- 11 WILL BE ABLE TO GIVE YOU A SENSE THAT WHAT WE REALLY DO HAVE,
- 12 AND HAVE ACCOMPLISHED IS THIS LONG-TERM NORTH STAR THAT WE'RE
- 13 GOING ADHERE TO GOING FORWARD, BUT ALSO THAT PLANNED BAY AREA
- 14 2050, AND THIS ACTION ELEMENT IS A STRATEGIC MAP FOR WHAT THE
- 15 REGION NEEDS TO DO, FOR WHAT -- FOR BOTH MTC AND ABAG. AND,
- 16 SO, I JUST WANTED TO, YOU KNOW, OFFER THAT I'M SO INCREDIBLY
- 17 PROUD OF OUR STAFF THAT HAS PULLED THIS TOGETHER, OF THE
- 18 PARTNERSHIPS THAT WE HAVE BUILT, AND REALLY HONORED TO HAVE,

- 22 PLAN WAS DRIVEN BY THE PUBLIC THAT CRAFTED EQUITABLE RESILIENT
- 23 STRATEGIES TO ALIGN WITH THE PLANS TO ADOPT A VISION OF AN
- 24 AFFORDABLE CONNECTED DIVERSE HEALTHY AND VIBRANT BAY AREA FOR
- 25 ALL RESIDENTS BY 2050 AND DOING ALL OF THIS EXCEEDING FEDERAL



- 1 ASK AND STATE PLANNING REQUIREMENTS INCLUDING STATE-MANDATED
- 2 REDUCTION AND PER CAPITA GREENHOUSE GASSES SIGNIFICANTLY
- 3 EXPANDING HOUSING FOCUS AND ADDING NEW ECONOMY AND ENVIRONMENT
- 4 ELEMENTS INCLUDED A MUCH STRONGER COMMITMENT TO
- 5 IMPLEMENTATION. AS PART OF THE PLAN PROCESS, EVALUATING
- 6 FACTORS WOULD CONTRIBUTE TO STRATEGY SUCCESS INCLUDING
- 7 AUTHORITY, FINANCIAL RESOURCES, TECHNICAL CAPACITY AND PUBLIC
- 8 AND POLITICAL SUPPORT. WHETHER MTC OR ABAG SHOULD LEAD,
- 9 PARTNER, OR SUPPORT STRATEGY IMPLEMENTATION AND ULTIMATELY
- 10 IDENTIFIED OVER 80 IMPLEMENTATION ACTIONS THAT MTC AND ABAG
- 11 COULD ADVANCE OVER A FIVE-YEAR PERIOD TO SUPPORT THE 30 YEAR
- 12 STRATEGIES INCLUDED IN THE PLAN AND WE DIDN'T WANT THESE
- 13 IMPLEMENTATIONS COMMITMENTS TO JUST SIT ON THE SHELF SO, THE
- 14 IMPLEMENTATION PLAN INCLUDED TWO KEY ACTIONS WITH RESPECT TO
- 15 TRACKING OUR PROGRESS. FIRST, DEEPER INTEGRATION WITH VITAL
- 16 SIGNS THE REGIONAL PERFORMANCE MONITORING TOOL AND SOAKED
- 17 ANNUAL PROGRESS UPDATES TO MTC AND ABAG. AND THIS OBVIOUSLY
- 18 HAS A LOT OF INTRINSIC VALUE JUST FOR ACCOUNTABILITY PURPOSES
- 19 BUT I THINK IT'S ALSO PART IMPORTANT TO NOTE WHERE STATE
- 20 REGULATORS AND POLICY MAKERS ARE TAKING A MUCH KEENER INTEREST
- 21 SO WE SHOULD EXPECT MORE ACTIVITY ON THAT FRONT MOVING
- 22 FORWARD. NEXT SLIDE. VITAL SIGNS IS A DATA-DRIVEN WEB SITE
- 23 THAT TRACKS BAY AREA TRENDS RELATED TO TRANSPORTATION, LAND
- 24 AND PEOPLE, THE ECONOMY, THE ENVIRONMENT, AND SOCIAL EQUITY.
- 25 AND IT CURRENTLY TRACKS OVER 40 KEY INDICATORS MANY OF WHICH



- 1 CAN OFFER INSIGHTS INTO HOW THE REGION IS DOING IN AREAS
- 2 RELATIVE TO PLANNED TRANSPORTATION. UPDATE AND REFRESH OF
- 3 VITAL SIGNS IS IN THE WORKS BUT WE GET A SNEAK PEEK AT SELECT
- 4 INDICATORS WHICH OFFER A LENS ON GETTING THE CURRENT PULSE OF
- 5 THE REGION. THE BIG PICTURE TAKE AWAY HERE IS WE'RE STILL

- 25 INDICATORS. AND I THINK, AS EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR MCMILLAN

- 2 AS WE'RE IMPLEMENTING THE 30 YEAR VISION IT'S IMPORTANT TO
- 3 KEEP MOVING FORWARD WITH OUR IDENTIFIED PRIORITIES. NEXT
- 4 SLIDE. SO, MOVING ON TO OUR PROGRESS UPDATE, I WANT TO

- 17 DEVELOPING AND ANALYZING THOSE NETWORK MANAGEMENT CONCEPTS FOR
- 18 THE BAY AREA AS WELL AS CONTINUING THE IMPORTANT WORK ON THE
- 19 ROLL OUT OF NEXT GENERATION CLIPPER. IN THE PLANNING REALM,
- 20 THE BAHFA BUSINESS PLAN EQUITY FRAMEWORK AND DRAFT FUNDING
- 21 COMPONENTS ARE GOING TO BE PRESENTS FOR THE BOARD'S
- 22 CONSIDERATION AND LASTLY KICKING OFF THE NEXT UPDATE TO
