PRIORITY CONSERVATION AREAS. THIS IS AN INFORMATION ITEM. AND
 I BELIEVE CHIRAG RABARI IS PRESENTING THIS ITEM TODAY.

CHIRAG RABARI: GOOD MORNING VICE CHAIR AHN AND GOOD MORNING 4 5 COMMITTEE MEMBERS. IF THE TECHNICAL STAFF COULD PULL UP THE PRESENTATION. THANK YOU. OUR GOAL TODAY IS TO GIVE BACKGROUND 6 ON THE HISTORY OF THE PRIORITY CONSERVATION AREA PROGRAM TALK 7 8 ABOUT ITS CONNECTION TO PLANNED BAY AREA AS WELL AS THE COMPANION PCA GRANT PROGRAM AND THEN DO AN OVERVIEW OF THE 9 10 OUTCOMES, DELIVERABLES, SCOPE OF WORK, AND TIMELINE FOR A REFRESH EFFORT THAT WE'RE UNDERTAKING AS STATED IS REALLY 11 ABOUT THE FUTURE OF THE PCA PROGRAM. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. SO 12 PCAS ARE LOCATIONS NOMINATED BY JURISDICTIONS, INCLUDING 13 CITIES, COUNTIES, PARK AND OPEN SPACE DISTRICT AND DESIGNATED 14 15 BY ABAG AS NATURAL HABITAT AND OPEN SPACE PRESERVATION. PCA 16 FRAMEWORK FIRST DEVELOPED IN 2007 AND RECEIVED A MINOR UPDATE IN 2014. ONE OF THOSE CHANGES WAS INCLUSION WAS URBAN GREENING 17 ALONG WITH NATURAL LANDSCAPES AGRICULTURAL LANDS AND REGIONAL 18 RECREATION. THAT CHANGE WAS MADE TO ADDRESS VARIOUS EQUITY 19 CONCERNS THAT HAD BEEN RAISED ABOUT THE PROGRAM AND THAT IS 20 21 GOING TO BE A CONTINUED FOCUS OF THE REFRESH EFFORT MOVING FORWARD. HISTORICALLY, PCAS WERE CHARACTERIZED AS AREAS WHERE 22 THERE IS LOCAL CONSENSUS REGARDING THE LAND IN NEED OF 23 PROTECTION WHETHER BECAUSE OF PRESSURES OF URBAN DEVELOPMENT 24 AND OTHER FACTORS THAT ISN'T HOW THE PROGRAM ALWAYS WORKS IN 25

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PRACTICE. ONE CLARIFICATION A PCA IS NOT A LEGAL PLANNING OR 1 LAND USE DESIGNATION. NEXT SLIDE, PLEASE. THERE IS -- NEXT 2 3 SLIDE, PLEASE. THANK YOU. SO THERE IS SIGNIFICANT DIVERSITY IN THE NATURE OF PCAS. THERE ARE OVER 185PCAS ACROSS ALL NINE 4 5 COUNTIES NOMINATED BY A BROAD RANGE OF JURISDICTIONS REPRESENTING APPROXIMATELY 2.1 MILLION ACRES OF LAND AND IT'S 6 IMPORTANT TO NOTE THIS IS A VERY LARGE PERCENTAGE OF THE 7 8 REGION'S OVERALL OPEN SPACE SOMETHING NORTH OF 40%. AND BY NATURE, SOME OF THESE PCAS COVER A VERY LARGE AMOUNT OF LAND 9 10 AREA WHILE OTHERS ARE VERY SMALL. FOR EXAMPLE, THE PALOU PHELPS NATURAL AREA IN SAN FRANCISCO IS A THREE ACRE GRASSY 11 HILL IN BAYVIEW NEIGHBORHOOD THAT RISES OUT OF THE CHILDREN'S 12 PLAYGROUND BY CONTRAST THE NAPA COUNTY AGRICULTURAL LANDS PCA 13 IS OVER \$400,000 ACRES. THE IMPORTANT QUESTION IS THE PRIORITY 14 OF COMMON GOALS TYING LANDS TOGETHER. PCAS HAVE BEEN A 15 16 COMPLEMENT TO PLANNED BAY AREA'S FOCUSED GROWTH FRAMEWORK WHERE JOBS ARE FOCUSED IN TRANSIT PRIORITY DEVELOPMENT AREAS 17 AND OPEN SPACES ARE PROTECTED IT'S IMPORTANT TO EMPHASIZE THAT 18 INCLUDING PROTECTED NATURAL HABITATS AND PRESERVED OPEN SPACES 19 AS CORE CONSIDERATIONS WITH RESPECT TO HOW OUR REGION IS GOING 20 21 TO GROW WAS A NOTABLE ACHIEVEMENT. PCAS ARE A UNIQUE PROGRAM NATIONALLY AND REALLY AN EXEMPLAR OF THE BAY AREA'S COMMITMENT 22 23 TO AND CELEBRATION OF ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AND CONSERVATION. WITH RESPECT TO THE OVERALL REGIONAL GROWTH 24 FRAMEWORK HOWEVER THERE WERE VARIOUS IMPLEMENTATION CHALLENGES 25

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AS THAT FRAMEWORK WAS FIRST DEVELOPED, YOU KNOW, OVER EARLIER 1 ITERATIONS OF PLANNED BAY AREA. AND THESE CIRCUMSTANCES 2 3 INFORMED A MAJOR REVAMP OF THAT FRAMEWORK THAT TOOK PLACE IN 2018 AND 2019. AND THAT LED TO THE INCLUSION OF NEW GROWTH 4 5 GEOGRAPHIES AS WELL AS A BROADER RANGE OF HOUSING AND LAND USE STRATEGIES IN PLANNED BAY AREA 2050. AND THESE WERE FOCUSED ON 6 A MUCH WIDER RANGE OF POLICY CONSIDERATIONS, MEANING, HOUSING 7 8 NEEDS AT ALL INCOME LEVELS HOMELESSNESS, RENTER PROTECTIONS AND SO ON. THERE WAS AN INTEREST IN PURSUING A SIMILAR REVAMP 9 OF A PCA FRAMEWORK AT THAT TIME BUT DUE TO STAFFING 10 CONSTRAINTS AND THE NEED TO ALIGN THE PLAN WITH THE REGIONAL 11 HOUSING NEEDS ALLOCATION PROCESS, AS WELL AS MEETING OUR 12 AGGRESSIVE GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS REDUCTION TARGET, PCAS 13 WERE LARGELY LEFT IN PLACE AT THAT TIME, BUT WE DID MAKE A 14 15 COMMITMENT TO REVISIT AFTER PLAN ADOPTION IN OCTOBER 2021. 16 NEXT SLIDE. AND IT'S NOT JUST THE LONG RANGE REGIONAL PLAN WORK PCAS HAVE BEEN INVOLVED IT'S ALSO A COMPANION FOR GRANT 17 PROGRAMS THROUGH THE WHICH MISS HAS SET-ASIDE APPROXIMATELY 18 \$26 MILLION IN ONE BAY AREA OR OBAG FUNDS IN SUPPORT OF 56 19 TOTAL PROJECTS WITH FOCUS ON HELPING PCA PROJECT SPONSORS 20 ACOUIRE OR ENHANCE PROPERTIES DESIGNATED AS PCAS NEARLY \$4 21 22 MILLION HAS ALSO COME FROM THE CALIFORNIA COASTAL AGENCY WHO HAS BEEN A KEY PARTNER IN ADMINISTERING THE NON-NORTH BAY 23 PORTIONS OF THE PROGRAM WHILE OUR COUNTY TRANSPORTATION 24 AGENCIES OR CTAS HAVE BEEN KEY PARTNERS IN THE NORTH BAY. MANY 25

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DIFFERENT PROJECT TYPES HAVE BEEN SUPPORTED IN ADDITION TO 1 ACQUISITION HABITAT PROTECTION, BICYCLE AND PEDESTRIAN ACCESS 2 3 IMPROVEMENTS IMPROVEMENT GREENING PROJECTS. WE DEFINITELY WANT TO RECOGNIZE THE IMPORTANCE OF THESE PROJECTS FOR OUR LOCAL 4 5 JURISDICTIONS. THERE HAVE BEEN FARM TO MARKET TRAILS IN SOLANO, A BRIDGE CONNECTING TWO PREVIOUSLY DISCONNECTED 6 NATURAL AREAS IN P RICHMOND, SEGMENT OF BAY RIDGE TRAIL IN 7 8 RICHMOND. \$18 BILLION HAS BEEN PROPOSED AS PART OF CYCLE THREE, WITH THE PROJECTS ANTICIPATED WE THINK THIS MARKS AN 9 EXCELLENT OPPORTUNITY TO REVISIT UNDERLYING FRAMEWORK. IT'S 10 IMPORTANT TO ACKNOWLEDGE THE CONSERVATION LANDSCAPE HAS 11 CHANGED SIGNIFICANTLY SINCE THE FRAMEWORK WAS DEVELOPED IN 12 2007 CLIMATE CHANGE RISKS ARE MORE ACUTE INCREASING EVALUATION 13 THE PUBLIC POLICY CONVERSATION DATA SCIENCE MAPPING AND 14 15 TECHNICAL PERSPECTIVES AND STATE REGIONAL POLICY GOALS RELATED 16 TO CLIMATE CONSERVATION STAFF BELIEVE THE PCA FRAMEWORK CAN ACT AS AN EFFECTIVE REGIONAL POLICY TOOL TO ADVANCE PLANNED 17 BAY AREA 2050 ADVANCEMENT POLICIES CORE THEMES EXPANDING 18 ACCESS TO PARK AND OPEN SPACE WHILE REDUCING RISKS FROM 19 HAZARDS WHILE DOING SO IN A SYSTEMATIC AND INTEGRATED MANNER. 20 PARTNERS AND STAKEHOLDERS IDENTIFIED SEVERAL KEY NEEDS WITH 21 22 RESPECT TO THE PCA'S AND PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 IMPLEMENTATION 23 PLAN NAMELY FRAMEWORK AND A WIDER RANGE OF POLICY CONCERNS SUCH AS RESILIENCE TO CLIMATE CHANGE AND HAZARDS. NEXT SLIDE. 24 WE ARE EXCITED ABOUT A PARTNERSHIP WITH THE STATE AND GRANT 25

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FUND WE WERE ABLE TO SECURE FOR THE PROJECT WE RECEIVED 1 \$250,000 WE RECEIVED FROM THE AGRICULTURAL LAND CONSERVATION 2 3 PROGRAM MANAGED BY THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF CONVERSATION THIS IS GOING TO STRENGTHEN THE PLANNING FRAMEWORK SPECIFICALLY 4 5 FOCUSING ON ASPECTS OF HOW WE'RE NOMINATING AND EVALUATING AND DESIGNING PCAS WE WANT TO DEVELOP A NEXT VISION FOR PCAS FOR 6 THE FRAMEWORK WHILE ALSO FOCUSING ON DEVELOPING THE GUIDELINES 7 8 AND RESOURCES THAT PROJECT APPLICANTS NEED TO SUPPORT HIGH IMPACT CONSERVATION PLANNING AND POLICY DECISIONS. THERE WILL 9 BE A MAJOR EMPHASIS ON DATA AND MAPPING IN THAT AREA. AND ALL 10 11 OF THESE WILL FOLD INTO VARIOUS MEMOS AND CULMINATE INTO A REPORT OF FINDINGS INCLUDING RECOMMENDED OPTIONS FOR POLICY 12 MAKERS TO CONSIDER WITH RESPECT TO POLICY AND FUNDING. THIS 13 WILL INCLUDE CONSIDERATIONS FOR THE COMPANION PCA GRANT 14 PROGRAM IN ADVANCE OF THE NEXT ITERATION. OUR GOAL IS THIS 15 16 WILL BE A BROAD BASED MULTI-PARTNER MULTI-STAKEHOLDER EFFORT AND COLLABORATION IS GOING TO BE ESSENTIAL. THERE IS LOTS TO 17 LEARN FROM OUR LOCAL JURISDICTION PARTNERS AT THE CITY AND 18 COUNTY LEVEL ABOUT WHAT THE PCA PROGRAM HAS MEANT TO THEM HOW 19 IT FITS INTO THEIR PRIORITIES, IMPLEMENTATION, AND ESPECIALLY 20 21 ROOM FOR IMPROVEMENT. THERE WILL BE OPPORTUNITY FOR 22 PARTICIPATION FROM THE SMALL AND FOCUSED TO THE LARGE AND COMPREHENSIVE. SO WE WILL HAVE ONE-ON-ONE IN SMALL GROUP 23 MEETINGS THERE WILL BE A BIMONTHLY TECHNICAL ADVISORY 24 COMMITTEE THAT WILL MEET BETWEEN 6 AND 8 TIMES OVER THE 25

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PROJECT TIMELINE. THERE WILL BE TWO LARGE VIRTUAL WORKSHOPS AS 1 WELL AS TWO ROUNDS OF SURVEYS. AND IMPORTANT TO RECOGNIZE 2 3 THERE IS A LOT HAPPENING IN THIS SPACE PCAS ARE JUST ONE PART OF A LARGER STORY SO PROGRAMS AND INITIATIVES IS GOING TO BE 4 5 VERY IMPORTANT. INTERNALLY WE HAVE THE BAY TRAIL, THE SAN FRANCISCO ESTUARY PARTNERSHIP, OUR COLLEAGUES IN THE 6 OPERATIONS DEPARTMENT ARE LEADING A NORTH BAY REGIONAL 7 8 CONSERVATION INVESTMENT STRATEGY EFFORT IN COLLABORATION WITH OUR ESTUARY PARTNERSHIP COLLEAGUES, AND ALSO THE BAY AREA 9 REGIONAL COLLABORATIVE AND THE WORK THEY'RE DOING ON THE 10 DEVELOPING A PLANS, AND EXTERNALLY CALIFORNIA COASTAL 11 CONSERVANCY BCDC IS A KEY PARTNER AND HAS EFFORTS MOVING 12 FORWARD ON A SHORELINE ADAPTATION PLAN THE WATER QUALITY 13 CONTROL BOARD 2030 GOALS AND THE OPERATIONAL PLANS. TRYING TO 14 FIGURE OUT HOW ALL THESE THINGS HANG TOGETHER AND COMPLEMENT 15 16 EACH OTHER AND CAN SUPPORT EACH OTHER IS GOING TO BE REALLY IMPORTANT. NEXT SLIDE. SO THERE ARE A LOT OF QUESTIONS THAT 17 WE'RE GOING TO BE TRYING TO EXPLORE WITH THIS PROGRAM. AND YOU 18 KNOW, ONE OF THE BIGGEST ONES IS JUST, YOU KNOW, WHAT THE 19 STATUS OF THE EXISTING PCAS ARE. IN OF OUR EARLY 20 21 INVESTIGATION, WE FOUND THAT SOMETHING UPWARDS OF 30 TO 40% OF THESE PCAS MAY ALREADY BE IN OFFICIALLY CONSERVED AREAS. AND, 22 AS PREVIOUSLY STATED, IF THE GOAL OF THE PROGRAM WAS REALLY 23 ABOUT PROTECTING AT-RISK LANDS, MAYBE THAT'S MISSION 24 ACCOMPLISHED. BY CONTRAST IF WHAT WE'RE REALLY THINKING ABOUT 25

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IS MAYBE MORE OF A MAINTENANCE AND MANAGEMENT LENS WHERE, YOU 1 2 KNOW, WE REALLY WANT TO DOUBLE DOWN ON ADAPTATION AND 3 RESILIENCE, YOU KNOW, CONTINUING TO SUPPORT LANDS THAT MAY ALREADY -- MAY BE PROTECTED COULD STILL HAVE A LOT OF VALUE. 4 5 DATA AROUND PCAS IS VARIABLE AND PARTNERS IS GOING TO BE IMPORTANT. DATA MAPPING ON THAT FRONT, THERE IS A LOT OUT 6 THERE AND MAKING IT SIMPLE AND ACCESSIBLE FOR PARTNERS AND 7 8 BALANCING GOALS, ECOSYSTEM, EQUITY, RESILIENCE, HOUSING, AND ALWAYS TYING BACK TO PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 WHICH IS SORT OF A 9 GUIDING LIGHT FOR OUR EFFORTS. AND FINALLY, PARTNERSHIPS AT 10 THE END OF THE DAY THE OBAG THREE PROGRAM HAS LIMITED FUNDS TO 11 SUPPORT PCAS SO HOW CAN WE ALIGN WITH OTHER RELEVANT FUNDING 12 SOURCES TO SUPPORT FLEXIBILITY, SCALEABILITY, AS WELL AS EASE 13 OF NAVIGATION. NEXT SLIDE. IN TERMS OF THE SCOPE OF WORK AND 14 15 TIMELINE WE'RE GOING TO BRING FORWARD A CONSULTANT SERVICES 16 CONTRACT FOR APPROVAL AT THE MTC ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE IN JULY USING THOSE STATE GRANT DOLLARS. WE'RE GOING TO CONTINUE 17 SOME OF OUR INITIAL DATA COLLECTION, CURATION AND ANALYSIS AND 18 KICKOFF STAKEHOLDER AND PARTNER OUTREACH INCLUDING THE FIRST 19 TECHNICAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE LATER THIS SUMMER OR EARLY FALL. 20 21 WE WILL BE RETURNING TO COMMITTEES AT KEY JUNCTURES INCLUDING JOINT PLANNING IN WINTER AND SPRING AND SUMMER OF 2023 AND 22 THIS WILL INCLUDE PRESENTATIONS TO THE ABAG EXECUTIVE BOARD AS 23 WELL. NEXT SLIDE. THAT CONCLUDES OUR PRESENTATION. THANK YOU 24

4 EDDIE AHN, V. CHAIR: THANKS FOR THAT. ANY DISCUSSION FROM
5 FELLOW COMMISSIONERS? OH, YES. COMMISSIONER CONNOLY, PLEASE?

DAMON CONNOLLY: THANK YOU. GOOD MORNING EVERYONE. GREAT 7 8 PRESENTATION. IT'S WORTH NOTING THAT IN PRIOR CYCLES OBAG, THE FOUR NORTH BAY COUNTIES EACH RECEIVED SPECIFIC AMOUNTS FROM 9 10 THE PCA PROGRAM. AND I THINK THE PCA PROGRAM FUNDS WERE, IN PART, MEANT TO MAKE UP FOR THE RELATIVELY SMALL SHARE OF OTHER 11 OBAG FUNDS THAT THE NORTH BAY COUNTIES RECEIVED, RECOGNIZING 12 THAT THE NORTH BAY CONTAINED A LARGE NUMBER OF PCAS IS IN SOME 13 WAYS THOUGHT OF AS THE REGION'S BACKYARD. SO, WILL THERE BE 14 15 SIMILAR CONSIDERATION FOR OBAG THREE? IE, MORE PCA FUND FOR 16 NORTH BAY? OR HOW THAT HISTORY FITS IN WITH THE PROPOSED 17 STUDY, IS QUESTION ONE. AND THEN MAYBE A COMMENT, THE TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY OF MARIN STAFF HAVE CONSIDERED CARBON 18 SEQUESTRATION IN THE GOALS FOR THE PROGRAM TO ALIGN WITH 19 EFFORTS SUCH AS DRAWN IN MARIN WHICH HAS TAKEN SHAPE IN MARIN, 20 21 IN PARTICULAR. SO, STAFF HAVE ASKED MTC TO CONTINUE COORDINATION WITH TAM AT LOCAL AGENCIES SUCH MARIN COUNTY 22 PARKS AND OPEN SPACE AND WOULD LIKE TO BUILD OFF THE 23 SUCCESSFUL ELEMENTS OF THE EXISTING PROGRAM. THANKS. 24

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CHIRAG RABARI: THANK YOU, COMMISSIONER CONNOLY. WITH RESPECT 1 TO THE NORTH BAY CARVE-OUT, I CAN MAKE A FEW COMMENTS, AND 2 3 THEN I'M NOT SURE IF ANY OF OUR COLLEAGUES FROM OUR FUNDING POLICY AND PROGRAMS TEAM ARE HERE, BUT, I -- IT IS ONE 4 5 IMPORTANT NOTE TO ADD IS IN 2020, THERE WAS A -- SOME FINDINGS WE DID RECEIVE FROM FHWA, YOU KNOW, REGARDING HOW CERTAIN 6 ASPECTS OF THE OBAG PROGRAM WERE ADMINISTERED AND ONE OF THOSE 7 8 FINDINGS RELATED TO, YOU KNOW, SUBALLOCATIONS TO JURISDICTIONS. AND I THINK THERE IS STILL SOME OUESTION 9 INTERNALLY ABOUT WHAT THAT MEANS FOR THE SPECIFIC CARVE-OUT 10 FOR THE NORTH BAY. SO, THAT'S SOMETHING THAT IS STILL BEING 11 EVALUATED. SO, YOU KNOW, FIRST, THAT WOULD BE SORT OF THE 12 FIRST THING WE HAVE TO ADDRESS, BUT THEN, YOU KNOW, IS THERE A 13 POTENTIAL WORK AROUND? WHAT MIGHT THAT LOOK LIKE, HOW MIGHT 14 15 THAT DIFFER FROM PAST ITERATIONS. YOU KNOW, THAT'S GOING TO BE 16 A KEY THING THAT WE WILL HAVE TO ESTABLISH. BUT, I THINK THERE 17 WILL CERTAINLY BE WAYS THAT WE CAN -- WE CAN EXPLORE HOW TO, YOU KNOW CONSIDER THE NORTH BAY'S UNIQUE NEEDS IN THE CONTEXT 18 OF THE PROGRAM. EVEN IF IT LOOKS POTENTIALLY DIFFERENT THAN IT 19 HAS IN THE PAST. AND, WITH RESPECT TO CARBON SEQUESTRATION, I 20 21 THINK THAT, YOU KNOW, THAT'S DEFINITELY SOMETHING THAT'S ON THE TABLE, IN TERMS OF, YOU KNOW, TRYING TO UNDERSTAND ALL OF 22 THESE DIFFERENT VALUES AND BENEFITS THAT THESE CONSERVATION 23 LANDS HAVE. AND, AGAIN, JUST TRYING TO FIGURE OUT WHAT THE 24 MOST APPROPRIATE WAY TO RANK AND PRIORITIZE THEM. 25

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1 2 DAMON CONNOLLY: GREAT. THANKS. 3 EDDIE AHN, V. CHAIR: COMMISSIONER EKLUND, PLEASE? 4 5 PAT ECKLUND: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. I REALLY THINK THAT THIS 6 REFRESH IS A GOOD OPPORTUNITY FOR US TO LOOK AT WHERE THE PCAS 7 8 WORKED AND WHERE THEY DIDN'T WORK IN THE PAST. ONE OF THE THOUGHTS THAT I HAD IS THAT THERE ARE SOME VERY HIGH FIRE RISK 9 10 AREAS, THOUGH, THAT ARE PRIVATELY OWNED, AND IS IN JEOPARDY OF POTENTIALLY BEING BUILT UPON. SO, I DON'T KNOW, IS THERE SOME 11 THOUGHT TO SEE IF THERE MAY BE AN OPPORTUNITY FOR US TO EXPAND 12 THE PCAS TO AREAS WHERE THERE IS VERY, VERY HIGH FIRE RISK, 13 AND WHERE IT REALLY SHOULDN'T BE BUILT ON? IT'S NOT WITHIN A 14 15 HIGH TRANSIT AREA OR WHATEVER, BUT, IT REALLY NEEDS TO BE, 16 "OPEN SPACE" EVEN THOUGH IT NEEDS TO BE MANAGED. AND NOT MANY PEOPLE HAVE THAT MONEY. SO, I JUST WANT TO THROW OUT THE IDEA 17 THAT, LET'S NOT FORGET ABOUT HIGH FIRE RISK AREAS, AND SEE IF 18 THERE IS A WAY THAT -- IF THERE IS A WAY TO MAKE SENSE TO 19 INCLUDE THAT IN THE PCAS IF NOT, I TOTALLY UNDERSTAND. BUT 20 21 WE'RE NEVER GOING TO HAVE ENOUGH MONEY OR RESOURCES TO DEAL WITH THE VERY HIGH-FIRE RISK AREAS. BUT WE'RE GOING TO HAVE TO 22 DO SOMETHING IN MY OPINION. BECAUSE ALL BUILT ENVIRONMENT IS 23 IN JEOPARDY WITH THOSE OTHER AREAS. SO, COMMENTS FROM THE 24 25 PEANUT GALLERY UP NORTH.

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1 CHIRAG RABARI: THANK YOU MEMBER EKLUND. FIRE RISK IS ONE OF 2 3 THE CLIMATE RISKS THAT WE WILL BE CONSIDERING IN THE PROGRAM. SO, YEAH, DEFINITELY MORE TO COME ON THAT FRONT. 4 5 EDDIE AHN, V. CHAIR: COMMISSIONER CANEPA, YOU'RE UP. 6 7 8 DAVID CANEPA: I HAVE SEVERAL QUESTIONS, MORE ON A STAFF LEVEL. WILL THE EXISTING PCA LEAD PROJECT SPONSORS BE A PART OF THE 9 10 STAKEHOLDER GROUP? 11 CHIRAG RABARI: YES. SORRY. I COULDN'T FIND MY UNMUTE BUTTON 12 FOR A SECOND. WE WILL DEFINITELY BE DOING SIGNIFICANT OUTREACH 13 WITH OUR EXISTING PCA SPONSORS. BECAUSE, AS WE SAID, YOU KNOW, 14 15 ONE OF OUR KEY GOALS IS GOING TO BE UNDERSTANDING, YOU KNOW, 16 THE STRENGTH AND WEAKNESSES OF WHAT HAS WORKED, WHAT HAS NOT WORKED, AND, YOU KNOW, OUR ON THE GROUND PROJECT SPONSORS ARE 17 GOING TO BE OUR BEST INFORMATION RESOURCE FOR DOING THAT. SO 18 THERE WILL DEFINITELY BE SIGNIFICANT ENGAGEMENT WITH OUR PCA 19 PROJECT SPONSORS. 20 21 DAVID CANEPA: GREAT. AND IS THERE -- YOU KNOW, IS THERE A RISK 22 OF CURRENT PCAS, YOU KNOW, LOSING THEIR PCA DESIGNATION? HOW 23 IS THAT SORT OF ACCOUNTED FOR AND ADJUSTED? 24 25

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CHIRAG RABARI: I THINK THIS'S DEFINITELY SOMETHING THAT, YOU 1 KNOW, WE -- YOU KNOW, WE WANT TO DO THIS EVALUATION ABOUT WHAT 2 3 IS WORKING AND WHAT IS NOT WORKING AND REALLY JUST GET A BROAD PICTURE OF, YOU KNOW, THE STATUS OF THESE LANDS. AND I THINK, 4 5 YOU KNOW, WE ARE LIKELY TO EXPLORE WITH OUR PARTNERS JUST DIFFERENT MODELS FOR HOW, YOU KNOW, HOW THE PCA PROCESS COULD 6 MOVE FORWARD. ESPECIALLY IN LIGHT OF THE FACT THAT, YOU KNOW, 7 8 WE HAVE SUCH IMPROVED DATA AVAILABLE. YOU KNOW, I THINK WE'LL REALLY JUST BE TRYING TO EXPLORE DIFFERENT PATHWAYS FORWARD. 9 AND, YOU KNOW, SOME OF THAT, YOU KNOW, COULD, YOU KNOW, COULD 10 PROPOSE MOVING AWAY FROM THE DESIGNATION PROCESS AS ITS 11 EXISTED, AND THE OTHER WILL BE JUST SORT OF CONTINUING, 12 EXPANDING, BUILDING ON THAT PROCESS PUTTING ALL THE 13 CONSIDERATIONS ON THE TABLE AND GETTING FEEDBACK FROM OUR 14 15 PARTNERS ON WHAT THE BEST WAY FORWARD MIGHT BE.

17 DAVID CANEPA: YOU KNOW, ONE OF THE THINGS I THINK ABOUT -- AND 18 I'M SURE YOU'RE GOING TO DO THIS -- IS THE PROJECTS THAT HAVE 19 RECEIVED PREVIOUS OBAG FUNDS. IS THERE, ON THE STAFF LEVEL, 20 ARE YOU GOING TO BE DOING AN ANALYSIS OF THAT? JUST SO THAT WE 21 CAN SORT OF UNDERSTAND WHAT'S -- AND MAYBE IT'S OUT THERE --22 I'M SURE IT IS -- WHAT'S BEEN FUNDED PREVIOUSLY?

24 CHIRAG RABARI: YEAH. WE WILL CERTAINLY BE LOOKING AT JUST A
25 SUMMARY OF THE 56 PROJECTS AND WHAT TYPE OF EFFORTS HAVE BEEN

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SUPPORTED. I THINK, YOU KNOW, ONE OF THE THINGS THAT WE WILL 1 BE LOOKING AT IS, THERE ARE THESE SPECIFIC PROJECT TYPES THAT 2 HAVE BEEN SUPPORTED THROUGH THE PCAS, AND, YOU KNOW, IS THERE 3 AN APPETITE? IS THERE AN INTEREST, FOR MAYBE EXPANDING THE 4 5 SCOPE OF THAT, PROJECT TYPES THAT COULD BE SUPPORTED THROUGH THE PCA PROGRAM. BUT THEN, YOU KNOW, WHAT, AGAIN, ARE THE 6 CHALLENGES OR COMPLICATIONS THAT COULD BE INVOLVED IN DOING 7 8 THAT. SO IT'S DEFINITELY SOMETHING THAT WE'RE GOING TO BE 9 LOOKING AT.

DAVID CANEPA: GREAT. AND NOT TO BE PAROCHIAL, BUT I WILL, ONE 11 OF THE THINGS THAT WE'RE SORT OF LOOKING AT IN CLOSING IS, 12 REGIONAL COMPETITIVE FUNDING FOR SOME OF OUR COSITE PROJECTS. 13 IN SAN MATEO COUNTY WE HAVE ABOUT 44 MILES OF COASTLINE, WHICH 14 15 MAY NOT BE A LOT. MAYBE WE THINK IT IS, BUT WE'RE REALLY 16 TRYING TO IDENTIFY MAYBE ON THE COAST SOME OF THESE PROJECTS. HOPEFULLY WE'LL BE ABLE TO ENGAGE ON A DEEPER AND GREATER 17 LEVEL. BUT, OVERALL, THANK YOU SO MUCH FOR THIS PRESENTATION. 18 I APPRECIATE THAT. AND I REALLY APPRECIATE CHIRAG. THANK YOU. 19 20

21 EDDIE AHN, V. CHAIR: CHAIR ARREGUIN.

JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG ADMINISTRATIVE CHAIR: I WANT TO FOLLOW UP
ON A COMMENT THAT COUNCILMEMBER EKLUND MADE WITH REGARD TO
NATURAL HAZARDS. OBVIOUSLY A LOT HAS CHANGED SINCE PCAS WERE

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ESTABLISHED AND WE FACE INCREASING CLIMATE RISK AND OTHER
 NATURAL HAZARD THERE IS LOTS HAPPENING IN THE BAY AREA THERE
 IS BAY ADAPT PROCESS, NATURE BASED SOLUTIONS TO ADDRESS SEA
 REVEL RISE. I'M JUST CURIOUS HOW WE'RE GOING TO INTEGRATE
 THOSE POLICIES WITH THE EFFORTS AND PCA UPDATE?

CHIRAG RABARI: WE ARE ENGAGED WITH OUR COLLEAGUES AT BCDC, WE 7 8 ARE ENGAGED WITH COLLEAGUES AT BARC, WE HAVE HAD INITIAL CONVERSATIONS WITH THE COASTAL CONSERVANCY, AND I THINK, 9 10 AGAIN, THERE ARE A NUMBER OF DIFFERENT WAYS THAT THIS COORDINATION COULD PROCEED. AND I THINK WE'RE DEFINITELY 11 EXPLORING THE DIFFERENT WAYS THAT MIGHT HAPPEN. I THINK 12 SHARING OF DATA AND MAPPING RESOURCES IS SOMETHING THAT WE 13 HAVE ALL KIND OF MUTUALLY DISCUSSED. YOU KNOW, EVALUATING THE 14 15 GOALS AND VISIONS OF THE EFFORT AND LOOKING FOR AREAS OF 16 ALIGNMENT WHERE POSSIBLE. AND, THEN, I THINK FINALLY ON THE FUNDING PIECE, AS WELL, YOU KNOW, TRYING TO, KIND OF, 17 UNDERSTAND HOW ALL THESE DIFFERENT FUNDING SOURCES CAN BE, YOU 18 KNOW, COMPLEMENTARY TO ONE ANOTHER. THOSE ARE ALL THINGS THAT 19 WE HAVE BEEN DISCUSSING AND ARE LOOKING FORWARD TO 20 21 COLLABORATING ON.

JESSE ARREGUIN, ABAG ADMINISTRATIVE CHAIR: GREAT. YEAH. I
MEAN, I -- THERE IS GOING TO BE MORE FUNDING THAT'S LIKELY
GOING TO BE AVAILABLE FOR THIS, YOU KNOW, THIS TYPE OF CLIMATE

ADAPTATION WORK. AND, SO, I THINK THE MORE WE CAN KIND OF

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2 BRAID THE RESOURCES TOGETHER TO HAVE THE MOST IMPACT, I THINK 3 THAT COULD, YOU KNOW, HELP MOVE SOME OF THESE PROJECTS FORWARD. SO, THANK YOU FOR YOUR CONSIDERATION OF, NOT JUST HOW 4 5 WE ARE PRESERVING OPEN SPACE AND EXPANDING OPEN SPACE AND NATURAL HABITAT, BUT, ALSO, HOW WE'RE DOING THROUGH THE LENS 6 7 OF EQUITY AND ADDRESSING CLIMATE CHANGE. THANK YOU. 8 EDDIE AHN, V. CHAIR: COMMISSIONER RABBIT? 9 10 DAVID RABBIT: THANK YOU VERY MUCH. I APPRECIATE THE 11 DISCUSSION. THANKS FOR THE WORK. AND I WANT TO ECHO THE 12 COMMENTS OF MY COLLEAGUE FROM MARIN COUNTY REGARDING THE 13 IMPORTANCE OF THE PRIORITY CONSERVATION AREAS IN THE NORTH 14 BAY. AND I THINK IT'S SAFE TO SAY THAT THE NORTH BAY COUNTIES 15 16 WERE INSTRUMENTAL IN ESTABLISHING PCAS ORIGINALLY. AND THE NEED TO HAVE NATURAL AREAS OF REFUGE, I THINK, ARE SERVE URBAN 17 AREAS, IS PARAMOUNT. WE ALL KNOW THAT. OUR COUNTY ALONE HAS 8 18 MILLION VISITORS A YEAR PRIMARILY FROM YOUR JURISDICTIONS, TO 19 BE HONEST, COMING UP NORTH. AND THE THAT'S GREAT. IT SHOULD 20 21 BE. AND I AM SURE MARIN COUNTY HAS A SIGNIFICANT AMOUNT OF VISITORS AS DOES NAPA. IT'S TO BE TAKEN INTO ACCOUNT I THINK 22 FOR THE ENTIRE BAY AREA TO UNDERSTAND THE IMPORTANCE OF THIS 23 TYPE OF ASSISTANCE GOING FORWARD. I ALSO KNOW, WE HAVE HAD SAD 24 HISTORY OF MAJOR WILDFIRES OVER THE LAST FIVE YEARS MAJOR 25

WILDLAND FIRES LOSS OF LIFE WE HAVE INVESTED TENS OF MILLIONS 1 OF DOLLARS IN FUEL MANAGEMENT. ALL NINE CITIES HAVE CITY 2 3 CENTER GROWTH, WE HAVE URBAN BOUNDARY GREENBELTS AND A QUARTER CENT SALES TAX, THAT'S WHY THE PCAS IN THE NORTH BAY ARE SO 4 5 IMPORTANT. SO FOR THE INFILL DEVELOPMENT AND PROTECTING THE AREAS OF THE BAY AREA LANDS. AND BECAUSE OF PROPERTY VALUES 6 AND THE PANDEMIC SHOWING THAT EVEN MORE PEOPLE FROM OTHER 7 8 COUNTIES OR COMMUNITY ARE COMMUTE BE AROUND SO THEY DON'T HAVE TO COMMUTE AS FAR. THE AUDIT FINDINGS, THE SUBALLOCATIONS ARE 9 AN ISSUE BUT I AM CONVINCED THAT STAFF CAN CONTINUE WORKING ON 10 THAT AND WE CAN OVERCOME THAT AND WE CAN KEEP ON THAT SAME 11 PRIORITY GIVEN TO THE NORTH BAY COUNTIES THAT DO PROVIDE THAT 12 RESPITE FOR FOLKS THAT FROM ALL OTHER COUNTIES. AND I DO 13 APPRECIATE THAT. TALK ABOUT CLIMATE ADAPTATION THAT'S WHAT 14 15 VEGETATION MANAGEMENT REALLY IS. AND WE HAVE ALSO, SONOMA 16 COUNTY WAS 1 OF 3 ENTITIES TO PUT UP MONEY FOR THE BAY AREA, \$25 TAX THAT WE HAVE IN ALL NINE COUNTIES, FOR THE BAY WORK. 17 BECAUSE WE KNOW THAT THE BAY LANDS, DOWN AT THE SOUTHERN PART 18 OF OUR COUNTY IS IMPORTANT. BUFFER, TO ALLOW THAT TO OCCUR 19 WITHOUT DAMAGING TOO MUCH INFRASTRUCTURE, SAFE WORK, OF 20 21 COURSE, HIGHWAY 37. AGAIN THANK YOU FOR ALL THE WORK. APPRECIATE THAT. JUST WANT TO KEEP THAT IN MIND AS WE GO 22 FORWARD. 23

2 ALSO SEE COMMISSIONER DUTRA-VERNACI HAS HER HAND RAISED. 3 CAROL DUTRA-VERNACI: OH OKAY. I APOLOGIZE. I SPACED OUT THERE 4 5 FOR JUST A SECOND, COMMISSIONER AHN. IN ANY CASE, I'M LISTENING TO ALL THE COMMISSIONERS TALK ABOUT THEIR AREAS. I 6 JUST FELT LIKE I HAD TO CHIME IN FOR MY TOWN, UNION CITY. 7 8 UNION CITY IS 18 SQUARE MILES AND HALF OF IT, NINE SQUARE MILES IS ACTUALLY ALL IN THE HILLS. AND BACK IN 1996, THE 9 VOTERS SAID THERE SHOULD BE NO BUILDING IN THE HILLS UNLESS 10 IT'S APPROVED BY THE VOTERS. SO WE HAVE ALREADY HAD A COUPLE 11 OF ELECTION WHERE IS WE HAVE MANAGED TO KEEP THOSE HILLSIDES 12 SAFE AND NOT DEVELOPED. AND I MENTION THIS, BECAUSE AS WE TALK 13 ABOUT THESE PRIORITY CONSERVATION AREAS, AS ITS LOOKED AT FOR 14 THE AREA AROUND UNION CITY, I WOULD CERTAINLY BE VERY 15 16 INTERESTED IN, AS THAT BEING STUDIED, BECAUSE IT'S VERY COSTLY, TIME CONSUMING, AND WHAT HAVE YOU TO KEEP GOING BACK 17 AND BATTLING WITH THE VOTERS TO SAY, NO. IT'S IMPORTANT TO 18 HAVE THE OPEN SPACE FOR SO MANY REASONS. SO, PLEASE DO MAKE 19 SURE THAT'S PUT ON THE LIST AND TAKEN A LOOK AT. BECAUSE GOING 20 21 BACK YEAR AFTER YEAR FIGHTING OFF DEVELOPERS FOR A VERY IMPORTANT PIECE OF PROPERTY IS JUST IMPORTANT PERSONALLY TO ME 22 AND A LOT OF FOLKS IN MY PART OF ALAMEDA COUNTY. THANK YOU. 23 24

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EDDIE AHN, V. CHAIR: I'M GENERALLY VERY APPRECIATIVE OF 1 2 COMMISSIONERS FROM THE NORTH BAY COMMENTING ON, PARTICULARLY, 3 SEA LEVEL RISE, AND FIRE HAZARDS. I'M HOPING AS WE ADVANCE THESE PROGRAMS THOSE CONSIDERATIONS ARE OF COURSE PUT INTO 4 5 PLACE. ANY OTHER STAFF RESPONSE BEFORE WE MOVE ON TO PUBLIC 6 COMMENT, TO ANYTHING PREVIOUS COMMISSIONERS HAVE TALKED ABOUT? 7 8 CHIRAG RABARI: I WAS GOING TO BRIEFLY NOTE, FOR COMMISSIONER DUTRA-VERNACI, WE WOULD BE HAPPY TO FOLLOW UP TO DISCUSS SOME 9 10 OF YOUR SPECIFIC THINGS THIS WE CAN LOOK AT FOR YOU. SO, THANK YOU. 11 12 EDDIE AHN, V. CHAIR: THANK YOU CHIRAG. WITH THAT SAID, IS 13 THERE ANY PUBLIC COMMENT, WRITTEN OR OTHERWISE, LINED UP FOR 14 15 US, MARTHA? 16 CLERK OF THE BOARD: THERE WAS NO WRITTEN CORRESPONDENCE 17 RECEIVED ON THIS ITEM, AND THERE ARE NO MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC 18 WITH THEIR HANDS RAISED. 19 20 EDDIE AHN, V.
