAMILY 20 HOME OR APARTMENT BUILDING LOOKING AT INVENTORY, ADVISING TO 21 DO FIVE OR SIX THINGS TO CUT WATER USAGE BY 15 TO 20%. THERE 22 IS THEN AN AGREEMENT WITH THE LOCAL WATER DISTRICT THAT WE 23 COME IN AND DO THE WORK AT NO COST TO THE PROPERTY OWNER. NO 24 25 UPFRONT PAYMENT NO CREDIT CHECKS, NO LIENS, IT'S A AMOUNT OF

MONEY THAT COMES OUT OF THE PROGRAM TO DO THE WORK. AND THEN A 1 2 MONTHLY SURCHARGE IS PUT ON THE WATER BILL THAT IS LESS THAN 3 THE SAVINGS. YOU SAVE MONEY RIGHT AWAY AND OVER TWO YEARS THERE IS A LOW INTEREST LOAN YOU PAY OFF IN YOUR MONTHLY 4 5 BILLS. AND WHEN THAT'S DONE YOU GET YOUR SAVINGS. AND YOU PAY ONLY WHILE YOU'RE A CUSTOMER AT THAT LOCATION. IF YOU MOVE, 6 YOU'RE NO LONGER RESPONSIBLE. WITH THE DROUGHT WE'RE 7 8 EXPERIENCING NOW, THIS IS A POPULAR PROGRAM. THERE IS A GROWING LIST OF CITIES THAT WANT TO SIGN UP. IF YOU ARE 9 INTERESTED GET IN TOUCH WITH US. NEXT SLIDE PLEASE. AGAIN 10 BAYREN WORKS IN ALL NINE COUNTIES IN 101 CITIES TO GIVE YOU AN 11 EXAMPLE, NEXT SLIDE -- LOOKING AT CONTRA COSTA COUNTY ALONE 12 AND THE WORK BAYREN HAS DONE THERE IN RECENT YEARS WE HAVE 18 13 PARTICIPATING CONTRACTORS LOCATED IN CONTRA COSTA THESE ARE 14 15 CONTRACTORS GOING TO YOUR APARTMENT BUILDING OR HOME OR 16 BUSINESS TO PUT TOGETHER A PLAN TO SAVE ENERGY AND WATER.
