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

WELCOME HER. CONTINUING 17 18 ON WITH OUR CHAIR'S REPORT. I DON'T HAVE A LOT TO REPORT. ILAF AND I MET YESTERDAY WITH THE EXECUTIVE TEAM AND WITH THE CHAIR 19 AND VICE CHAIR OF THE COMMISSION TO START WORKING ON 20 21 DEVELOPING OUR PLAN FOR NEXT YEAR, AND OUR WORK PLAN, AND THAT KIND OF LINES UP WITH THE SURVEY THAT ILAF SENT OUT, OR KY-NAM 22 23 SENT OUT A SHORT WHILE AGO. CHAIR, ILAF ESUF: WAS NOT PREPARED TO DA THAT. 2 3 RANDI KINMAN, CHAIR: YOU KNOW ME. 4 5 TEDDY KY-NAM MILLER: THE SURVEY RESULTS AREN'T IN BECAUSE WE 6 DIDN'T HAVE FULL PARTICIPATION, I'LL SEND AN E-MAIL OUT SO BY 7 8 NEXT MEETING WE'LL HAVE THE SURVEY RESULTS BACK OUT. 9 RANDI KINMAN, CHAIR: OKAY. IT'S REALLY IMPORTANT THAT WE GET 10 THIS SURVEY DONE BECAUSE THAT WILL ALLOW US TO KNOW WHERE THE 11 HOLES ARE, AND WHERE WE HAVE COME THROUGH SO FAR, BECAUSE I 12 KNOW THAT WITH A BODY THIS BIG AND WITH SO MANY NEW PEOPLE 13 THERE ARE GAPS THAT NEED TO BE FILLED. BUT THE OTHER THING IS 14 15 THE COMMISSION REALLY WANTS US TO DO DEEP INTENSIVE DIVES ON 16 SOME BUSINESS IS AND MAKE SURE THAT WE HAVE THE TIME AND THE RESOURCES TO DO THAT. SO, WE NEED TO BE THINKING OF WHAT'S 17 COMING UP AND WHAT'S ON OUR WORK PLAN ALREADY, AND HOW WE'RE 18 GOING TO MANAGE THAT. SO, JUST KEEP THAT IN THE BACK OF YOUR 19 20 HEAD, AND IF YOU HAVE ANY QUESTIONS, LET ME KNOW, AND I SEE 21 CHRISTINE FITZGERALD'S HAND UP. 22 23 CHRISTINE FITZGERALD: OKAY. THANKS RANDI. I JUST HAD A QUICK QUESTION. WHAT IS THE CURRENT FEELING ABOUT THE END COMING, 24 SUNSETTING, AND WE'RE TRYING TO HAVE EXTENDED THE HYBRID 25



MEETING, MAKING SURE THAT WE CAN TILL DO THIS, GOING INTO THE 1 FUTURE, A.B. 4224 IS OUT THERE AND BEING WORKED ON, BUT WHAT 2 3 WE HAVE RIGHT NOW, IS SUNSETTING SOON. 4 5 RANDI KINMAN, CHAIR: SO, MARTHA I HEARD THAT THE COMMISSION IS GOING BACK TO IN-PERSON MEETINGS IN MARCH. IS THAT GOING TO 6 7 HAPPEN FOR US TOO? 8 9 CLERK, MARTHA SILVER: YEP. I BELIEVE SO. 10 RANDI KINMAN, CHAIR: OKAY. REBECCA, IS THAT CORRECT? IT ENDS 11 IN MARCH? 12 13 REBECCA LONG: YES. REBECCA LONG: I DON'T ACTUALLY KNOW THE ANSWER TO THAT. DO YOU 1 2 KNOW, MARTHA? 3 CLERK, MARTHA SILVER: I DON'T. THAT'S A KATHLEEN AND YOU 4 5 QUESTION. [LAUGHTER] 6 REBECCA LONG: YEAH. I APOLOGIZE CHAIR KINMAN, WE CAN 7 8 DEFINITELY GET BACK TO YOU ON THAT. I DO THINK, CERTAINLY, THE CALL-IN OPTION WILL REMAIN FOR THE PUBLIC. AND THERE IS, ALSO 9 -- EXCUSE ME -- A MECHANISM FOR BOARD MEMBERS TO PARTICIPATE 10 REMOTELY, BUT IT'S, YOU KNOW, IT'S FAIRLY RESTRICTIVE. AND IF ANYBODY ELSE WHO 6 IS PART OF THAT DISCUSSION WANTED TO WEIGH IN, THAT WOULD BE 7 WELCOME. 8 RANDI KINMAN, CHAIR: SO, I'M GOING -- I DON'T USUALLY DO THIS. 9 BUT BECAUSE MOST OF YOU ARE NEW TO THIS, DURING THE PANDEMIC, 10 WHEN THE TRANSIT AGENCIES ALL STARTED CRASHING BECAUSE IT'S 11 HARD TO MAINTAIN A TRANSIT AGENCY WHEN NOBODY'S RIDING OR 12 GOING ANYWHERE, THERE WAS A BLUE RIBBON TASK FORCE THAT WAS 13 ESTABLISHED, AND ONE OF THE MAIN FEATURES OF THE BLUE RIBBON 14 15 TASK FORCE, WHICH WENT ON FOR QUITE A LONG TIME, WITH A 16 TREMENDOUS AMOUNT OF PUBLIC INPUT, WAS THAT OUR 27 OR SO BAY 17 AREA TRANSIT AGENCIES NEEDED A NETWORK MANAGEMENT SYSTEM. A, SOMETHING THAT WOULD ASSIST THE PUBLIC IN BEING ABLE TO TRACK 18 DOWN WHO TO COMPLAIN TO, IF NOTHING ELSE, BUT ALSO TO 19 COORDINATE ALL OF THE SYSTEM'S NEEDS, SO THAT THERE WAS A 20 21 PLACE TO GO TO. RIGHT NOW, THE AGENCIES TALK TO EACH OTHER, AND THEY MAY OR MAY NOT BE COMPATIBLE, BUT THERE IS NOTHING 22 THAT -- WELL IS NOTHING IN WRITING. THERE IS NO STRUCTURE TO 23 MAINTAIN THESE RELATIONSHIPS, AND IF THERE IS ANYTHING THAT I 24

HAVE LEARNED IS THAT IF YOU DON'T HAVE A STRUCTURE THAT PEOPLE

- 12 THE MTC EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, THAT MEET AND WORK ON, AND THEY

BUT I BELIEVE ANNE OLIVIA HAS HER A HAND UP. 3 ANNE OLIVIA ELDRED: DID YOU WANT ME TO GIVE MY REPORT FROM THE 4 5 ADVISORY GROUP? 6 7 RANDI KINMAN, CHAIR: YES. 8 ANNE OLIVIA ELDRED: WE MET OCTOBER 18TH, AND IT WAS REALLY 9 DISH WANT TO GIVE SOME PROPS TO STAFF RIGHT NOW. THAT. AND I HAVE ASKED IF STAFF WILL LOOK AT AL INTERPRETIVE



- 1 FUNDING SOURCES AS WAYS TO FUND THE OTHER PROGRAMMATIC
- 2 PRIORITIES OUTLINED IN PLANNED BAY AREA 2050, OR IF IT IS A --
- 3 THIS REVENUE TOOL, OR NOTHING. AND MY UNDERSTANDING FROM THEIR
- 4 RESPONSE IS THAT THIS ANSWER IS NOT COMPLETELY BLACK AND
- 5 WHITE. THEY'RE NOT CONSIDERING OTHER FUNDING SOURCES,
- 6 SPECIFICALLY. BUT, THEY ARE -- SO, THIS STUDY IS LOOKING AT

- 22 A COST ASSOCIATED WITH EACH OF THE PATHWAYS. THE REVENUE
- 23 AMOUNT ASSOCIATED WITH THIS PATHWAY IS SUBSTANTIAL. AND THE
- 24 STUDIES -- AND THIS WAS LAID OUT PRETTY CLEAR -- THE STUD
- 25 THAT'S WE'RE DOING HERE IS A STUDY OF CHARGING PEOPLE TO DRIVE



- 1 IN EVERY LANE OF THE FREEWAY. RIGHT? AND THAT IS THE TWO
- 2 THINGS THAT THEY'RE LOOKING AT, ARE IF WE CHARGED EVERYONE TO
- 3 DRIVE ON THE FREEWAY, WE WOULD MAKE THIS MUCH MONEY. AND IF WE
- 4 JUST DON'T, THEN WHAT DOES THE REST OF PLANNED BAY AREA LOOK
- 5 LIKE, IF WE DON'T HAVE THAT REVENUE SOURCE. AND MY PRETTYED
- 6 QUESTION THAT WE'RE WORKING ON GETTING AN ANSWER TO, AND I
- 7 HOPE TO HAVE CLARITY AT THE NEXT MEETING, IS THAT THERE WILL
- 8 BE A -- MINDING IS THERE WILL BE AN EXERCISE THAT LOOKS AT
- 9 COMPLEMENTARY STRATEGIES, BUT THERE IS NOT A STUDY THAT LOOKS
- 10 AT COULD WE MAKE UP THAT DESIGNATED REVENUE AMOUNT WITH A

- 18 RANDI KINMAN, CHAIR: SO, JUST TO FOLLOW UP WITH ADINA'S
- 19 OUESTION, THIS WAS ORIGINALLY PRESENTED TO US AS THE PRIME
- 20 SOLUTION FOR REDUCING GREENHOUSE GAS. IT WAS NOT PRESENTED TO
- 21 US AS A REVENUE GENERATION PROJECT. CORRECT? OKAY.

- 23 ANNE OLIVIA ELDRED: I HAVEN'T SEEN VERY MUCH EVIDENCE THAT
- 24 WOULD SUPPORT THE CLAIM THAT IT REDUCES GREENHOUSE GAS
- 25 EMISSIONS. ONLY BECAUSE OF THE PROPENSITY TO PUSH TRAFFIC INTO



AUXILIARY ROADS, SO THAT WOULD ACTUALLY INCREASE IT. BUT, 1 2 UNLESS THERE WAS ACCOMPANYING ROBUST STRATEGIES THAT 3 SUCCESSFULLY MOVED PEOPLE INTO PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION --4 5 RANDI KINMAN, CHAIR: THAT WAS WHAT THEY SAID. PEOPLE WILL BE USING PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION. IT'S OUR BIGGEST WAY OF GETTING 6 7 OUR GHG REDUCED. SO, I JUST WANT TO BE CLEAR THAT WE'RE TAKING 8 9 ANNE OLIVIA ELDRED: IT'S BEING STUDIED AS A REVENUE SOURCE AS 10 11 OPPOSED TO --12 RANDI KINMAN, CHAIR: RIGHT. DWAYNE? Dwayne HANKERSON: THANK 13 YOU FOR YOUR PRESENTATION. BUT WHAT I'M WONDERING ABOUT IS, 14 HOW IS THIS DECIDED? IS THIS DECIDED BY THE PUBLIC ON A BALLOT 15 16 OR IS THIS DECIDED IN THE EXECUTIVE OFFICES OF MTC? THAT'S REALLY WHAT I WANT TO KNOW. 17 18 ANNE OLIVIA ELDRED: I BELIEVE THAT THIS WOULD BE ONE OF THE 19 STRATEGIES THAT IS IMPLEMENTED AS PART OF PLANNED BAY AREA AND 20 21 THAT -- I CAN'T IMAGINE STAFF PURSUING A BALLOT INITIATIVE, 22 BECAUSE OF THE FAVORIBILITY READINGS. BUT, STAFF RAISED THEIR 23 HAND SO MAYBE REBECCA CAN ANSWER THAT BETTER THAN I CAN.

RANDI KINMAN, CHAIR: REBECCA, GO AHEAD.

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1 REBECCA LONG: REBECCA LONG DIRECTOR OF LEGISLATION AND PUBLIC 2 3 AFFAIRS THIS IS REALLY A STUDY COMING OUT OF PLANNED BAY AREA THAT'S REALLY TRYING TO HAVE A FOCUS ON UNDERSTANDING HOW 4 5 PLANNED BAY AREA SOMETHING THAT WAS LOOKED AT IN THE LONG RANGE PLAN WOULD BE RECEIVED BY THE PUBLIC UNDERSTANDING SOME 6 OF THE EOUITY ALLOCATIONS OF DOING PRICING WHICH AGAIN WAS 7 8 REALLY CONSIDERED AS PART OF PLANNED BAY AREA IN ORDER TO REACH OUR GHG REDUCTION TARGET. IT WAS NOT THE FOCUS TO RAISE 9 REVENUE BUT TO REDUCE GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS AND JUST TRYING 10 TO DRILL DOWN AND UNDERSTAND THAT MORE MTC DOES NOT HAVE THE 11 AUTHORITY TO PUT BROAD TOLLS ON THE HIGHWAY SYSTEM THAT WAS 12 SOMETHING THAT THE COMMISSION DETERMINED THROUGH MUCH COP 13 INSULATION WITH THE PUBLIC AND WAS SOMETHING WE WANTED TO 14 PURSUE WE WOULD HAVE TO GO TO SACRAMENTO ON THAT FURTHERMORE 15 16 THERE MIGHT NEED TO BE SOME CHANGES IN FEDERAL LAW AND STEPS BEFORE WE WOULD BE ABLE TO PURSUE THAT POLICY. 17 18 DWAYNE HANKERSON: MY FOLLOW UP QUESTION OR COMMENT IS, I'M 19 TRYING TO COMPARTMENTALIZING THE ISSUES THAT WE DEAL WITH 20 HERE. WHEN I THINK OF THIS AS A PERSON DRIVING ON ROADS TO GO 21 22 TO WORK AND OTHER TAXES THEY HAVE TO PAY LIKE ON GAS, AND THE GAS REALLY HIGH, WE HAVE TO PAY PER GALLON AND TOLLS, AND 23 PARKING AND BRIDGES, THEY WENT UP, THAT WAS FIVE, NOW TO SEVEN 24



JUST WANT PUT IT OUT THERE TO EXPLORE THE DIFFERENT STRATEGIES 1 2 TO RAISE THE MONEY. 3 RANDI KINMAN, CHAIR: I'M GOING TO ASK FOR A WHITE PAPER FOR US 4 5 TO KNOW WHERE THEY HAVE GOTTEN TO CALENDAR THIS FOR A MORE LENGTHY DISCUSSION. WE HAVE REACHED A POINT WHERE WE NEED TO 6 BETTER NOCHL THE COUNCIL AS A WHOLE, AND HAVE STAFF THERE TO 7 8 ANSWER THESE QUESTIONS. BECAUSE HONESTLY AT THIS POINT I HAVE NOT SEEN HOW THAT I PLAN ON MITIGATING THE IMPACT OF ANY OF 9 10 THIS, ESPECIALLY IN THE URBAN AREAS WHERE THE STREETS ARE GOING TO WIND UP BEING THE FREEWAY BYPASSES, AS THEY ARE WHEN 11 THERE IS AN ACCIDENT ON THE ROAD. SO, THANK YOU, ANNE OLIVIA, 12 FOR THAT REPORT. IS THERE ANY PUBLIC COMMENT? REBECCA, DID YOU 13 HAVE SOMETHING ELSE? 14 15 16 REBECCA LONG: YES. THROUGH THE CHAIR. THANK YOU CHAIR KINMAN. I JUST WANTED TO SUGGEST THAT RATHER THAN HAVING A SUBSEQUENT 17 STAFF REPORT ON THIS, YOU KNOW, THIS IS A STUDY WE'RE DOING TO 18 BETTER UNDERSTAND WHAT THE BAY AREA PUBLIC FEEL ABOUT THIS. 19 THE COMMENTS THAT COUNCILMEMBER HANKERSON JUST RAISED ABOUT 20 21 ALL OF THE OTHER TAXES THAT DRIVERS PAY, THAT IS EXACTLY THE NATURE OF WHAT WE'RE HEARING. I THINK IT WOULD BE THE MOST --22 THE BEST USE OF EVERYONE'S TIME FOR US TO COMPLETE THE STUDY, 23 DO ALL THAT ENGAGEMENT AND COME BACK TO THE POLICY ADVISORY 24

- 23 SUMMER 2024 IT WOULD THEN EVALUATE PROJECT CONCEPTS AS WELL AS
- 24 NETWORKS TO UNDERSTAND COST EFFECTIVENESS AND EQUITY OUTCOMES.

- 14 OUR TRANSIT VISION WOULD BE THE BEST PATH FORWARD TO MEET THE
- 15 MOMENT IN THIS POST-PANDEMIC ENVIRONMENT. NEXT SLIDE. SO,
- 16 WHAT'S NEXT FOR THE MONTHS AHEAD. HAVING LED PLANNED BAY AREA
- 17 IN 2017, I AM NOW PASSING THE BATON TO MY COLLEAGUE CHIRAG
- 18 RABARI WHO WILL SERVE AS PROJECT MANAGER THIS TIME AROUND FOR
- 19 PLANNED BAY AREA 2050 PLUS AND FRESH OFF THE RECENTLY ADOPTED
- 20 TOC EFFORT MY COLLEAGUE KARA VUICICH WILL STEP INTO A NEW ROLE
- 21 AS THE PROJECT MANAGER FOR TRANSIT 2050, GOING INTO 2023 YOU
- 22 WILL HEAR UPDATES FROM BOTH OF THESE RELATED PROJECTS FROM
- 23 THEM WE LOOK FORWARD TO AN ACTIVE ROLE FOR THE POLICY ADVISORY
- 24 COUNCIL ON THE NEXT ROUND OF INTEGRATED REGIONAL PLANNING.
- 25 WITH THAT I WILL WRAP UP AND WE'RE HAPPY TO TAKE QUESTIONS OR

- 14 TRANSIT AGENCY STAFF, AND THAT WORKED EXTREMELY WELL WITH THE
- 15 FARE INTEGRATION WORK. SO I'M GLAD TO SEE THAT BEING PROPOSED
- 16 TO CONTINUE. AND THEN THE LAST TWO QUESTIONS ARE, IN TERMS OF
