MTC Resolution No. 4485 and ABAG Resolution No. 09-21: Final Plan Bay Area 2050

Subject:

Request referral of MTC Resolution No. 4485 and ABAG Resolution No. 09-21 to the Joint Commission and ABAG Executive Board meeting on October 21, 2021 for adoption.

Background:

In February 2018, MTC and ABAG initiated a new cycle of long-range planning for the San Francisco Bay Area with the Horizon initiative, designed to prioritize resilient and equitable strategies in an increasingly uncertain future. Stress-testing strategies for the region's future – against a broad range of external forces like telecommuting adoption, economic boom-bust cycles, and changing land use preferences – helped create a solid foundation for Plan Bay Area 2050. Starting in late 2019, the Plan Bay Area 2050 Blueprint phase further enhanced strategies to accelerate equitable outcomes through deep public and stakeholder engagement – both inperson and virtual. As the COVID-19 pandemic impacted the Bay Area throughout 2020, Blueprint strategies were further refined to account for this new reality, even as the pandemic underscored the need to tackle the region's continued crises related to housing unaffordability, climate change, and more. After the Commission and Board advanced the Final Blueprint into the environmental phase in early 2021, staff then focused on translating each of the Blueprint's 35 long-term strategies into more than 80 near-term implementation actions, working in partnership with public, private, and non-profit entities to create a comprehensive Implementation Plan for the next five years.

Ultimately, Plan Bay Area 2050 (Plan) is ready to serve as a resilient and equitable nextgeneration plan for the San Francisco Bay Area 2050 – laying out a pathway toward a better future for all residents through specific strategies – policies and investments – related to transportation, housing, the economy, and the environment. The Final Plan was informed by over 23,000 Bay Area residents and over 234,000 comments, with over 450 public and stakeholder meetings and events held over the four-year planning process. Most importantly, more than 60 percent of public engagement activities targeted communities – including residents of Equity

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Priority Communities and other underserved groups – who have been historically underrepresented in planning processes.

As shown in **Attachment C**, the Final Plan works to ensure that the Bay Area of 2050 is more affordable, connected, diverse, healthy, and vibrant for all through 35 strategies to be implemented at the local, county, regional, and state levels over the next three decades. Totaling approximately \$1.4 trillion, the Plan's strategies rely on existing and reasonably-anticipated new monies, but fully realizing those revenues will be critical in the decade ahead to fully implement the Final Plan. If implemented, the Final Plan would significantly reduce housing and transportation costs for a typical household, shift approximately one-fifth of the workforce away from commuting by auto, provide more affordable housing in historically-exclusionary cities and towns, meet the state-mandated greenhouse gas target, and improve intraregional jobs-housing balances, among other beneficial outcomes. Last but certainly not least, the Final Plan would make greater headway in addressing challenges for households with low incomes, and Equity Priority Communities, addressing long-standing disparities in housing, transportation, and more.

Revisions to Plan Document and Implementation Plan:

Between the release of Draft Plan Bay Area 2050 in late May and the close of the public comment period on July 20, 2021, MTC and ABAG received hundreds of comment letters, as well as feedback at virtual workshops and related public engagement. Comments received on Draft Plan Bay Area 2050, including the Draft Implementation Plan, were reviewed in August and September 2021, with all comments posted online and electronically shared with elected officials and stakeholders in mid-August (Attachment D). In response to comments received as well as minor technical updates, Final Plan Bay Area 2050 reflects the following key changes:

• Minor Technical Updates. Staff updated funding assumptions for Strategy EN8 (electric vehicles) in response to feedback from the California Air Resources Board to maintain forecasted greenhouse gas emission reductions. Staff also adjusted "stay-at-home" assumptions related to vacation, sick, and personal business days, which led to slightly higher greenhouse gas emissions for all EIR alternatives, including the Final Plan.

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- Final Plan Document. In addition to integrating minor data updates discussed above, the Final Plan Document features expanded sidebars and maps on topics such as: the Blue Ribbon Transit Recovery Task Force; COVID-19 pandemic integration; parks, recreation, and conservation; and express bus network improvements.
- **Final Implementation Plan.** The Implementation Plan received significant feedback, especially from stakeholder organizations, during the summer 2021 Partnership Phase. Integrated as the final chapter of the Plan Document, the Final Implementation Plan integrates refined implementation actions on topics ranging from workforce development to sea level rise mitigation, previewed in September. The Final Implementation Plan also identifies timeframes and partnership opportunities to further explore in the years ahead.

Pivoting Toward Implementation in 2022:

While the Implementation Plan highlights more than 80 specific implementation actions that MTC and ABAG are slated to advance in partnership with other entities over the next five years, adoption of Final Plan Bay Area 2050 will allow MTC/ABAG staff to begin advancing some key initiatives over the next year specifically. High-priority actions for next year include:

- Advancing pilot projects such as a homelessness prevention system and the "Doorway" affordable housing platform through the Expanded Regional Housing Portfolio and the Bay Area Housing Finance Authority (BAHFA)
- Providing land use guidance for local jurisdictions through the Transit-Oriented Development (TOD) Policy Update
- Advancing transit recovery through implementation of the Blue Ribbon Transit Recovery Task Force priorities, as well as further progress on the Major Project Advancement Policy and completion of the Fare Coordination and Integration Study

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- Conducting deep community engagement on the future of Bay Area freeways, and how pricing can play a role, through the Next-Generation Freeways Study
- Expanding coordination with the Bay Area Air Quality Management District to accelerate implementation of all climate mitigation strategies, from sustainable commute targets to electric vehicle subsidies & marketing to travel demand management programs

Adopting Final Plan Bay Area 2050 through MTC Resolution No. 4485 and ABAG Resolution No. 09-21 (Attachments A and B, respectively) will allow staff to pivot toward implementation and advance these and many other priorities in the coming year to realize the Plan's Vision.

Next Steps:

If approved by the Commission and ABAG Executive Board later this month, staff will finalize the document and officially publish Plan Bay Area 2050 as the new regional long-range plan. Staff will report back to the joint committees annually with updates on overall progress on Plan implementation to maximize accountability. A focused update to the regional long-range plan, anticipated to build upon Plan Bay Area 2050, is slated to commence in mid-to-late 2023.

WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) is the regional transportation planning agency for the San Francisco Bay Area pursuant to Government Code Section 66500 et seq.; and

WHEREAS, Part 450 of Title 23 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), require MTC as the MPO to prepare and update a long-range Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) every four years; and

WHEREAS, California Government Code § 65080 et seq. requires MTC to prepare and update a long-range Regional Transportation Plan (RTP), including a Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) prepared in conjunction with the Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG), every four years; and

WHEREAS, Plan Bay Area 2050 ("Plan") will serve as the region's next-generation plan for transportation, housing, the economy, and the environment, while serving as the Regional Transportation Plan and Sustainable Communities Strategy for the San Francisco Bay Area consistent with federal and state requirements; and

WHEREAS, MTC and ABAG jointly adopted the first Plan Bay Area in 2013 (Plan Bay Area 2013) (MTC Resolution No. 4111 and ABAG Resolution No. 06-13), and the second Plan Bay Area in 2017 (Plan Bay Area 2040) (MTC Resolution No. 4300 and ABAG Resolution No. 10-17); and

WHEREAS, beginning in early 2018, MTC and ABAG conducted the Horizon initiative, which explored a range of different potential futures for the San Francisco Bay Area with the goal of identifying strategies that are resilient to uncertainty while advancing social equity; and

WHEREAS, MTC and ABAG commenced a comprehensive and coordinated planning process for transportation, housing, the economy, and the environment with a 2050 horizon year known as Plan Bay Area 2050 (Plan) in fall 2019, in conformance with all applicable federal and state requirements including Senate Bill 375; and

WHEREAS, the Plan, including both the RTP and the SCS, which is attached hereto as Attachment A, and incorporated herein as though set forth in length, contains an integrated set of fiscally-constrained strategies across each of the four elements of the Plan; and

WHEREAS, MTC and ABAG jointly adopted the Vision for Plan Bay Area 2050 in September 2019, emphasizing that resilient and equitable strategies should be prioritized to ensure by the year 2050 the Bay Area is affordable, connected, diverse, healthy, and vibrant for all (MTC Resolution No. 4393 and ABAG Resolution No. 09-19); and

WHEREAS, MTC and ABAG approved the analysis of the 25 Strategies for the Plan Bay Area 2050 Draft Blueprint in February 2020 as well as the corresponding Growth Geographies (MTC Resolution No. 4410 and ABAG Resolution No. 03-2020); and

WHEREAS, MTC and ABAG approved a revised set of 35 Strategies for the Plan Bay Area 2050 Final Blueprint in fall 2020 as well as the updated Growth Geographies (MTC Resolution No. 4437 and ABAG Resolution No. 16-2020), and;

WHEREAS, MTC and ABAG advanced the Plan Bay Area 2050 Final Blueprint into the environmental and implementation planning phase in winter 2021 (MTC Resolution No. 4451 and ABAG Resolution No. 01-2021), and;

WHEREAS, MTC and ABAG analyzed Draft Plan Bay Area 2050, previously known as the Final Blueprint, through the Environmental Impact Report (EIR) process under the California Environmental Quality Act, releasing the Draft Plan Document and Draft Environmental Impact Report for review in May and June 2021, respectively, and;

WHEREAS, public and stakeholder engagement activities were held on Draft Plan Bay Area 2050 throughout June and July 2021, with all comments considered and, when appropriate, integrated in Final Plan Bay Area 2050 prior to its release in early October 2021, and;

WHEREAS, between fall 2020 and fall 2021, MTC and ABAG developed a detailed Implementation Plan with more than 80 discrete actions identified to advance the 35 strategies featured in Final Plan Bay Area 2050 to be implemented by MTC and ABAG with deep engagement with partner organizations over the next five years; and

WHEREAS, Final Plan Bay Area 2050 was ultimately informed by over 230,000 public comments, over 23,000 planning process participants, and over 450 public and stakeholder events through the Plan Bay Area 2050 process and its predecessor, the Horizon initiative; and

WHEREAS, the Plan advances regional affordability through strategies to tackle the region's long-standing housing crisis through preservation and production of more housing units at all income levels, while advancing means-based strategies to improve affordability for low-income transit riders and motorists; and

WHEREAS, the Plan advances regional connectivity through strategies to build nextgeneration networks for transit and active transportation, improving access to destinations across the nine-county region and beyond, while enabling motorists to shift to more healthier and more sustainable modes; and

WHEREAS, the Plan helps to maintain and expand the region's diversity by advancing strategies to protect vulnerable lower-income renters from displacement, while working with

Equity Priority Communities to invest in community-prioritized infrastructure and recognizing the need for renter and homebuyer assistance programs for low-income families; and

WHEREAS, the Plan advances human and environmental health in the region and beyond through strategies to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by electrifying vehicles and buildings, reducing automobile dependence, investing in parks and conservation, among others; and

WHEREAS, the Plan helps to maintain and grow the region's economic vibrancy through strategies to expand job training and business incubator programs to create more economic opportunities in Equity Priority Communities while preserving and investing in key industrial lands; and

WHEREAS, Final Plan Bay Area 2050 meets all relevant federal and state requirements, including those related to air quality, land use, and transportation as described below; and

WHEREAS, MTC conducted an air quality analysis of the Plan using the latest planning assumptions, emissions model, and consultation provisions, including a quantitative regional emissions analysis that meets emissions budget requirements of the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency transportation conformity rule, and the Plan contributes to all required emissions reductions; and

WHEREAS, adoption of, and the conformity determination for, the proposed 2017 TIP has been determined simultaneously with the Plan for consistency purposes (MTC Resolution No. 4482); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to California Government Code § 65080(b)(2)(G), in preparing the Plan, MTC and ABAG considered spheres of influence adopted by the Local Agency Formation Commissions within the San Francisco Bay Area; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to California Government Code § 65080(b)(2)(E), federal public participation requirements, and MTC's Public Participation Plan (MTC Resolution No. 4246),

the Plan was developed through a strategic, proactive, comprehensive public outreach and involvement program, which included: an adopted public participation plan; routine distribution of information to local/regional media; advertising in local and regional newspapers; distribution of public information materials, such as brochures and newsletters; a dedicated website; meetings with representatives from each county's board of supervisors and city councilmembers; noticed public hearings to receive testimony on the Plan and the Environmental Impact Report (EIR); subregional workshops to facilitate public comment on the Plan; and interagency coordination and involvement; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to California Government Code § 65080(b)(2)(B), the Plan (i) identifies the general location of uses, residential densities, and building intensities within the region; (ii) identifies areas within the region sufficient to house all the population of the region, including all economic segments of the population, over the course of the planning period of Plan Bay Area 2050 taking into account net migration into the region, population growth, household formation and employment growth; (iii) identifies areas within the region sufficient to house an eight-year projection of the regional housing need for the region pursuant to California Government Code § 65584; (iv) identifies a transportation network to service the transportation needs of the region; (v) gathers and considers the best practically available scientific information regarding resource areas and farmland in the region as defined in subdivisions (a) and (b) of California Government Code § 65580 and 65581; and (viii) allows the Plan to comply with Section 176 of the Federal Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. § 7506); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to California Government Code § 65080(b)(2)(B), in preparing the Plan, MTC was responsible for identifying a transportation network to service the transportation needs of the region; and allowing the Plan to comply with Section 176 of the Federal Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. Sec. 7506); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to California Government Code § 65080(b)(2)(B), in preparing the Plan, MTC and ABAG were jointly responsible for setting forth a forecasted development pattern for the region, which, when integrated with the transportation network, and other

transportation measures and policies, will reduce the greenhouse gas emissions from automobiles and light trucks to achieve the greenhouse gas emission reduction targets adopted by the California Air Resources Board (CARB) for the San Francisco Bay Area; and

WHEREAS, the California Air Resources Board (CARB) set a more ambitious year 2035 greenhouse gas emission reduction target for cars and light-duty trucks (19 percent reduction percapita) for long-range regional plans in all major California metropolitan regions, as of March 2018; and

WHEREAS, as demonstrated in the Program EIR certified for the Plan, the Plan sets forth a forecasted development pattern for the region, which, when integrated with the transportation network, and other transportation measures and polices, will reduce the greenhouse gas emissions from automobiles and light trucks to achieve the regional greenhouse gas emission targets set by CARB for the region; and

WHEREAS, prior to taking action on the Plan, MTC has heard, been presented with, reviewed, and considered all of the information and data in the administrative record, including the Final Program EIR, and all oral and written evidence presented to it during all meetings and hearings; and

WHEREAS, adoption of the Plan is accompanied by adoption of the 2021 TIP (MTC Resolution No. 4475) and certification that the Final Environmental Impact Report for the Plan complies with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) (MTC Resolution No. 4484); now, therefore, be it

<u>RESOLVED</u>, that MTC certifies that the foregoing recitals are true and correct and incorporated by this reference; and be it further

RESOLVED, that MTC finds that the Plan meets the requirements of Senate Bill 375 (Steinberg, 2008) as codified in California Government Code § 65080, subdivision (b); and be it further

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<u>RESOLVED</u>, that MTC finds that the Plan complies with the requirements of all other applicable laws; and be it further

<u>RESOLVED</u>, that MTC does hereby adopt the Plan as included as Attachment A, as well as all associated supplemental reports, subject to additional minor or non-substantive technical corrections and editorial changes (Final Plan); and be it further

population of the region, including all economic segments of the population, over the course of the planning period of Plan Bay Area 2050 taking into account net migration into the region, population growth, household formation and employment growth; (iii) identifies areas within the region sufficient to house an eight-year projection of the regional housing need for the region pursuant to California Government Code § 65584; (iv) identifies a transportation network to service the transportation needs of the region; (v) gathers and considers the best practically available scientific information regarding resource areas and farmland in the region as defined in subdivisions (a) and (b) of California Government Code § 65080.01; (vi) considers the state housing goals specified in California Government Code §§ 65580 and 65581; and (viii) allows the Plan to comply with Section 176 of the Federal Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. § 7506); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to California Government Code § 65080(b)(2)(B), in preparing the Plan, ABAG was responsible for identifying the general location of uses, residential densities, and building intensities within the region; identifying areas within the region sufficient to house all the population of the region, including all economic segments of the population, over the course of the planning period of the Plan taking into account net migration into the region, population growth, household formation and employment growth; identifying areas within the region sufficient to house an eight-year projection of the regional housing need for the region pursuant to California Government Code § 65584; gathering and considering the best practically available scientific information regarding resource areas and farmland in the region as defined in subdivisions (a) and (b) of California Government Code § 65080.01; and considering the state housing goals specified in California Government Code §§ 65580 and 65581; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to California Government Code § 65080(b)(2)(B), in preparing the Plan, MTC and ABAG were jointly responsible for setting forth a forecasted development pattern for the region, which, when integrated with the transportation network, and other transportation measures and policies, will reduce the greenhouse gas emissions from automobiles and light trucks to achieve the greenhouse gas emission reduction targets adopted by the California Air Resources Board (CARB) for the San Francisco Bay Area; and

WHEREAS, the California Air Resources Board (CARB) set a more ambitious year 2035 greenhouse gas emission reduction target for cars and light-duty trucks (19 percent reduction per-capita) for long-range regional plans in all major California metropolitan regions, as of March 2018; and

WHEREAS, as demonstrated in the Program EIR certified for the Plan, the Plan sets forth a forecasted development pattern for the region, which, when integrated with the transportation network, and other transportation measures and polices, will reduce the greenhouse gas emissions from automobiles and light trucks to achieve the regional greenhouse gas emission targets set by CARB for the region; and

WHEREAS, prior to taking action on the Plan, ABAG has heard, been presented

with, reviewed, and considered all of the information and data in the administrative record, including the Final Program EIR, and all oral and written evidence presented to it during all meetings and hearings; and

WHEREAS, adoption of the Plan is accompanied by certification that the Final Environmental Impact Report for the Plan complies with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) (ABAG Resolution No. 08-2021);

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Executive Board of the Association of Bay Area Governments hereby certifies that the foregoing recitals are true and correct and incorporated by this reference; and be it further

RESOLVED, that ABAG finds that the Plan meets the requirements of Senate Bill 375 (Steinberg, 2008) as codified in California Government Code § 65080, subdivision (b); and be it further

RESOLVED, that ABAG finds that the Plan complies with the requirements of all other applicable laws; and be it further

RESOLVED, that ABAG does hereby adopt the Plan as included as Exhibit 1, as well as all associated supplemental reports, subject to additional minor or non-substantive technical corrections and editorial changes (Final Plan); and be it further

RESOLVED, that ABAG directs its staff to publish the Final Plan and to submit the Final Plan to relevant state and federal agencies.
