RIGHT NOW, TODAY, LEVEL ONE SET OF PROJECTS INCLUDES THOSE AS SIGNIFICANT AS I 4 5 DESCRIBED EARLIER, SIGNIFICANT, THAT, I DON'T ANTICIPATE CHANGING GOING FORWARD. THAT SAID, WHAT'S IMPORTANT IN THE REBALANCING IS 11 HAVING A MUCH CLEARER UNDERSTANDING OF WHAT READINESS CRITERIA 12 ENTAILS AND THAT'S WHERE WE'RE GOING TO BE BRINGING FORWARD, 13 WITH THE STAGE GATE PROCESS IS, IS IT READY IN LEVEL ONE THAT 14 15 ESTABLISHES, AND THE QUESTION IS WHAT WOULD BE THE FACTORS TO 16 CONSIDER IN REBALANCING. ONE OF THE KEY THINGS TO THAT WOULD BE RELATIVE TO THE READINESS OF PROJECTS AT THAT POINT IN 17 TIME, AND THAT WOULD BE BASED ON A NUMBER OF CONSIDERATIONS 18 THAT WILL ARTICULATED IN TERMS OF A SET OF CRITERIA. 23 SAM LICCARDO: RIGHT. WE'RE LITERALLY GETTING DIRECTIONS FROM

ABLE TO GET THE MONEY YOU NEED IN THE TIME YOU NEED IT, SO I'M 1 TRYING TO FIGURE OUT HOW TO BALANCE THAT. OBVIOUSLY WE'RE ALL 2 3 ON A TIGHT ROPE. I UNDERSTAND EVERYBODY IS IN A SIMILAR POSITION. I CAN VOTE FOR THIS.
