

## Quantitative Survey on Housing Investments

**Goals:** Test different funding mechanisms and quantify impact of a simulated campaign effort

#### Quantitative Survey on Revenue Viability


**Goals:** Test whether it is viable to do two regional revenue measures (housing and transportation) on the same ballot

2,098 interviews November 2019 Hybrid email-to-web/telephone methodology

Voters are very concerned about housing for others, and about half are concerned about housing for themselves.




## Regional Approach

We need a regional approach to housing in the Bay Area, not simply city by city policies





#### Regional Approach

"We need a regional approach to housing in the Bay Area, not simply city by city policies."





#### **Support for Regional Housing Measure**



Support for a potential housing bond hovers right around two-thirds.

Shall an ordinance to provide: affordable housing for Bay Area residents including low income families, veterans, seniors, persons with disabilities and those experiencing homelessness, and affordable housing near transit to shorten commutes and help working families like teachers and first responders afford local housing by issuing \$10,000,000,000 in general obligation bonds with an estimated levy of 35 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value, generating \$670,000,000 annually for approximately 30 years, with oversight and audits, be adopted?



## **Measure Language Tested (Nov 2019)**



Shall an ordinance to reduce Bay Area traffic congestion and provide affordable housing for vulnerable residents with: a reliable, affordable, accessible and sustainable integrated regional rapid transit network of rail, bus and ferries; and through affordable housing near transit to shorten commutes, by enacting a one-cent sales tax, with oversight and audits, and issuing \$10,000,000,000 in general obligation bonds, with an estimated levy of 35 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value of real property, be adopted?


Shall an ordinance to provide: affordable housing for Bay Area residents including low income families, veterans, seniors, persons with disabilities and those experiencing homelessness, and affordable housing near transit to shorten commutes and help working families like teachers and first responders afford local housing by issuing \$10,000,000,000 in general obligation bonds with an estimated levy of 35 cents per \$1,000 of assessed value, generating \$670,000,000 annually for approximately 30 years, with oversight and audits, be adopted?

Shall an ordinance to reduce traffic congestion and make the Bay Area's transportation system reliable, affordable, accessible, connected and sustainable with: integrated regional rapid transit connecting major cities; modernized BART, trains, ferries, and buses improving speed and safety; integrated schedules and fares throughout the region; and improved bike and pedestrian safety features; by enacting a [40 year] one-cent sales tax [until ended by voters], generating at least \$1,600,000,000 annually, with oversight and audits, be adopted?

#### Support for a Housing and/or Transportation Measure (Nov 2019)



A combo measure is well short of the threshold. The housing bond alone hovers around the two-thirds threshold.



#### **Conclusions**



- Concern about housing affordability continues to be at an all-time high.
- Recent research has shown support for a regional housing measure consistently around the two-thirds mark, but not solidly above.
- As with any two-thirds measure, neutralizing potential opposition will be critical.
- Overall, the research indicates that the right measure may be feasible, but additional work, a strong campaign, no opposition, and the right environment will be necessary.
